Chinese Guerrilla Troops Seriously Harass Japs

The latest reports from the scene of war in China is to the effect that the Chinese guerrilla warfare is doing serious damage to the Japanese and has materially lowered their morale. Until the last few days the Japanese flushed with continued victories and the steady advance of their soldiers, were inclined to be boastful and assertive. The shock that they have received through the fierce and successful attacks made upon them by what are termed the outlawed Chinese Communist troops has turned the assertiveness of the Japanese into a momentary quietness at least. Those who are giving the most careful study to the situation would not be surprised if the Japanese showed signs of regular panic if the Chinese troops continue to oppose them with such success. The new troops now fighting for China are soldiers organized by the Communists. They were outlawed by the Chinese government and have been in little better position than brigands. Apparently, however, the Chinese Government has been able to make some sort of agreement in the matter and so China has an addition of some 100,000 or more equipped and experienced soldiers to add to her fighting forces. Not only has the advance of the Japanese into the interior of China been completely stopped, but in addition the Chinese have been able to recapture a number of strategic centres recently held by the Japanese. The new Chinese troops have resorted to sniping, ambushing and other guerrilla methods of warfare, and have the Japanese disorganized to some extent at least.

Hint for Those Who Lack Radio Licenses

Number of Court Cases This Week in North. More to Follow.

Those who have radios but no radio licenses should note the number of cases in police court at various places in the North these days. Apparently, there is a close check-up being made on radios and all who have failed to secure their radio licenses for this year are liable to find themselves in trouble and in court. Most people who neglect to secure a radio license blame the neglect on the fact that it is one license fee for which there does not seem to be anything like a fair return. To these it may be said that it is better to buy the radio license than to pay \$2.00 and costs (over \$5.00 in all) and still have to pay the \$2 for the radio license. In North Bay the other day there were six cases of people charged with failing to have their radio licenses for the current year. There were cases last week at Cobalt and other centres. Timmins had several such cases this week, and it is understood that Kirkland Lake is also on the list for a clean-up in this particular. Another and longer list is said to be ready for Timmins for the near future. It would be well for all here to take a lesson from the fate of others and secure their radio licenses the most economical way—that is, without waiting for a court case in the matter.

Seeks Bus License Paymaster-Timmings

Application Made to Ontario Municipal Board.

Application was made this week to the Ontario Municipal Board for a license to operate a bus service between Timmins and the Paymaster Mine. The application was one of several coming before the Ontario Railway and Municipal Board sitting at Toronto. All the applications were opposed, the railways and private individuals making pointed objection. The story of the several applications is told in The Globe and Mail yesterday as follows:
 "Three applications for bus service licenses in various part of Ontario were made to the Ontario Municipal Board yesterday. Decision was reserved in all three cases. The applications were opposed more or less strenuously by various interests, including the Canadian Pacific Railway and the London and Port Stanley Railway.
 "F. B. Richards, now operating bus lines in St. Thomas, applied for a certificate of public necessity and convenience for a line he proposes to the new mental hospital now under construction. The London and Port Stanley Railway opposed the petition contending it was the thin edge of the wedge.
 "Guy Greco, Timmins, employee of Paymaster mine, sought authority to operate a bus service between Timmins and the mine for the convenience of employees. It was opposed by John Dalton, who operates many buses in Northern Ontario territory.
 "The board said it was sympathetic to the request of Karl Woodcock, Milton, who sought a certificate for a bus line between Milton and Guelph. The C.P.R. opposed the application on the ground that if bus licenses were issued to parallel the railway route, eventually it would mean the abandonment of passenger service."

Father of Fireman Died Early To-day

Word was received here this morning of the death in St. Clet, Quebec early to-day of Joseph Liboirin, father of William Liboirin, of Timmins Fire Department. The funeral will be held on Monday.
 Deceased, who retired five years ago as foreman of a section crew with the Canadian Pacific Railway, had been in the employ of the railway for thirty-five years.
 He was born in St. Justine de Newton, in Quebec, seventy years ago but for the past thirty years has resided in St. Clet. The late Mr. Liboirin was first taken ill about two weeks before Christmas, his condition gradually becoming more critical until his demise early to-day.
 He was a member of the railway sectionmen's union and a devout adherent to the Roman Catholic Church.
 He is survived by his wife, eight sons, Arthur, George, Adrien, of St. Clet; Alfred and Albert, of Montreal; Ralph of Barton, N.Y.; Henry, of Ottawa; and William of Timmins. Five daughters, Sister Mary of Jesus, of Lynn, Mass.; Sister Holy Name of Jesus, of Joliet, Quebec; Mrs. H. Lefebvre, of Montreal; Mrs. S. Meilleur, of Alexandria, Ont.; and Mrs. F. St. Denis, of St. Clet.

At Least 47 Persons Die in Fire at St. Hyacinthe

According to the latest information on the fearful holocaust at Sacred Heart College in St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, 47 persons are known to have perished in the fire which swept through the school in the early hours of Tuesday morning. Virtually all the victims were practically unrecognizable, seared and dismembered by the fire, as they were brought out of the still smouldering ruins of what was once a \$500,000 seat of learning. Several other persons are still reported missing.

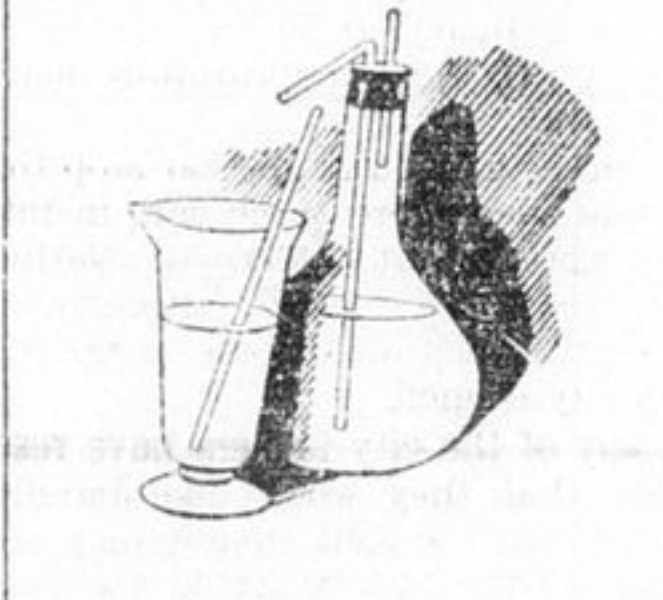
Next Social Evening of Cornish Social Club, Jan. 22

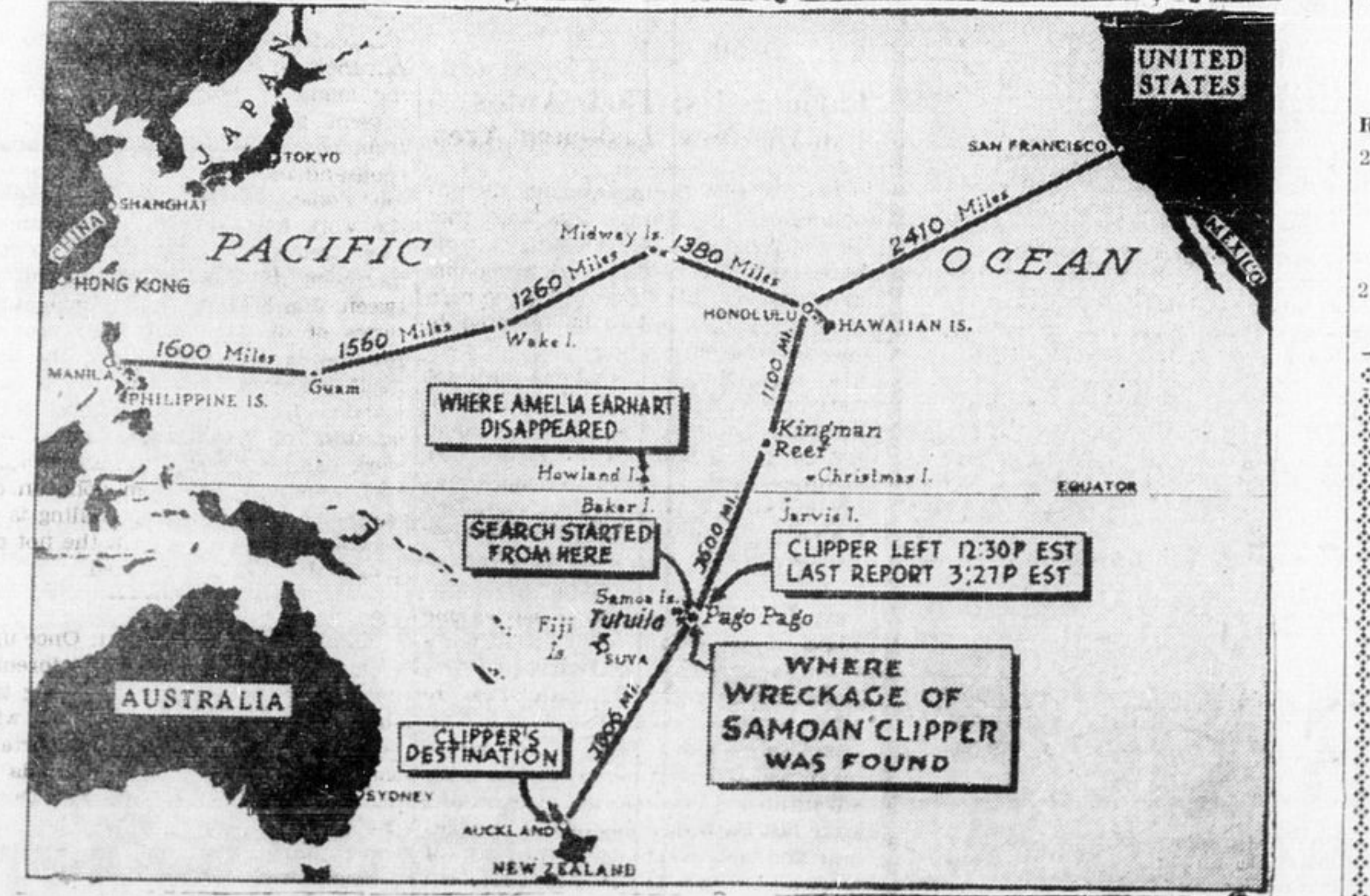
