### Sister St. Francis Buried at Pembroke

Died on Monday at the St. Mary's Hospital After Being Ill Some Months.

Reverend Sister St. Francis of the community of the Grey Sisters of the Immaculate Conception of Pembroke, Ontario, and for the past two and a half years stationed at the Grey Sisters Convent, 116 Spruce street north, died at St. Mary's hospital Monday at 11.30 p.m., fortified by the last rites of the Church.

Sister St. Francis had been in ill health for some time, and was a patient in the hospital since January 5th. Before her entrance into religion on February 18, 1929, she was Miss Mary O'Shaughnessy, of Eganville Parish. She was in the 32nd year of her age and the ninth of her religious life.

She is mourned by her mother, Mrs. Elizabeth O'Shaughnessy, and a sister, Mrs. Leslie Chapman, both of Toronto, three brothers, John of Temagami, Michael of Earlton Junction, and Martin of Chicago.

Following funeral services at Nativity Church at 1.15 p.m. Tuesday, at which a large congregation consisting of the Grey Sisters, the Sister of St. Mary's hospital, and the Sisters of the Assumption, pupils of Holy Family School, members of the C.W.L. and local Council of the Knights of Columbus paid fitting tribute to the revered Sister, the remains were taken to Pembroke on the 2.05 train accompanied by Reverend Mother Estella, Superior General of the Grey Sisters, and Reverend Sister M. Canisius, local superior, and her brother, John. Funeral service was conducted by Rev. Fr. MacManus and Rev. Fr. O'Gorman, and Rev. Fr. Martindale and Rev. Fr. Theriault were in the sanctuary.

Requiem High Mass was chanted in the chapel of the Motherhouse, Pembroke, at 9 o'clock Wednesday morning, followed by interment in the Community cemetery.

### Jubilee of Cobalt Church on March 17

Rev. Fr. Caufield Makes Announcement To-day.

Cobalt, Ont., Feb. 17, 1938—Special to The Advance. St. Patrick's Roman Catholic church here will celebrate the silver jubilee of its founding on St. Patrick's Day. Rev. Father Caufield parish priest announced this week. Arrangements for the keeping of the anniversary have been in progress for some time past, but the date was decided upon definitely only within the last few days, as various matters had to be taken into consideration. ### New Radio Machine Will Supplement Newspapers

The National Association of Broadcasters saw a demonstration this week of a machine said to be capable of delivering a small newspaper into the home by radio.

Designed as a supplement to existing daily newspapers, the contrivance is a radio set intermediate between present sound sets and future television machines.

Sponsors explained it can transmit letter-size pages of type, drawings, cartoons and photographs into homes and print them on a roll of paper. For example, the receiver could be set to receive news during the early morning hours and provide a small morning paper for the breakfast table.

The picture or news page to be sent is placed on a rotating cylinder. While the cylinder turns, it is scanned by a tiny beam of light. Variations in the light intensity falling on a photo-electric tube are transformed into small changes in an electrical current. These are then transformed into radio waves.

In the receiver this process is reversed. The radio wave variations are converted into electrical vibrations which move a single strand of piano wire up and down. When the wire moves on the receiving cylinder it presses against a sheet of ordinary carbon paper, tracing the picture or news on white paper.

It is expected that these receivers, plus an ordinary radio receiver in the same cabinet, can be sold for about \$150 when they are built in large quantities, according to Charles J. Young, research engineer of the Radio Corporation of America, who developed the system.

At present, he added, newspapers in Fresno and Sacramento, Calif.; Spokane, Washington; Buffalo, N.Y.; Milwaukee, Wis., and Portland, Ore., have ordered both sending and receiving equipment and the Federal Communications Commission has granted experimental licenses to several others.

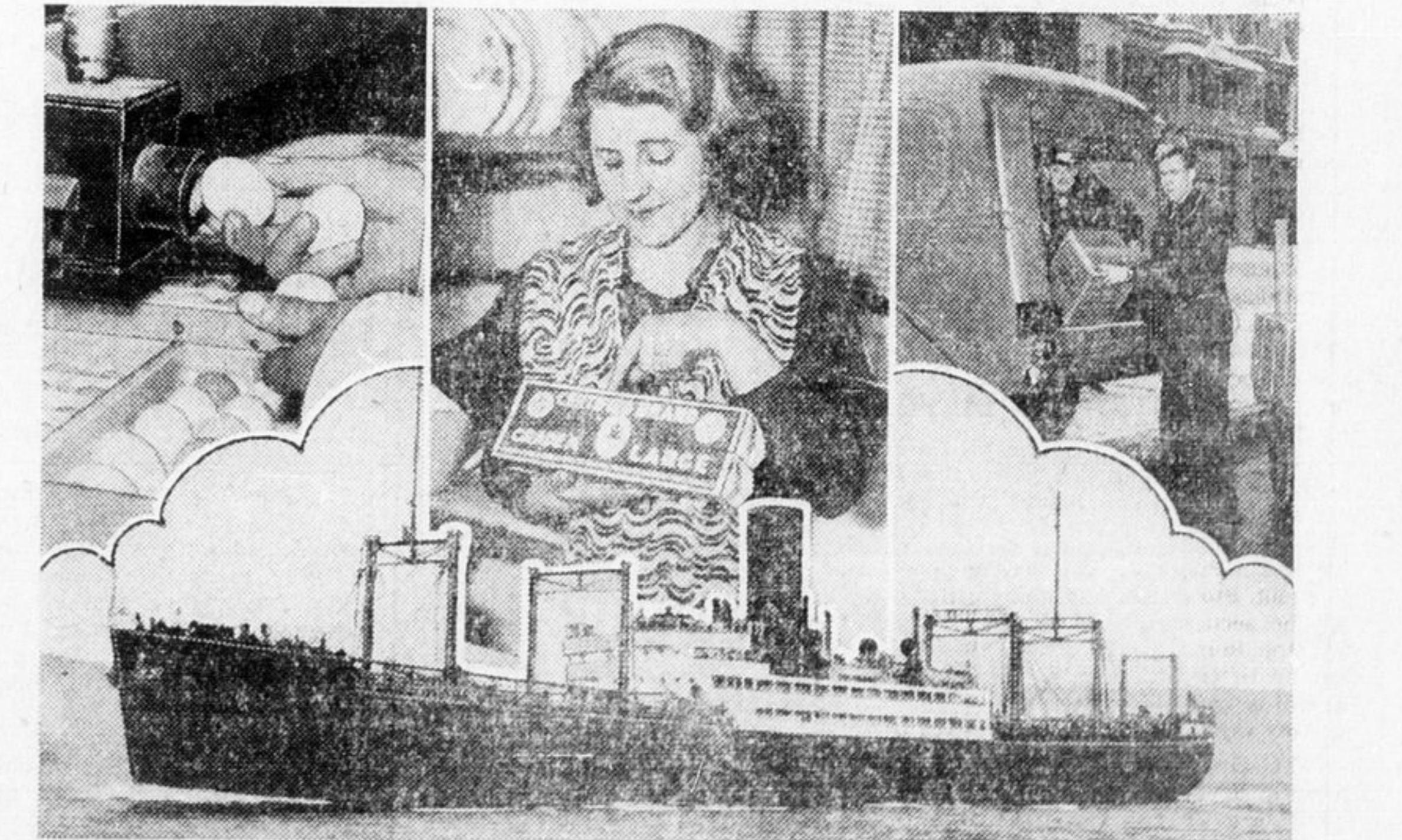

NO POLITICAL CONTROL



A new branch of Canadian commerce has been established in the shipping of winter-produced eggs to Great Britain, a move officially inaugurated January 13 when the Canadian Pacific freighter Beaverbrae sailed from Saint John with the first earl shipment. A week before the sistership Beaverford carried a sample shipment overseas, the first Canadian winter-produced eggs ever sent to Great Britain. Up till then only "storage eggs" had been shipped, England receiving her fresh eggs from Continental countries. Canadian government officials stated this progressive step would boost the Canadian product above the standard of Australian eggs and bring them into competition with poultry supplies from Denmark, drawing better prices for Canadian farmers.

She said: "They're delicious; much better than the foreign imported eggs. With Canadian bacon they form a wonderful meal!"
