

PAMOUR CLINGH PLAY-OFF BERTH IN MINES HOCKEY LOOP

Dynamiters Humble McIntyre In Decisive Game on Tuesday

Final Score is 6-2. Remaining Three Teams in League all Have Chance to Finish in Play-offs, with Ankerite in Mathematical Position to Wind Up in First Place. Three Games Yet to Play.

Pamour Dynamiters made sure of a play-off position in the Porcupine Mines League Tuesday night when they humbled the big McIntyre machine at South Porcupine rink by the score of 6-2. It was a tough pill for the Macs to swallow but the Maroon-clad warriors from Pamour were never headed after taking a one goal lead in the first period.

McIntyre were on the tough end of the breaks all night and in the first period alone Jack Darragh went stone blind twice with no one to beat but the goalie and lots of time to do it. On the first occasion he hit the goalie and the next time missed the net entirely. "Red" Auger, at centre for the Macs, worked like a Trojan all night and while he came through with a nice goal in the second period, missed several opportunities by the proverbial inch.

Don Price, in the McIntyre goal, had the busiest night he has seen this winter. The versatile night watchman for the Macs, sprawled, smothered and kicked out a barrage of shots that had goal tags on them.

Pamour power plays with the McIntyre team short-handed accounted for three of their six goals and in the second period alone scored two goals in nine seconds with Roy Calhoun in the box for slashing Hanneberry.

Pamour lead the league with seven points and one more game to play. McIntyre and Conlaurem have four points apiece and one game left, while Ankerite, with three points have three games to play, one each with Pamour, McIntyre and Conlaurem. If Ankerite can win two of their remaining games, the jig is up so far as Conlaurem and McIntyre are concerned and it is quite within the realm of likelihood that they will do just that. Jack Pender, Ankerite manager, thinks that he is sitting in the driver's seat and will be out there fighting for a play-off berth. The Bisons have been the doormat of the league almost since the outset but with the team at full strength and no one on the injured list, they're bound to make stiff opposition for all comers. According to the rules of the league the first two teams play off for the Marshall-Eccle-

stone championship cup.

Tuesday night's game had just started when Tracy was given a ten-minute misconduct penalty for talking back to the referees. A short time later, with the Macs pressing hard, Reuffer shot and immediately claimed that a goal had been scored. The red light failed to flicker and despite the strenuous objections of the McIntyre player, the goal was not allowed. It was just past the half-time mark in the period when White, of Pamour, recovered the puck at the McIntyre defence after being checked by the brothers Calhoun and beat Price with a hard ankle-high shot. It was the only goal of the period.

With Roy Calhoun, of McIntyre, in the penalty box for slashing Hanneberry, Pamour forced the play and in nine seconds Tracy had passed to both White and Hanneberry who outgassed Price from a short distance out. "Red" Auger collected a smart goal for the Macs even though his team was without the services of Jimmy Calhoun who was doing a stretch in the cooler. Auger took possession of the puck at Pamour blue line and backhanded a hard drive that caught Bentley in a momentary lapse of vigilance.

McIntyre supporters took heart in the third period at the five minute stage when Baker laid a perfect pass on Caverley's stick in front of the Pamour goal that gave Bentley no chance to save. It brought the Macs to within a goal of tying the score. Another heated dispute took place when "Count" Woods, lanky right winger for Pamour, blasted a hard drive from right wing that Price failed to stop. The puck hit either the post or the inside ironwork of the nets and bounced out. McIntyre claimed that the puck had hit the post only but the red light was on and the goal was allowed. Laroche, of Pamour, grabbed the puck in the crease and McIntyre were given a penalty shot that Bentley gathered in with his customary ease. Despite the fact that they were a man short, Laroche having been chased for two minutes, Pamour went on the offensive, Woods scoring on Harmon's pass. Returning the compliment Woods passed to Harmon, who sank the disc behind Price for the last goal of the night before Laroche returned.

In the last minutes of play Myers, of Pamour, was carried from the ice with a badly bruised knee. Doctors stated that the injury is not serious and in all probability Myers will be all ready to go for the next game, which is over two weeks away.

No More Exhibition Games In Porcupine Hockey Schedule

The executive of the Porcupine Mines Hockey League have definitely decided to remove exhibition games from the schedule with Hollinger Juniors and Dome Seniors taking part, leaving only three games to be played. Buffalo-Ankerite, who have only played three league games, will compete in the three remaining fixtures against Pamour, Conlaurem and McIntyre. Pamour are sure of a play-off berth with any one of the three remaining teams holding a chance to open them. In fact Ankerite have a chance to move into first place if they win three straight.

With the dropping of the exhibition games it was suggested in some quarters that more games be added to the schedule for the four remaining Mines League teams. President Fred Quesnel, in a letter to the four teams, McIntyre, Pamour, Conlaurem and Buffalo-Ankerite, outlines the impossibility of adding anything less than sixteen games, which at this stage of the season is out of the question.
