## Ankerite Come from Behind to Defeat Coniaurum by 8-6

Flyers Led in First Period 3-0 but Bisons Overcome Lead and Go on to Win in Last Period. Winners Have Considerable Edge on Night's Play with Fasano and Morgan Back in Line-up.

Being the score after being down three goals in the first period and then going on to win, Buffalo-Ankerite defeated Coniaurum Flyers in a scheduled Mines League game here Tuesday night before a fair-sized crowd by a score of 8-6. There is little doubt that a larger crowd would have been in attendance if the weather had been more favourable.

Despite the fact that the Flyers held a three-goal lead after sixteen minutes of the first period, two of the goals were of the lucky variety. Ankerite got the breaks. Fasano and Morgan, who had both been out of the game owing to injuries, returned to the lineup Tuesday night. Morgan seemed to be right back in form, getting two goals, one unassisted and one on a pass from Kennedy. Fasano did a continental of checking at centre ice and continually broke up Coniaurum rushes.

For Coniaurum, the ever durable sixty-minute men, Joe McNulty and Jack Young, who is built on the lines of a lath, continued their race for leadership in the league scoring records. McNulty scored two goals but Young kept pace with him with a goal and two nice assists.

Kaufman, of Ankerite, turned in his best game since the first of the season, getting a goal and three assists. He backchecked consistently and kept boring in at every opportunity.

Nearly six minutes had elapsed of the first period when Dundas shot a high lift from the corner that finally hit Joe Neddow's stick and glanced into the net to the bewilderment of Mayowski, night watchman for Ankerite. Two minutes later Jack Young literally hung Mayowski out on the end of a limb when he rounded the Ankerite net and made as if to try and slip the puck in on the left side. Turning quickly behind the net he came back to the right and had the disc in the cage before Mayowski could move to make a save. The fans gave him a big hand for this effort. "Jo-Jo" Tremblay, former star with Kapuskasing Wildcats, brought the crowd to its feet when he shook off an Ankerite forward, stick handled his way through the defence and drew Mayowski out of position and gunned the rubber into the cordage for one of the most spectacular goals of the night. "Jo-Jo" has lost some but by no means all of his dexterity with the stick.

With only thirty seconds to go, Kennedy worked his way up left wing and from a point even with the goal line passed to Morgan who made no mistake for Ankerite's first goal. With only five seconds left Kaufman backhanded a loose puck from a face off that beat Parades to make the score 3-2. Nummala, of Coniaurum, was serving a penalty at the time.

The second period was just 47 seconds old when Morgan came from rowdier to snatch a rebound in front of the net and tied the score. McNulty and Young formed the spearhead of a Coniaurum gangling attack after Morgan had been penalized and the former slapped the pass past Mayowski to put the Flyers in the lead once more. With slightly more than two minutes to go Delmonte, who had been playing good hockey, got a lucky counter which glanced off McNulty's leg giving the Coniaurum goalie no chance.

Kaufman and Dundas were given a simultaneous trip to the cooler for a high sticking episode just as the second period ended and both teams played a man short for the first two minutes of the last period. There was no scoring until they both returned. The score was tied 4-4 when Miller, Ankerite defence man, grabbed a loose puck and scored from eight feet out. Laflamme, of Ankerite, won the game for his team when he scored two goals in succession, the first on a pass from Kaufman and the second on a combination play with Kaufman and McKinnon.

Still in there fighting, Jack Young slipped a back pass inside the Ankerite blue line to Ab Kerr who went in on top of Mayowski for a perfect goal. "Spider" McKinnon bulged the twine for Ankerite with only two minutes to go. Kaufman getting his third assist of the night on the play. The game was just about over when Joe McNulty went through all alone to beat Mayowski on a hard drive to the corner of the net for the last goal of the night.
