Wadsworth Fights To-Night For 160-Pound Boxing Title

Former Timmins Boy Will Oppose Irvin Pease, Whom He Knocked Out in Previous Bout, for Canadian Middleweight Championship. Got His Early Training Here from Art Leonard.

The backneyed phrase, "Timmins boy makes good" is a suitable introduction to the announcement coming from Toronto that Len Wadsworth, well known in local boxing circles, will oppose Irvin Pease for the middleweight championship of Canada in the semi-final of Jack Corcoran's show at Maple Leaf Gardens to-night.

Wadsworth's rise to champion hip class has been meteoric after a more or less mediocre start in the right game several years ago. Incidentally he got his early training in boxing at a school conducted here by Art Leonard, now in charge of the beverage room at the Russell Hotel at the corner of Wilson avenue and Mountjoy street. In his appearance here he showed that he could both give and take it and was a promising looking youngster when he journeyed to Southern Ontario to seek new worlds to conquer. While defeated in his first few starts the experience he gained has stood him in good stead until to-day he is rated as top-notch in the 160-pound class.

Art Leonard, who started Wadsworth as a fighter, was also at the top in his day, at one time holding the championship of the British army and navy, one of the most prized titles in Great Britain.

After leaving Timmins, Wadsworth journeyed to Hamilton where he trained at the Poly-Technical School under other capable tutors. Since that time he has made his home in Hamilton.

To-night's bout is the second time that Wadsworth and Pease have come together. Pease was champion until Wadsworth knocked him out a few weeks ago. Pease claimed that it was a fluke but the Canadian Boxing and Wrestling Federation declared the title vacant and named Pease and Wadsworth as the two contenders for it.

Pease and Wadsworth will meet in the eight-round semi-final to the Baby

Yack and Spider Armstrong main bout for the Canadian bantam championship. Both boys have an impressive record and it is not regarded as unlikely that a knockout might decide the bout.

Wadsworth is former Canadian amateur middleweight champion and also represented Canada at the British Empire Games in London, England, losing out in the final. Timmins fans will be looking forward with great interest to to-night's battle and will be in there pulling for the local lad to come through and win the crown.

Defeated Pamour Dynamiters Here Saturday Night By 3-2

Ab. Kerr Scores Two Goals as Coniaurum Defeat Highly-Rated Pamour Team. Second Game of Series Will be Played in South Porcupine To-night. Flyers Win Game in Second Period.

Playing brilliant hockey before a large crowd, Coniaurum Flyers won the first game of the Mines League play-offs Saturday night at Timmins arena, defeating Pamour Dynamiters by the score of 3-2. The fans were treated to a high class exhibition and Coniaurum the Frank Merriwell club of the league, kicked the dope can for a loop when they polished off the highly-rated Pamour crew. The second game takes place to-night in South Porcupine and Pamour have to win or bow out of the picture. The winner of the series will meet South Porcupine Monarchs in the first round of the N.O.H.A. play-offs.

It was Ab. Kerr that assumed the hero role in Saturday's contest, scoring two of his team's three goals and playing the best game of hockey he has turned in this year. It was Kerr's first career goal that started Coniaurum on the road to victory and the first twenty minutes ended with the Flyers in the lead 1-0.

Pamour tied the score early in the second but Coniaurum replied with two more before the period came to an end. The last twenty minutes was a sizzling session with Pamour scoring the only goal recorded, falling one short of tying the score.

McCoomb and Young drew penalties in the early minutes of the first period but neither team was able to capitalize on the one-man advantage. Joe McNulty was in once, drew Bentley out and then let a hard one go that hit the goalie's pads. Tracy was in all alone for Pamour but Parades made a brilliant save of a hard drive. Booth and Jeffries were chased together for high sticking and it was during their absence that Ab. Kerr drilled the puck into the Pamour goal on a pass from Jo-Jo Tremblay. A few minutes later Jerry Neddow missed a perfect chance to score when he cverskated the puck with an open net staring him in the face.

Pamour turned on with everything they could muster from the start of the second period and it was just before the five minute mark that "Count" Woods tied the score on a solo effort. With the score deadlocked, Coniaurum opened up a powerhouse of action with Ab. Kerr getting his second goal of the night. Kerr checked Hannebury after a face off near the Pamour blue line.

Just past the halfway mark Dixon put Coniaurum two goals up when he scored on a combined play with Jack Young and Joe McNulty. Some mistake in the timing brought forward an argument and after leaving the ice once the two teams returned for a few seconds and completed the unexpired time without any further scoring.

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Timmins High School Hockey Team Defeats Kirkland Lake

Trample Visitors 10-3 in Sudden Death Game Here Friday Night to Earn Right to Meet North Bay College for Northern Ontario Secondary Schools Championship.

Outclassing their opponents from start to finish, Timmins High School hockey team defeated Kirkland Lake 10-3 in a sudden death contest at Timmins arena Friday night to decide the team to meet North Bay College for the championship of the Northern Ontario Secondary Schools Association. The winner between Timmins and North Bay will represent Northern Ontario in the provincial play-offs at Ottawa on March 10 and 11.

The Timmins team is almost completely made up of players who play on various teams in the local Junior "B" group and as an all-star aggregation will have a good chance to go through to the championship.

Stonehouse and Theriault were the dynamo of the Timmins attack, each getting three goals and an assist. Poirier who played right wing on the line with Theriault and Hangisto, also turned in a valuable night's work getting two goals and passing for two others.

The Kirkland students couldn't fathom the fast passing attack of the Timmins lads and were in the dog house all the way. Stonehouse started the parade less than a minute after the game started and before the period ended had rifed in two more along with another pair by Poirier and Theriault. H. Murray scored the only Kirkland Lake goal of the period, which ended with Timmins leading 5-1.

Timmins outscored the Kirkland crew in the second 3-1. Hangisto, Theriault and Baker scoring for Timmins and Wilder for Kirkland Lake. The local students took things easy

in the last period but Poirier and Theriault cracked down with two fast goals with McNaughton scoring the Lake with four minutes to go.

Wilder, at centre ice for Kirkland Lake, was the pick of the visitors, who seemed to lack experience.
