Fire Chief Gives 1937 Annual Report

The following is the annual report of the Timmins Fire Department presented to the Town Council recently:—

Below appears in full, the annual report of Fire Chief Alex Borland, in which a sub-station in the southwestern section of the town is recommended. The complete activities of the department are reported as follows:—

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of Town Council:

Gentlemen:—I have the honour herewith to submit my twenty-first annual report of the Fire Department from December 15th, 1936 to December 16th, 1937.

The Department responded to 379 alarms during the year, compiled as follows: Telephone calls 276, street box calls 74, verbal calls 29, a decrease of 2 calls over 1936.

The losses for the year are estimated as follows:—On building, \$10,437.00; on contents, \$14,979.00; making a total loss of \$25,416.00; covered by insurance to the extent of \$210,000.00. The losses this year have decreased over 1936 by the sum of \$130,740.00.

Apparatus and equipment used to extinguish these fires:—16,000 feet of hose, 1414 gallons of chemical, 645 feet of ladders and 40 hydrants.

During the year there were 3311 inspections made, of which 3225 were first call and 886 second and third call inspections. Also during the year there were 1663 chimneys cleaned by the town.

During the year, hose and ladder practice was held weekly during the fine weather, and also weekly schooling in first aid work by the paid department which has proven to be a great benefit in rendering first aid at the river and Gilles Lake.

During the past year the paid members of the department have given 10 blood transfusions to local citizens.

Fire drills have been held in all the public and separate schools under the supervision of the fire department during the year.

Equipment added to the department was as follows:—500 feet 2½ inch hose, 2 spray nozzles and one 16-foot aluminum extension ladder. Gasoline and oils used by the department for the year: Dodge truck, 169 gallons of gasoline and 9 quarts of oil; LaFrance ladder truck, 65 gallons gasoline and 25 quarts of oil; G.M.C. hose truck, 79 gallons gasoline and 7 quarts oil.

The apparatus and equipment consists of the following:—LaFrance truck fully equipped with ladders, hose, 40-gallon chemical tank, small extinguishers, life net, deluge high pressure set, cellar pipe, gas masks and salvage covers, etc. G.M.C. combination truck equipped with 40-gallon chemical tank.

Recommendations

For the protection of life and property and to keep up the efficiency of the department, I would recommend that a substation be built in the southwestern section of the town, and if this cannot be accomplished this time, that another piece of motor apparatus be added to the equipment and the appointment of four additional men to the department on the permanent staff to handle this equipment.

I might mention that the present equipment and staff is inadequate to cover the territory now in existence owing to the town limits being increased to more than double its size with the new annexations recently made. Therefore, additional apparatus and men are very badly needed to give the citizens of Timmins the fire protection they expect. I strongly urge you to give the above recommendation your immediate attention.

In conclusion I wish to thank his worship the mayor and chairman of committee and all the members of the council for the interest they have manifested in the welfare of the department, to the officers and members of the fire department for the assistance they have at all times so cheerfully rendered by the faithful and efficient manner in which they performed their duties. I also wish to thank the various heads of departments for their assistance and co-operation at all times, also the press for the many kind comments with respect to the work and efficiency of our department.
