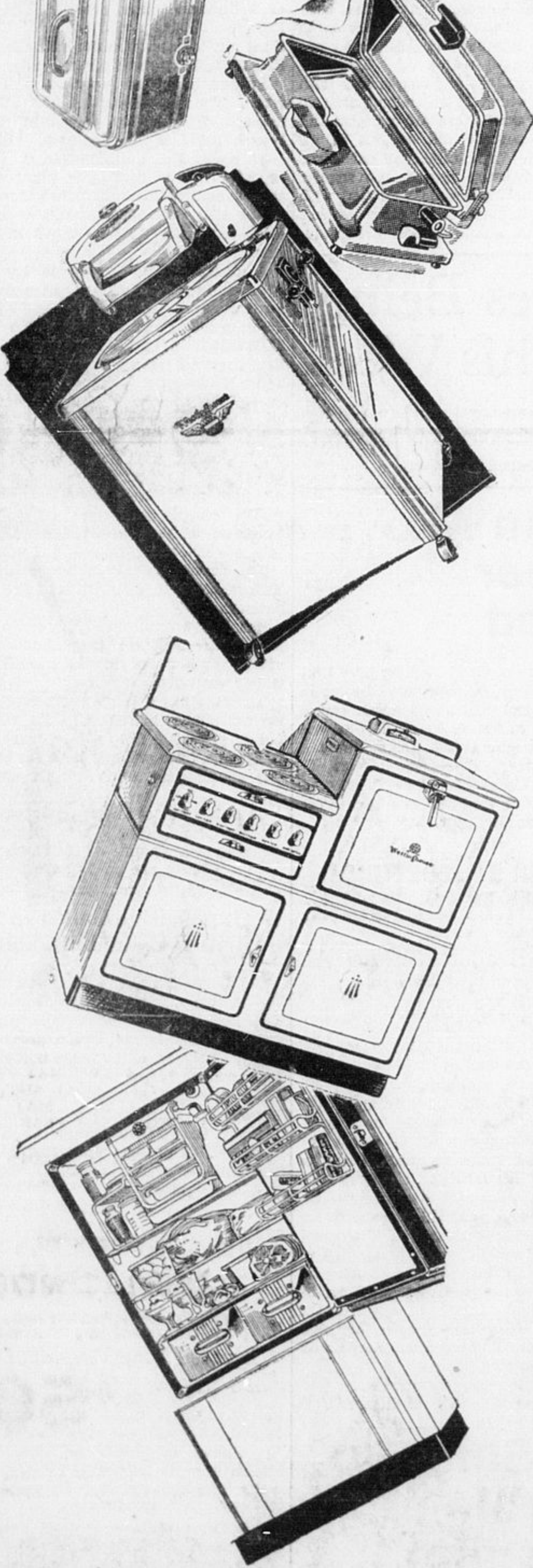

When the chairman, Rev. A. I. Heinonen, was about to introduce the dramatization scene, Mrs. A. Freeman stepped on the platform on behalf of this year's pupils and made a speech to the teacher expressing the thanks of the pupils of this year to their teacher for his work and at the same time pointing out the great benefit the pupils have derived through their studies of the English language, helping them in their efforts to better understand and appreciate the life, customs and highest ideals and best traditions of their adopted country. At the conclusion of her speech, Mrs. Freeman—on behalf of her fellow-pupils—presented to their teacher a written Christmas greeting together with a valuable Christmas gift. Mr. Heinonen, who was taken completely by surprise, replied in suitable terms, and told his pupils why he at the age of sixteen, a year after his arrival on this continent, decided to master the English language, and thanked his pupils for their enthusiasm, industry and fidelity in their work at school.
A few minutes before midnight, the singing of the National Anthem brought to a close a happy evening.

building is expected to be completed early in the new year.
The nurse's residence and addition to St. Mary's hospital, Timmins, now under construction, will make St. Mary's hospital one of the largest and best equipped hospitals in the province.
Timmins is the most northerly large centre in Ontario. It is situated in the District of Cochrane, 350 miles north of Toronto by air. It is chief centre of Canada's greatest gold area. Timmins is on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway. Through trains daily; 24-hour freight service to Toronto. Bus lines from Timmins to adjacent towns. City bus service reaching and serving all parts of Timmins.
Chief industry—gold mining. Home of the Hollinger Mine, employing 3000 men all year round.
Education—Five large well-equipped public schools; six large, well-equipped separate schools. Fine modern high and vocational school. Business colleges. Public library with large number of volumes, kept up to date.
Musical—Citizens' Band, Lions Club Boys' Band, Porcupine District Pipe Band, Welsh Miners' Choir, Cornish Choir, Schubert Choral. First-class orchestras, music studios, dancing classes, etc.
Churches—Irish Roman Catholic, French Roman Catholic, Anglican, United, Baptist, Finnish United, Roumanian Orthodox, Christian Scientist, Christian Brethren, Greek Orthodox, Salvation Army, etc.
Recreation—Two modern talking picture theatres; skating arena, curling rink, two athletic fields, golf course, badminton club, dance halls, clay tennis courts, hockey, soccer, baseball, softball, bowling, rugby, lawn bowling, motorboating, canoeing, swimming, fishing, hunting.
Municipal Tourist Camp—On the shore of Gillies Lake in the northeast corner of the town. Caretaker and all conveniences.
Hotels—Empire, largest in Northern Ontario; many other modern well-equipped hotels.
Stores—Most of the business section is of modern fireproof construction. Up-to-date stores supply wider selections than in most places of the same size.
Office buildings—Good accommodation in fireproof buildings.
Wholesale houses—Timmins is the distributing centre for an increasingly large area. Two large grocery wholesalers, oil distributors, machinery, meat packers, etc.
Roads and sidewalks—Main business streets are asphalt. Most sidewalks are concrete.
Communications—Local and long distance telephone service. Telegraph service. Private wires to brokers, ticketers, etc.
Banks—Five bank branches housed in permanent buildings, with bank clearing equivalent to a city of 65,000.

the time he had been off duty.
Councillor Wren—"This man left that meeting in agreement with the terms and if he has approached the mayor seeking the money deducted from his pay, he has broken the probation requirements."
Councillor Brunette—"If he was taken back on the force I think he should have been paid for his full time."
Councillor Laporte—"If just cause was shown for his suspension I think that he should have been penalized by losing his salary for the time he was off duty."
Councillor Cousins—"The mayor was in favour of firing him and I battled for four and a half hours to avoid it."
Mayor Bartleman—"I was in favour of firing him until I heard another story which changed my opinion."
Councillor Wren—"It was a generous action to reinstate this man and as soon as he is reinstated he tries to go over the head of his superiors to attempt to get the money he had agreed to forfeit as a penalty."
Mayor Bartleman—"This matter could be best settled by having the constable and the chief of police appear before a full meeting of council."

Councillor Wren—"It's either a case of supporting the chief and the police committee or voting a lack of confidence in them."

Mayor Bartleman—"I think the council should investigate the whole thing. In the first place it was a peculiar time for a man to be reinstated and the most extraordinary thing was for two men on a committee to take it upon themselves to restore a constable to duty on a probationary period who had been suspended."

"This sounds like a vengeful motion to me," was the mayor's comment after declaring the motion lost that asked for Constable Culhane's further suspension.

Acting Mayor
Upon the suggestion of Mayor Bartleman, which was unanimously endorsed by the council, Councillor P. H. Laporte will be acting mayor during Mr. Bartleman's absence from town for one week.

Pay \$ per Day
The clerk was instructed to include in the notice for tenders that men employed by the successful bidder for garbage collection here must be paid \$4.00 per day.

Permission Granted
Council granted permission to the Catholic Women's League to hold a sale of shawmooks at the streets here on March 17.

Tax Rebates
No action was taken by council on a request from Mrs. F. J. Filbert for a rebate on a license for a refreshment stand which she had operated here from June to October. Councillor Wren was of the opinion that Mrs. Filbert was seeking to evade taxes on her property, which she would open again next year.

Express Delivery
A communication was received from the railway company who advised council that they would not be able to extend their cartage limits to include the territory recently annexed by the town before Christmas. A survey of the town will first be made by the company.

Change Street Name
Kirkland avenue in the northeast section of the town is to be changed to Empire avenue it was decided. The name "Kirkland" it was felt might make for confusion with Kirkland Lake. With this change settled the town clerk was authorized to order street names which will be erected in this section as soon as possible.

New Fire Alarm
Authority was granted for the installation of a second telephone line at the fire hall. Under the new arrangement the telephone company will record the source of all calls, which will facilitate checking up on false alarms. It was also stated that there was every chance that a fire alarm might be delayed if the single phone at the fire hall was in use at the time.

High School Board
It was decided to leave to the incoming council the task of appointing council representatives on the High School Board. A. G. Irving and D. Ostrasser are the retiring members this year. Council were advised by the board secretary.

Indigent Patient
Sylvester Last, whom doctors claim is in suffering from tuberculosis, uncomplicated by silicosis, despite the fact that he has worked in the mines for sixteen years, will be sent to Toronto for further examination before being placed in a sanitarium. It was decided. In discussing the subject it was suggested that doubt sometimes rested in the minds of council if a conclusive diagnosis is made in cases similar to

that of Last's. It was felt that an examination by a chest specialist would eliminate any doubts members of council might have.

Mayor's Salary
The clerk was instructed to pay Mayor Bartleman his yearly honorarium amounting to \$1,200.

Thanks Members
Mayor Bartleman, at the conclusion of the meeting, thanked the members of council and town officials for their co-operation during the past year and expressed the belief that much had been accomplished in the last twelve months. The members of council also spoke briefly, extending their thanks.

Funeral on Monday of Late D. Manninen

Interment at Timmins Cemetery Vault.
The funeral service for David Manninen tailor, residence Dominion Boardinghouse, Fourth avenue, who died Dec. 18th, was conducted by Rev. A. I. Heinonen, minister of the Timmins Finnish United Church in the Walker's Funeral Chapel, Timmins, Monday Dec. 20th at 3 p.m. in presence of relatives and most intimate friends.

The late Mr. Manninen was born at Helsinki, Finland, some 66 years ago. His wife Mrs. Lydia Manninen, nee Turpeala, lives at Helsinki, Finland, where also there are two sons living with their mother. One daughter, Ilma (Mrs. Arvi Tuomanen) lives at Kirkland Lake, and was present at the funeral.

The late Mr. Manninen came to Canada during 1914, and to Timmins about seven years ago and has been employed as a tailor.

A few floral offerings were received at the funeral from relatives and friends. The pallbearers were Messrs Arvi Tuomanen, Victor Virkka, Andrew Karl and Bruce Leek. The interment was at Timmins cemetery vault.

Memorial Window Now in Church at Tillsonburg

M. McGuire. The ceremony of unveiling was very impressive. Rev. W. L. Davidson officiated at the ceremony of dedication of the window. In his address Rev. Mr. Davidson pointed out the meaning of some of the symbols in the window. The anchor at the top signifies God as the anchor of the soul. The crown is the crown of righteousness and glory. In the centre panel Christ is shown with the children, and the words below are: "Suffer Little Children to Come Unto Me." The late W. W. McGuire, was a brother of Mr. J. S. McGuire, of Timmins.
