

Constitution Commemorated By Honduras

A large, ornately designed stamp was issued by the government of Hondura's in September to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the United States Constitution. The value of the new issue is 460 and it is remarkable for being printed in 11 different colours

Hands Acress the Sea

On September 17 France issued a special stamp to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the United States Constitution. The new issue was apparently printed in connection with a celebration of the anniversary held in Paris and has aroused bitter comments from the French philatelic press. The editor of "L'Echangiste Universel" stigmatizes it as being "of a flagrant inutility" and expresses a fear that an undesirable precedent may be established for commemorating all kinds of foreign historical anniversaries. The



value of this stamp is 1.75 fr blue, and the two matronly (and obviously uncorseted) figures who are clasping hands across the centre of the design are intended to represent "Columbia" and "Marianne."

First Station at New Liskeard 33 Years Ago

(From North Bay Nugget)

Thirty-three years ago to-day (Monday) the first station on the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway was opened. New Liskeard was the

location. In 1905 there was no sign of the fine station which New Liskeard boas's to-day. The station was a box-car, which was also used as a boarding house for the men. But it served its purpose. It was the station for the railway which through the years has

opened up Northern Ontario. On January 16, 1905, R. L. Lamb, at present a division superintendent on the T. & N. O., took the first train through to Mileage 113, and on January 17 opened the station. There was no pomp or ceremony, because there were few people about. The place conisted of a few shacks.

A. E. Ames was chairman of the T. & N. O. Railway at that time
