

Commit Charles Mullen On Charges of Hold-Up

Found Guilty of Breaking, Entering and Theft of Three Cases of Butter from Abramson's Store. Juvenile Brother Tries to Take Whole Blame. Judgment Reserved in Guy Greco Case.

Charles Mullen, of Timmins, was committed for trial on three charges in connection with the attempted hold-up of Walter Wilson, proprietor of Riverside Pavilion a week ago last Saturday, when he appeared before Magistrate Atkinson in police court here on Tuesday and elected to be tried by judge and jury. Mullen is charged with being disguised at night, assault with intent to rob and possession of concealed weapons.

ed man sprang in front of him and said, "Come on, give me the money or I'll plug you."

"I started to back up and the man said don't pull that gat. As I pulled my gun the man made a movement as if he was trying to "cock" an automatic and I fired, knocking his hat off. At this point the man fled," Wilson swore. Running along a wall the hold-up man fired in return as Wilson again opened up and exchanged a second shot a little further on. Just before he started across the ice on the river the hold-up man is claimed to have fired again.

Wilson said that he didn't recognize the man but found a cap near his verandah and an unexploded shell that had apparently been ejected from a pistol. He testified that he knew Mullen who had worked for him on Saturday nights last summer parking cars.

Provincial Constable Hancock told the court of hearing the shots and running to the scene. Crossing the bridge in his car he arrested Mullen, who was found in possession of a blackjack and a mask. He was wearing a cap at the time and had a second cap in the pocket of a windbreaker that he was carrying over his arm. Constable Hancock swore. A second mask was found alongside the alleged tracks Mullen made as he crossed the river.

Mullen asked the constable where he told him he was coming from at the time of his arrest and the constable said that he (Mullen) told him he was coming from Feldman's mill. This was the only question asked by the accused.

Given 60 Days
Pleading guilty to theft of a shirt, tie and a watch belonging to Richard Jenkins, Lionel Beaulieu, of no fixed address, was given 60 days in jail.

Reckless Driving
John Maley was acquitted of a charge of reckless driving in connection with a collision at Commercial avenue and Preston street.

Two L.C.A. Cases
Jack Scott was fined \$25 and costs for consuming, while Tom Mahoney received a ticket for \$50 and costs or 30 days for an second offence of drunkenness.

Given Ten Days
Lucien Phillion was given ten days in jail when he pleaded guilty to a charge of being drunk in charge of a car.

Disorderly Conduct
Mike Boesia, George Ginic and Mrs. Xavier Bigras, were each fined \$5 and costs for disorderly conduct. They pleaded guilty.

Garbage Collection
Tenders for the collection of garbage were opened and while it was suggested that the lowest tender of C. Melette be accepted, it was decided to defer action in the matter until such time as figures could be obtained on the cost of the town doing its own garbage collection.

Permission for Show
The request of the local branch of the Canadian Legion for permission to bring Conklin's Shows to Timmins for the week of June 20 to 25, inclusive, was unanimously granted by council. Walter Greaves, president of the Legion, said that Conklin's were agreeable to sign a contract under which they would pay the Legion \$1500 to sponsor the show, which is an increase of \$500 over last year. Council was assured that the show would be under the direct supervision of a committee, on which there would be two members of council.

Make Appointments
Mrs. A. A. Rose was appointed a member of the Library Board and J. Disley, P. J. Doyle and A. Proulx members of the Board of Health. A resolution was presented by Councillors Eyre and Wren naming D. Ostrosser and A. G. Irving to the High School Board. Councillor Roberts was of the opinion that unless these appointees had attended at least 75 per cent. of the meetings they should not be returned to office as council representatives. The matter was left over until this information is secured.

Mail Delivery Soon
Following the reading of a reply to a letter sent to Prime Minister Mackenzie King asking that mail delivery in Timmins be started immediately, Mayor Bartleman announced that mail carriers would commence work within the next two weeks. Some delay has been experienced due to the fact that householders have not installed letter slots in their doors. An inspector of the department is in town at the present time making final arrangements for the commencement of the regular carrier delivery.

Photographs of Mayors
A composite picture embodying the photographs of the present and former mayors of Timmins, will be purchased from A. Roy at a cost of \$130. Hour views of the town will also be included in the oak frame which will be 38 by 48 inches.

\$500 Grant
Following receipt of a request from their secretary, J. Fulton, council authorized a grant of \$500 to the Timmins Citizens Band.

Assessment on Hall
A request for exemption from taxation for their hall on Elm street by the local Ukrainian Association, in view of the fact that it is used regularly for educational and religious purposes, was referred to the court of revision.

Changing Street Names
Town Solicitor S. A. Caldwell advised council that a by-law changing the names of certain streets in town to avoid unnecessary confusion, will have to be approved by a hearing before the county judge. The by-law will also have to be advertised. At the suggestion of the mayor the matter was left in the hands of the town clerk and Councillor Wren to make the necessary arrangements.

Tender for Iron
The Porcupine Iron and Metal Company submitted a tender of \$50 for the privilege of removing scrap iron from the town dump from March 1 to February 28. The tender was filed for future reference.

Pay for Damage
Council agreed to pay E. Tomlinson \$3.05 for time lost when a range boiler burst in his home from excess pressure in the main during the recent Blaihey fire. The water was shut off for two days when the main was damaged and when the water was turned on again the pressure broke Tomlinson's tank.

Special Meeting
At a special meeting held this week the tender of Eli Leblanc of \$11 per day for collection of garbage in the part of town recently annexed, was accepted.

The tender of the Globe Furniture Company amounting to \$2339 for furniture for the new town hall was also approved.

Local Man Erected Building in 1910

One of the First Structures in Golden City.

At the present time the engraving department of The Advance is issuing a number of pictures each week depicting the mines, the towns and the people in earlier days. One of these on Monday pictured one of the first buildings at Porcupine (Golden City). After the sentence, however, there appeared a question mark to indicate that the statement was not a definite one, but that it was open to question. Mr. Joseph Clouthier, well known in the Porcupine since the early days, tells The Advance that the building pictured in Monday's Advance shows at least one of the very earliest buildings in the Porcupine. Mr. Clouthier ought to know for he was the builder of the structure. The building, Mr. Clouthier says, was erected in January 1910. It was built for Routley and Summers, surveyors, who needed office room, sleeping apartments, etc. The firm was doing survey work in the district. The building completed in rapid time by Mr. Clouthier was not exactly the same as in the picture. The addition at the right of the structure is not part of the original house. The section to the right was erected after the original building. In the original building as erected by Mr. Clouthier and completed, had an office downstairs, while upstairs there was the banking facilities for the men employed. Behind the office part of the building was the cookery, etc. Mr. Clouthier would not say definitely that the building was or was not the first in Porcupine. "Say it is one of the very oldest," says Mr. Clouthier, "and you will do kempenielwgin? claysan htechat' well in keeping the story alive."

Burns Banquet Held At Niagara in 1826

Fourteen Toasts Were Drunk at Event

At the Burns banquet here on Tuesday evening reference was made to the fact that for approximately a century and a half the birthday of Robert Burns, the Scottish poet, had been observed each year with fitting ceremony all round the wide world. After the banquet, probably the most noted local authority on Robert Burns (Mr. W. M. Whyte) who was unable for once to be at the banquet on account of the snow storm, called attention to the fact that in Tuesday's Globe and Mail Judith Robinson had referred to a Burns banquet held at Niagara, Canada, on Jan. 25th, 1826—112 years ago. Judith Robinson's column makes the following reference to this Canadian Burns banquet over a century ago:—

The following extract from the Niagara Gleaner of Saturday, Jan. 28, 1826, is not reprinted for Burns' Society emulation. It is just reprinted:

On the 25 instant a number of gentlemen convened at Mr. Rogers' hotel to commemorate the birth of the famous Scotch Bard, Robert Burns. At six o'clock about 40 gentlemen sat down
