## Noted Finnish Choir Heard Here on Air

### Finnish People and Other Music-Lovers Enjoy Programme Last Night.

A part of the programme presented by the Helsinki University Choir of Finland at Eaton Auditorium, Toronto was broadcast over the Canadian Broadcasting system, from 8:30 p.m. to 9 o'clock on Wednesday evening. Many local Finnish people are in Toronto to attend the concert, but others eagerly listened to the broadcast last night. The University Choir is made up of male students and graduates of Helsinki University, and is conducted by Dr. Turunen. The choir arrived in New York on December 22nd, and since that time have presented concerts at many of the largest cities on the continent, each time drawing an exceptionally large audience. At Eaton Auditorium on Wednesday night, all seating, as well as standing room was filled and crowds had to be turned away from the doors.  
Mr. Yrjo Sjoblom announced the sections in both the Finnish and English languages, and in many cases explained the meaning of the songs. The following is the programme presented over the network.  
"Terve Suomeksi Maa"—Hail Finland  
Niin Mina Neitonen, Sinulle Laulan, Kuin Omalle Kullalleeni—So I Sing To Thee Fair Maiden—composed by Robert Kajanus.  
"Sirikka"—The Cricket—composed by Armas Jannafelt.  
"Pan"—from Greek Mythology—composed by Vaino Haapalainen.  
"Prokko."  
At this point in the programme, Mr. Sjoblom extended the best wishes of the choir to all Finnish people in Canada who were listening to the broadcast, the final selection on the broadcast being "Loitsu."

## Bed Catches Fire While Man Sleeps

### Haileybury Man Has Unusual Experience, but No Serious Harm Done.

Haileybury, Jan. 13.—(Special to The Advance)—G. A. Montgomery, local resident, slept so soundly yesterday morning he was not aware his bed was ablaze until the flames roused him from his slumbers and he managed to get the burning bedding into the backyard before either he was scorched himself or the building had caught fire. Montgomery said later he had gone to sleep in a bed set too close to a heating stove, in which was a coal fire, and the blankets apparently came in contact with the stove while he slept the sleep of one who had worked overtime and had gone to bed late. When he awakened, flames were shooting nearly to the ceiling, according to Montgomery, partner in a radio supplies store. He jumped out of bed, grabbed the bedclothes and mattress and threw them out into the snow at the rear of the premises. The bedding was a total loss, but otherwise it was not even necessary to summon the firemen.

## Death Toll of 154 in Aeroplane Accidents

### Canadian Among the Last Ten Killed in U.S. Crashes

The accident this week at Bozeman, Montana, in which ten were killed when a Northwest Airlines transport plane crashed on a snow-covered mountain peak, brings to mind the fact that in the last couple of years aeroplane accidents in the U.S.A. have taken a considerable toll of life. In the crash this week, Douglas MacKay publicity director for the Hudson Bay Co., and a well-known Canadian newspaperman previous to joining the H.B.C., was among those killed. The plane was burned into a twisted mass of steel.

In the past two years there have been 17 major aeroplane crashes in the U.S.A. with a total loss of life of 154.

The most disastrous air wreck in the list was on Oct. 18, 1932, when a storm-tossed United Airlines transport crashed in the Uinta Mountains of Utah, 26 miles south of Knight, Wyo., killing 19.

Major crashes since Jan. 1, 1932, include:  
Jan. 14, 1932—Seventeen killed; airliner crashed near Goodwin, Ark.  
April 5, 1932—Five killed; United States Army bomber fell near Fredericksburg, Pa.  
April 7, 1932—Twelve killed; transport crashed near Uniontown, Pa.  
Aug. 5, 1932—Eight killed; airliner fell at St. Louis.  
Sept. 5, 1932—Ten killed; sightseeing plane fell near Pittsburgh, Penn.  
Sept. 29, 1932—Four killed; motion-picture plane crashed near Chicago.  
Dec. 15, 1932—Seven killed; transport struck mountainside 30 miles southeast of Salt Lake City.  
Dec. 23, 1932—Six killed in test flight of commercial plane, Dallas, Texas.  
Dec. 27, 1932—Thirteen killed; commercial plane fell near Saugus, Calif.  
Jan. 12, 1933—Five, including Martin Johnson, explorer, killed; transport fell near Saugus, Calif.  
Feb. 9, 1933—Eleven killed; Coastwise transport plunged into San Francisco Bay.  
March 25, 1933—Thirteen killed; cross-country plane smashed on mountain top near Pittsburgh.
