

# South Porcupine Monarchs Eliminate Coniaurum Flyers

## Mines League Winners Crack In Fourth Game in Six Days

South Porcupine Team Win Both Games of Home-and-Home Series and Take Round 10-6, Winning Friday Night's Game by Close Margin of 5-4. Monarchs Proceed in N.O.H.A. Playdowns.

Coniaurum Flyers, champions of the Porcupine Mines League, were eliminated in the first round of the N.O.H.A. intermediate playdowns Friday night when they dropped the second game of their play-off series to South Porcupine Monarchs by a score of 5-4. The Monarchs won the first game of the play-off last Wednesday night in Timmins 5-2 to take the round 10-6.

While the Flyers never quit trying until the final gong bowed them out of the contention for this season, they were beaten by a better team. The Monarchs have a smart passing attack and a bunch of lads that can skate and back check like leeches. In fact the Monarchs appear to be the smartest intermediate team that the Porcupine has produced in some time and the whole camp will be behind them as they go on in quest of the N.O.H.A. championship.

To the Flyers, under the guiding hand of Bill Shields, goes all the credit in the world for the showing they have made this year. Undecided at the first of the year if they had a team strong enough to enter the Mines League, they finally signed the papers and started from scratch to get their club together. They were given scant attention in pre-season forecasts but when the pay-off came and the last card had been played, Coniaurum had knocked off the smart Pamour team in the finals with a display of courage and team spirit that had previously carried them past McIntyre and Buffalo-Ankerite. They were far from lucky in winning the league honours as the scoring records show Joe McNulty and Jack Young in first and second place, with the latter also winning the good sportsmanship trophy. Coniaurum showed themselves one of the cleanest teams in the league and even with the going tough never resorted to dirt. They will be back next year and with this season under their belts can be counted on to be stronger than ever when the first practice is called.

The Flyers were a third team when Friday night's game started. It was the fourth game they had played in six days. Joe McNulty, who was out of the line-up with an injured back in the first game, returned to the fray Friday night but not until he had been strapped with yards of adhesive tape as a safeguard against further injury. Jo-Jo Tremblay, who has been playing a star role since joining the Flyers in mid-season, was off the team, being confined to bed with influenza.

The Monarchs on the other hand seemed to be right in the pink of condition and will go out into the next round of the playdowns with their team unhampered by injuries of any kind. Ollie Proulx has a nice club and under his direction should go places this year.

When the game started on Friday night the Monarchs were three goals up after winning the first game in Timmins 5-2. A little thing like being behind didn't worry the Flyers who started proceedings playing a four-man attack. It was not until Hume, of South Porcupine, was penalized for tripping, that the Flyers got the break. Ganging the Monarchs' goal, Jack Young snaggared another of those goals from behind the net that he specializes in to cut the South Porcupine lead to two. A minute later McKay caught Coniaurum with every man up and taking a loose puck broke away with only the goalie left to beat. Paradis made a sensational stop and the Flyers recovered. It was from a face-off that Coniaurum snared the next goal that left them only one behind on the score on the night. Both grabbed the puck and started gearward from just outside the blue line. Cattarello bodied him but as he spun around he managed to pass the puck to the ever-durable Ab Kerr who hog-tied Patzer with a bullet drive to the corner of the net. Just in passing it might be said that Kerr has more finish around the net and a more deadly shot than any player in the Mines League. He seldom makes mistakes when he gets in there and has the happy faculty of making the goalie make his play before he lets go. The period ended without any further scoring and it seemed that Coniaurum might come through with another of those Cinder-

ella recoveries that have made them famous this year.

As the second period started the Monarchs got on a withering attack but it was not until just before the half-way mark that "Pat" Patzer roared through the Coniaurum rear-guard and taking a pass from McCann, scored South Porcupine's first goal of the night. From this point on the Flyers seemed to fade and in quick succession the Monarchs rapped in three more. Hume, Patterson and Cattarello doing the scoring. McCann, Gagnon and Thomas getting assists. Cattarello was a standout with his sweeping poke checks that broke up numerous Coniaurum rushes with Patterson playing a brilliant game all the way.

With their back to the wall in the last session, Coniaurum again came to the front and while they were five goals down they never eased the pressure. Playing five men up Joe McNulty battled in a loose puck from a scramble in front of the Monarchs' goal to cut the deficit to four but twenty-five seconds later Patterson got his third goal of the night on a pass from McCann that restored the five-goal lead of the Monarchs. Still undaunted Coniaurum kept plugging and Dundas scored a well-earned goal on a sparkling play with Jack Birkett. The period was only half gone but the Monarchs took no chances and played more or less defensive hockey until the end of the game, neither team being able to score.

The best of feeling existed between the teams during the play-off and as the gong sounded to end the game the Coniaurum players were the first to congratulate the Monarchs and wish them every success in their quest for the N.O.H.A. championship.

## Timmins High School Hockey Team Eliminated by Scollard

North Bay Club Swamps Local Squad in Sudden Death Game Here Saturday Night for Northern Ontario Championship by Score of 11-1. Winners Play for Provincial Title.

One goal in the last period saved Timmins High and Vocational School from a whitewash at Timmins arena Saturday night as Scollard Hall, of North Bay, won the Northern Ontario Secondary Schools Association Championship in a sudden death game by the lopsided score of 11-1.

The Scollard team, which is coached by Fred McKenna, will represent Northern Ontario at the Provincial play-offs to be held in Ottawa on March 11 and 12. The team was accompanied on Saturday night by Father F. M. Weller, director of athletics at Scollard Hall.

The North Bay team, which is one of the smartest age-limit squads seen here in some time, started the scoring in the first period after eight minutes of play, Grant banging in a hard shot on a pass from Bumbaco. Before the period ended they had scored two more to take the lead 3-0. The second period saw the Scollard machine in high gear and Schroeter in the Timmins goal was given a sizzling time as the visitors rattled in five goals in succession. There was no comparison between the two teams and the few breaks that the Timmins team made were turned aside by Lamarche in the North Bay goal who was a standout performer. Coasting to an easy victory Scollard Hall accounted for three more goals in the last period with Ron Lake getting the lone counter for Timmins on a scramble in front of the North Bay goal after taking a pass from Fraser.

Grant, North Bay centre man, who accounted for six of his team's goals is one of the most likely looking prospects seen in this ballwick in ages. Not only is he a deadly shot but gave a high class exhibition of skating, stick-handling and most important of all, hockey brains. It was rumoured that he may complete his education at St. Michael's college in Toronto before turning professional with Toronto Maple Leafs, who are said to have first call on his services.

The other players on the team, several of whom, along with Grant, play for the North Bay Trappers in the Junior "A" series, combine into a smart hockey club and will no doubt have a better than average chance to win the Provincial title at the series in Ottawa at the end of the week.
