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Coniaurum Flyers Champions of Porcupine Mines League Defeating Pamour Team 8-2

Winners Take Final Series From Dynamiters in Two Straight Games. Free-for-All Fight in Third Period of Monday Night's Game. Joe Tremblay Stars for Flyers, Scoring Four Goals.

Coniaurum Flyers, the surprise team of the year, won the Porcupine Mines League championship on Monday night when they defeated Pamour Dynamiters at South Porcupine rink by the one-sided score of 8-2. The series was played on a best-two-out-of-three basis, Coniaurum winning the first game of the finals last Saturday night by the narrow margin of 3-2.

While the hockey was far from brilliant, the game was packed with action and a stormy last period ended in a general free-for-all with most of the players of both teams mixing it up. Both of Coniaurum, and McCoomb, lanky Pamour defence man, who follows boxing as a sideline, touched off the fireworks when they started to mix it up near the Pamour blue line. This was the signal for all hands to drop sticks and start swinging punches. The ice was littered with players, gloves and a handful of spectators who swarmed over the boards to get into the fray. All the players emerged from the conflict practically unscathed but a couple of the spectators stopped a few hard rights. Percy Hammett of elephant training fame, who has been keeping the Pamour crew in condition all year, came out of the battle with blood dripping from the side of his face while one of the other battlers who had jumped out of the crowd stopped a hard right from Russ Bentley, Pamour goalie, that took all the fight out of him in short order. A fan standing alongside the boards who grabbed one of the players had a hockey stick applied over the side of his head and his aspirations to fight vanished rapidly. When the referees finally got things squared away, the game continued without any penalties being handed out as a result of the scrap.

White, of Pamour, had been given a misconduct penalty for talking back to referee Raybold several minutes earlier and Count Woods and Hank Hannebury were also galed for talking back at the same time.

Coniaurum were without the services of their star performer, Joe McNulty, who is out of the game with an injured back and for a while it was thought that Jo-Jo Tremblay might also be on the sidelines with an injured leg. A chiropractor was rushed into service and after giving Jo-Jo a going over, pronounced him ready for the fray. The attention seemed to do him good and before the night was over he had scored four goals.

The game was a queer combination of good and bad hockey. In the first period Coniaurum carried the play almost continuously but couldn't beat Bentley in the Pamour goal, who was kicking rubber into the clear from every angle. Parades in the Coniaurum net had a more or less soft time of it during the first period and had comparatively few hard shots to stop. The last two periods might be summed up by saying that Pamour forced the issue all the way and Coniaurum got the goals. The Flyers were poison when they got in close and every goal that beat Bentley was really deserved. There wasn't a lucky goal all night and both Parades and Bentley gave a fine exhibition of net minding.

After a scoreless first period, Both started the Coniaurum onslaught just before the five minute mark in the second when he took a pass from Jerry Neddown from behind the goal and scored. LaRoche, of Pamour, was serving a penalty at the time. Tremblay was right in on top of the Pamour goal a few minutes later but Bentley made a smart sprawling save. Gerry McCoomb tied the score for Pamour on a nice play with Tracy, and Pamour put on a siege. Play traversed from one end of the rink to the other with both teams checking hard and carrying their sticks a little higher than the rules allow. Neither team asked or gave any quarter and the rearguards on both teams were handing out stiff body checks at every turn. With just over six minutes to go Coniaurum went on

a scoring spree with Birkett putting the Flyers ahead on a rink-length rush with Jack Young. Joe Tremblay did almost the same thing and scored on a pass from Booth with Coniaurum throwing on a five man attack. Myers and Tremblay were penalized for nigh-sticking but the latter was back on the ice before the period ended and with seven seconds to go scored on a solo effort that was pretty to watch. Bodied by both defence men as he went through the Pamour defence, Tremblay recovered the puck and drove a hard backhand drive into the nets behind Bentley that got a big hand from the crowd. When the gong sounded Coniaurum were in the lead 4-1.

The last period was almost an identical repetition of the second, with Pamour having the majority of the play and the minority in goals. "Ab" Kerr increased the Coniaurum lead by another five minutes after the period started, when he picked the puck off Count Woods' stick at the Pamour blue line and went right in and drew Bentley out of position and handed the puck into the goal. The red light flashed again for the Flyers when Dixon scored on a pass from Jack Young. "Sea Gull" Harmon revived the waning hopes of the Dynamiters about three minutes later when he scored on a pass from Hank Hannebury during a ganging attack. Disputing a decision of referee Raybold, White was given a ten-minute misconduct penalty and before the game resumed Hannebury and Count Woods were also given a ten-minute sentence for having too much to say. Soon after play resumed, with Myers in the penalty box for tripping, Tremblay scored again for Coniaurum, Ab Kerr supplying the pass. Kerr was penalized just before the fight took place and just after the fracas Jack Young was sent off, leaving Coniaurum two men short. Not to be outdone however or let the lack of a few players worry him, Tremblay went through alone to score the last goal of the night with only ten seconds to go.

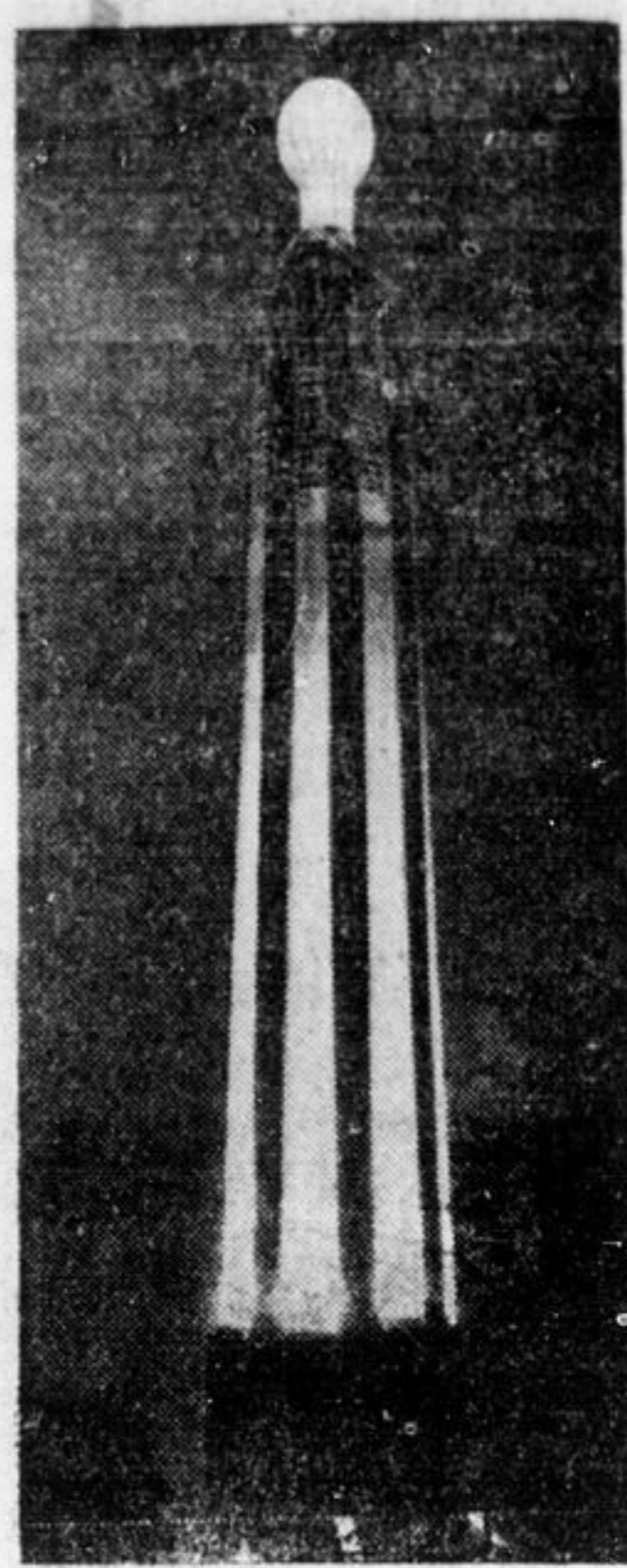

Tower Dedicated

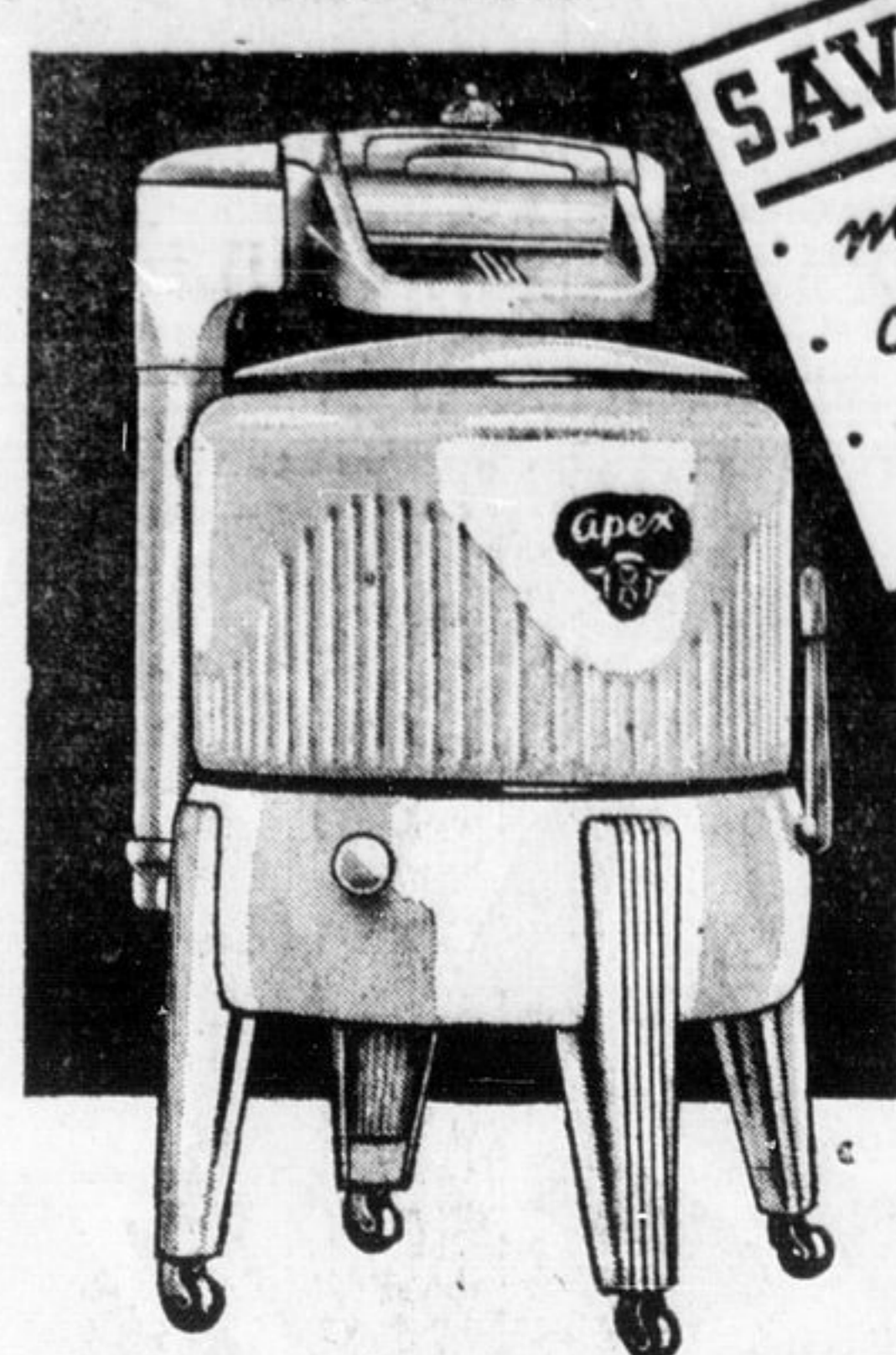
