

38th Anniversary of the Daughters of the Empire

Timmins Golden Chapter of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire to Observe Founder's Day, Sunday, Feb. 13th. Church Attendance, Special Prayers and Other Features to Mark Occasion.

On Sunday, Feb. 13th, throughout Canada and in other parts of the Empire, the 38th anniversary of the founding of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire will be observed by the honouring of Founder's Day. The Order was founded in 1900 by the late Mrs. Clark Murray, wife of Prof. Murray, of McGill University, who saw the great need for a patriotic society that would bind together the loyal Canadian women in common bonds of interest and affection for the British Empire and its institution, and at the same time provide an organization that would permit them to serve the Empire

they loved by helpful service of various kinds.

Timmins Golden Chapter I.O.D.E., organized in 1919, is to join the other chapters of the Order in honouring Founder's Day. The members of Timmins Chapter are asked to attend their respective church services on Sunday, Feb. 13th, Founder's Day. A special prayer for Founder's Day will be included in the services at St. Matthew's Anglican church and also at the Timmins United Church.

The Provincial Educational Secretary, Mrs. J. D. Detwiler, of London, Ont., will speak over the radio from C.B.L. from 4:45 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday in observance of Education Week. Dr. Stewart, of Halifax, N.S., is giving a portion of his broadcast time from 6:30 to 6:45 p.m. on Sunday for the observance of Founder's Day of the I.O.D.E.

The record of the I.O.D.E. since Mrs. Clark Murray's spirit of patriotism and genius of organization launched it in 1900, has been a story of progress, of service, of inspiration. The work done by the Chapter in Timmins is a symbol of the service given in hundreds of other cities, towns and villages of the Empire. Founded in Timmins at the close of the war, the I.O.D.E. carried on the work for the soldiers that had been the task of various patriotic societies during the time of the conflict. Soldiers and their families were helped, comforted and encouraged, and cooperation extended to the several soldiers' organizations. The Timmins Chapter was forward also in educational work, supplying flags, maps, books, to schools, especially the struggling rural schools, while scholarships were also awarded to spur students to

the best endeavours. Assisting the Navy League was another special activity of the Timmins Golden Chapter. The hospital, the Children's Aid, and other worthy causes received the hearty co-operation of the Timmins I.O.D.E. In recent years Timmins Golden Chapter has been of particular patriotic value through its sponsoring of Girl Guide work here. In short, the Timmins Golden Chapter of the Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire has been a truly patriotic organization in the finest sense of the word—working for a greater appreciation of the principles upon which the British Empire is founded, working for better education, better health for the people, and ever keeping alive the great traditions of freedom, justice, progress, as the very essence of the Empire.

Timmins Golden Chapter in all its worthy activities has but patterned itself after the Order of which it is a part. The first accomplishment of the I.O.D.E. after its founding by Mrs. Murray was the provision of a fund to place fitting monument to the Canadian soldiers who had offered their lives to their Empire at the time of the South African war. The monument—an honour to the I.O.D.E. as well as to the soldiers—stands at Bloemfontein. During the Great War the I.O.D.E. collected the remarkable total of six million dollars, established and maintained a hospital base with nurses and other attendants, ambulances, field kitchens, etc., as well as providing an immense quantity of comforts and aids for the soldiers in the field. After the war another half million dollars was raised for memorial purposes and scholarships in Canada and overseas established for the children of soldiers. Other matters in which the I.O.D.E. has particularly interested itself include:—care of the underprivileged, assistance to schools, secondary education, school libraries, scholarships and prizes, Empire Day and other patriotic ceremonies, hospitals and health, Empire study, British motion picture films, friendliness to non-Canadians, the Girl Guides, any practically every other patriotic or community movement for the general welfare.

"Echoes," the magazine issued monthly by the National Chapter of Canada Imperial Order Daughters of the Empire is worthy of a paragraph by itself. This attractive and cleverly-edited magazine is of unusual value to Canada and the Empire. In addition to recording the story of the I.O.D.E., it is an inspiration to Canadian patriotism and Canadian culture. The issue to record the coronation of King George VI and Queen Elizabeth was a journal of the most intense interest to all who respect the Empire and its traditions. The story of the King and Queen and their family and of the coronation itself was ably accomplished in "Echoes," while the many illustrations, many of them richly coloured, were works of art.

In the coronation issue a full page was devoted to listing the patronesses, officers, executive, etc., of the I.O.D.E. The list showed how broad is the foundation on which the I.O.D.E. is established and maintained. Her Excellency, the Lady Tweedmuir is the honorary president of the National Chapter of Canada. Mrs. Hubert Bruce is the honorary vice-president for Ontario; Madame E. L. Patenaude, for Quebec. The honorary vice-presidents for the Chapter include:—Lady Gooderham, Miss Joan Arnold, Mrs. Angus MacMurchy, Matron Margaret Macdonald, Mrs. Colin H. Campbell, Mrs. W. H. Barker, and many others. The list of those on the National executive committee, the national councillors, the honorary members, the advisory board, is equally distinguished and impressive.

The death of Susanne Jean Demers, four-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Demers, occurred at St. Joseph's General Hospital, North Bay, Saturday, February 5, after an illness of two weeks.

Funeral service was conducted at 3 o'clock, Monday afternoon, February 7, at the Pro-Cathedral of the Assumption with Rev. J. C. Humphrey officiating. Interment was in St. Mary's cemetery.

After an illness of 10 days, with paralysis, the child developed double pneumonia and failed to rally. She was born in Timmins, and was well known in Mattawa where she lived for two years.

Library Board
A communication was received from the Library Board asking for their annual grant in the amount of \$7500. The board also requests an additional \$1800 for new fixtures, furniture and expenses of moving into the new town hall. The matter was referred to the finance committee.

Progress Estimates
The treasurer was ordered to pay the following amounts as progress estimates on work at the new town hall:—Hill-Clark-Francis, general contractors, \$10,000; Smith and Elston, plumbing, \$800; Armstrong Electric, \$100; P. J. O'Gorman, architect, \$350.

Accept Tenders
The following tenders in connection with the new town hall were approved by council:—Hill-Clark-Francis, linoleum, \$2900; Viking Electric, sanding floors, \$75.00; Office Specialty Company, partitions, \$1632, counters, \$1475.

To Pay for Light
In future the town will pay for the cost of operating a street light at the corner of Waterloo and Viny avenue, located in the recent annexation, which has heretofore been paid by a private individual.

Chimney Cleaning
Homer Gauthier asked council if it was intended to continue the chimney cleaning programme which was inaugurated last year as a safeguard against chimney fires. Acting Mayor Wren replied that until such time as it is ascertained what was accomplished as a result of the plan, that he was unable to make a statement. Fire Chief Borland reported that chimneys in Hollinger townsite had been cleaned last and that fires in that section of the town had been considerably reduced.

The deep sorrow and pathos which the singer carried in every note, was easily understood by the audience, who strained forward in their interest.

Another song that won special favour was: "They Are Marrying My Love" the story of a young man whose love is being married to his rival, and who has been asked to be best man at the wedding; his prayers to God that he may be spared this trial made the listeners keenly aware of his heartbreak. Very popular also was "Come Along and Dance," a merry melody, with a lilting rhythm. Undoubtedly every selection was so roundly applauded that if the artist had given encores in every case, the gathering would still be happily applauding.

The pianoforte solos presented by Miss Williams were indeed a delight both to behold and to hear. Watching the artist's hands skipping over the keys, it seemed that she barely touched the piano, and yet the smooth music that she brought forth from those keys proved otherwise. The selection "Gardens in the Rain" was marvellous; each person in the audience seemed to see rain on trees and flowers and grass, and heard the drip, drip, of the raindrops. One could sense the time when the rain was very heavy, and then, again, the time when it was a light drip. At the conclusion of this number there was an insistent applause that brought the artist back for an encore selection.
