With Pamour Dynamiters definitely assured of a play-off berth in the Porcupine Mines League, The Advance publishes a thumb-nail sketch of the players on the club roster that should have more than average interest for every sport fan in the camp.

First saw the light of day in Barrie 31 years ago... is six feet tall and weighs 175 pounds... also takes a turn at blowing the whistle as referee... last year played with Timmins Seniors and formerly with pro and amateur clubs as follows: Goodyear Tire, Barrie Juniors, North Bay Trappers, Toronto City Hall, Toronto Maple Leafs, Toronto Ravinas, Toronto Millionaires, Ironwood Michigan Rangers, Boston Bruins, Philadelphia Arrows, Kitchener Flying Dutchmen and McIntyre Seniors.

Victoria Harbour Product WILLIAM A. "BILL" ALLEN—Defence... 20 years of age, five feet ten and a half inches tall and weighs 170 pounds... shoots left handed and started his hockey with Collingwood Juniors where he played for the seasons of 1935-37.

Boxes as Sideline GERRY "HAWK" MCCOMB—Not to be outdone by an elephant trainer, he has more than the average amount of tricks in the bag in the sport made famous by the Marquis of Queensbury... plays defence, weighs in at 173 pounds and reaches the towering altitude of one inch over six feet... born in Kitchener and played all his previous hockey with junior team there from 1933-37... 20 years of age.

Hutrah for Scotland! ROBERT "BUD" MAYES—Defence... tips the beam at 205 pounds and hails right from the heather country of Scotland, with Wigton as his

birthplace... 23 years old and six feet, one inch tall... had professional tryout with Boston Bruins in 1935... played with Cities Service and Young Rangers in Toronto, 1933-35, Port Colborne, 1935-36 and South Porcupine Seniors, 1936-37.

Angels Too RICHARD ALLEN "ANGEL" MARSHALL—First trip out of the home town of Acton but far from being homesick... Plays left wing and also takes a turn on the rearguard... 23 years old, weighs 176 pounds and is five feet, ten and a half inches tall... played with Acton teams from 1929 to 1935.

Home Brew Talent JOE MILLER—Defence... suffered shoulder injury early in the season but expects to be back to lend his weight, stick and influence in the play-offs... born in South Porcupine 23 years ago... goes an inch under six feet and weighs 190... shoots left... played formerly with Timmins and South Porcupine Seniors... dabbles in running and lacrosse as sidelines to hockey.

More Local Color ANGUS "HANK" HANNABURY—Another product of the Porcupine Camp, born in South End... was a member of South Porcupine Seniors, N.O.H.A. Senior champions in 1935-36... played with Dome Seniors 1936-37... had professional tryout with Toronto Maple Leafs two years ago... plays right wing... 21 years old... weighs 160... height, five feet and eleven inches.

Stratford-on-Aven CHARLES "CHUCK" DELAFINIER—Learned his hockey in Stratford, where he was born... played with Stratford Midgets 1934-36 and came to Timmins to play with Timmins Seniors 1936-37... shoots right, weight, 145; age, 24; height, five feet, five and a half inches.

Gravenhurst Coent LEON "COUNT" "BENEDICT" WOODS—A member of Gravenhurst's hockey nobility... born there and played professional with New Haven Eagles in 1933-34... back with Gravenhurst Indians 1935-37. Height, five feet eleven inches... weight, 178... age, 28.

Burk's Falls Heard From HENRY ALBERT "SEA GULL" HARMON—Born in Burk's Falls and proud of it... 24 years old... weighs 155 pounds... exactly five and a half feet tall... plays left wing... has become more crafty since his association with Gravenhurst Indians for whom he played from 1932 to 1937... Open Season for "Rabbit" EDWARD "RABBIT" MYERS—The last of the Gravenhurst quartette... small but dynamic... plays centre and shoots right... 26 years old... scales 140... sixty-six inches tall... played with Washago R.A.R. 1931-32 and Gravenhurst Indians 1932-37.

Was on European Tour LESTER G. "SPARKS" WHITE—Played with some smart hockey clubs before hitting the Porcupine Camp... with Ottawa Montagnards from 1928-33... toured Europe with Ottawa All Stars 1932-33... played with Ottawa Rideaus 1933-34... was the centre ice man for Montagnards and played with Eddie Goodfellow and Hec Kline, now of Detroit Red Wings in the N.H.L... weight, 180 pounds... 28 years old... six feet tall.

Don't Take a Chance on Having Cancer

Noted Specialist Gives Helpful Advice in Regard to Prevalent Disease.

Approximately one of every six women and one of every eight men over forty years of age have cancer, according to Dr. C. C. Little, one of America's outstanding cancer authorities. Dr. Little, who is managing director of the American Society for the Control of Cancer, made this statement at a lecture in Eaton Auditorium sponsored by the Toronto Branch of the Health League of Canada.

Interest in cancer was demonstrated by the fact that the large auditorium could not accommodate all who came to hear him, several hundred being turned away. This keen interest was further evidenced by the great number of questions asked at the close.

While pointing out the prevalence of cancer, Dr. Little outlined the great advances made in research and declared that half of the 150,000 deaths in the United States and 11,000 deaths in Canada in one year could be prevented through the use of intelligence and courage.

Early cancer, he said, never kills anyone but because of fear and ignorance it is allowed to become malignant. Early cancer is not a disease but an extraordinary healthy unit, which grows so fast that it eventually disorganizes the entire human system. Different types grow at different rates and so far it has been impossible to make cancer cells stop growing save by surgery, radium or x-rays or a combination of them.

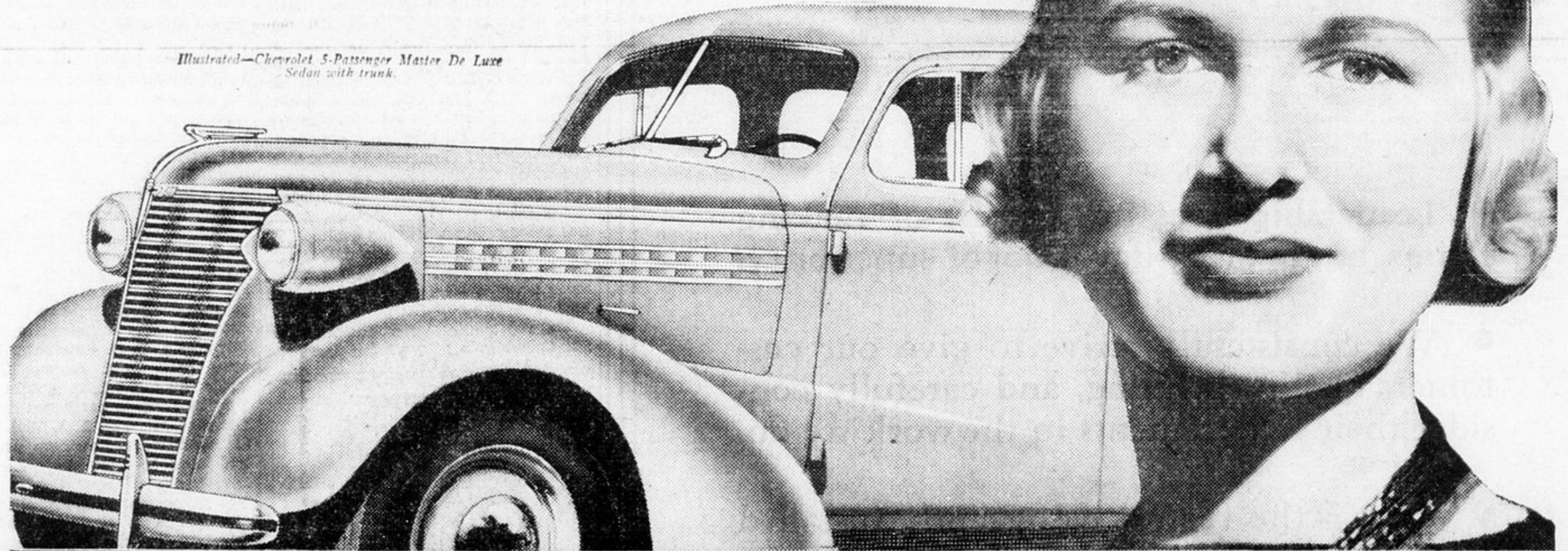
Kirkland Lake Also to Have English Classes for Adults
