Too Much Power Turned on at Larder Lake Sunday

Larder Lake, Feb. 16—There are a great many people in town who are just a little skeptical of the old saying, "It's the early bird which gets the worm." In fact, they are beginning to think they know a little about the worm's position.
 Early risers of Sunday morning are still replacing light bulbs, getting new tubes for radios, frantically telephoning service companies for electric range repairs and generally getting hot under the collar because their electrical appliances are burnt out.
 The sudden scourge of burnt out electric fixtures came Sunday morning when for some reason a 220-volt load discharged through the 110-volt system. For a minute there were 220 volts flowing through instead of 110.
 The extra power was on just long enough to do the damage, the full extent of which has not been determined as yet. At the Larder Lake Hotel, nearly 30 electric light bulbs were burnt out. Constable McLelland of the Provincial Police was one who had his radio turned on at the time, and all the tubes were destroyed.
