## South End Fire Chief to Attend Convention

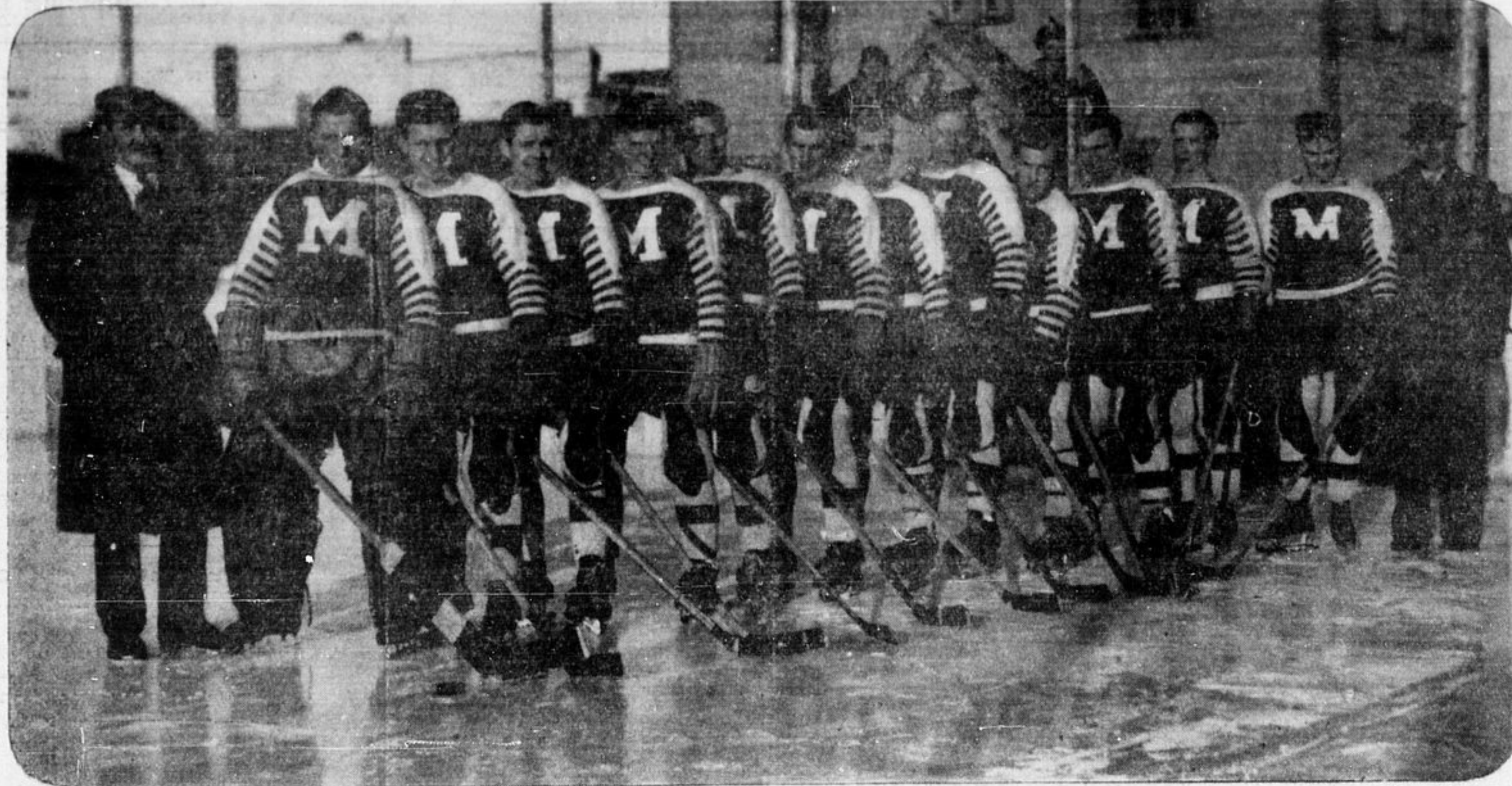
Other News from South Porcupine and the Dome.

South Porcupine, March 15, 1938.—(Special to The Advance)—Maxwell Smith, Fire Chief, and second vice-presidents of the Dominion Fire Chiefs' Association, leaves on Thursday to attend a meeting of the executive and directors of the Dominion Association to be held on Friday in the King Edward hotel, Toronto. **Police Court.** Three men were fined \$5 and costs in court here for having no clearance lights on trucks. One drunk paid \$10 and costs. One case of reckless driving was withdrawn, and a case of assault which involved damage to a silver fox fur and coat, was remanded till next week.

A man was bound over to sign a bond to keep the peace for a year. He had driven a car along the T. & N. O. tracks, which is a criminal offence, and must not be permitted. He admitted guilt but said he had no means of getting his car out except by the track, and he had purchased the car to assist him to earn a livelihood.

A case of a Railroad street lady obstructing the police in the performance of their duty resulted in a fine of \$100 and costs. Police raided the house, knocked for admission, and the lady came to the door, did not open it, but rushed to the back of the house shouting "police" whereupon the lock was forced and the constables entered. They found beer bottles, but no direct evidence of sale of liquor.

The lady's defence was that she was insufficiently clothed when the knock came, and she repaired to the bedroom to put on more garments when the police entered. However, her plea of modesty did not prevent the fine, the lady having been up before the magistrate more times than she could answer when she was asked to state them.

Two juvenile cases—in both of which the children were acquitted of theft and promised to be good boys in future—were also heard in closed court.

Huntingdon Gleaner—A retired police officer has been robbed of his life-savings by a mouse at Moradabad, United Provinces, India. As he distrusts banks, he kept a neatly tied bundle of currency notes, amounting to \$3,000 locked in a wooden box. Every day he used to examine the lock to make sure the money was safe. Then, one day, he wanted a few of the notes and opened the box. To his horror, he found a little heap of torn fragments of paper. A mouse had bored a hole in the box and destroyed the notes.

**TOWNSHIP OF TISDALE By-Law Number**  
A By-law providing for the closing and stopping up of certain portions of Crawford Street, Strachan Avenue, Quebec Avenue, and of "Walter Lane," all in the Settlement of South Porcupine in the Township of Tisdale; and authorizing the leasing, selling or transferring such stopped-up portions of the highways aforesaid.

WHEREAS it is necessary to enlarge the Public School Grounds in the Settlement of South Porcupine in the Township of Tisdale by adding to the lands now owned by the Public School Board of School Section No. 1, of the Township of Tisdale in the District of Cochrane, certain lands adjacent thereto;

AND WHEREAS proper notice of this By-law has been given by publication and otherwise according to the provisions of The Municipal Act in that behalf;

AND WHEREAS due consideration has been given and compensation made where proper, to provide for the requirements of the owners of the soil or surface rights of lands adjacent to or near the streets and highways hereinafter mentioned, and of those who might be affected by the closing thereof to vehicular and pedestrian traffic;

AND WHEREAS adequate means of egress and ingress by road to all lands abutting on the highways or parts of highways hereinafter mentioned have been and are provided;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF TISDALE, as a By-law thereof, as follows: 1. The following highways, parts of highways and lanes shall be, as and from the passing and approval of this By-law, and the same are hereby closed and stopped up to vehicular and pedestrian traffic, namely:—

(1) All that portion of Crawford Street as shown on Plan M-10 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, from Golden Avenue to Strachan Avenue, both as shown on the said Plan; excepting the East six feet thereof running Southerly from Golden Avenue, aforesaid, a distance of Eighty-one feet, more or less.

(2) All that portion of Strachan Avenue, as shown on Plan M-14 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane which is abutted on the North by Lot One Hundred and Seventy (170) as shown on Plan M-14 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, and by the West Twenty-five feet (25 ft.) of Lot Number One Hundred and Sixty-nine (169) as shown on the said Plan, and which is abutted on the South by the West Seventy-five feet (75 ft.) of Lot Number One Hundred and Ninety-three (193), as shown on the said Plan.

(3) All that Portion of Strachan Avenue as shown on Plan M-10 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane which is abutted on the South by Lot Number One Hundred and Sixty-one (161) as shown on the said Plan, and by the West Sixty feet (60 ft.) of Lot Number One Hundred and Fifty-six (156) as shown on the said Plan, and which is abutted on the North by Crawford Street as shown on the said Plan and by the West forty-four feet (44 ft.) of Lot Number One Hundred and Thirty-one (131) as shown on the said Plan.

(4) All that portion of Quebec Avenue as shown on Plan M-20 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane which is abutted on the North by Lots Numbers One Hundred and Sixty-five (165), One Hundred and Sixty-six (166), One Hundred and Sixty-seven (167), and One Hundred and Sixty-eight (168) all as shown on Plan M-10 (Sudbury)

now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, and by Lot Number Two Hundred and Nineteen (219) as shown on Plan M-14 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane. (5) All that portion of the lane known as "Walter Lane" as shown on Plan M-20 (Sudbury) now deposited in the Office of Land Titles at Cochrane, which is abutted on the East of Lot Number One (1) as shown on the said Plan.

all of which said highways or parts of highways and lanes are situated in the said Township of Tisdale in the said District of Cochrane. 2. Any and all of the surface rights of the lands in paragraph 1. hereof particularly described shall be, from and after the passing and approval of this By-law, and the same are hereby declared to be disposable by the Corporation of the Township of Tisdale by way of transfer, pledge, lease or otherwise as the Council of the said Corporation in its discretion may deem expedient.

## Meeting of Council Township of Tisdale

Many Matters Before Council of Township on Monday Night.

South Porcupine, March 15, 1938.—(Special to The Advance)—A council meeting at which Reeve Evans and all councillors were present was held on Monday night.

In the absence of Clerk F. C. Evans Mr. G. T. S. Train was appointed to act as clerk. Correspondence was read including a request for repairs to the public library and from the township of Whitney an account of snowploughing, both of which were left over for another meeting.

Mrs. James, who claims that an accident which was caused by slipping on the sidewalk, whereby her wrist was broken, asked for compensation. The Insurance Company is to investigate. Engineer Sutcliffe's report that no further installation of waterworks can be proceeded with toward the east beyond those already in place led to the following resolution:—Mr. Huot is to be notified that council will not pass any more plans in the low land, and any plan he blocks out should be presented to council for approval before lots are sold.

Mr. Popovitch appeared before council regarding his water account, but reduction was not allowed. A reduction of \$10 was, however, allowed in the case of Mrs. P. Kengrow, of Schumacher.

Boris Levinson approached council requesting that his water account be cancelled. This was not granted. Mr. E. Jones attended the meeting, re a community hall. Mr. Lieberman asked council if they had committed themselves re town improvements, and suggested that council appoint a committee to report.

The council's attitude was that the first move should be made by the rate-payers when the matter should have further consideration. Mr. Turner wanted to know if the main thoroughfares were going to be paved in keeping with the government road improvement, particularly Golden Avenue.

The clerk was instructed to report on a relief application. Fire Chief Smith was granted time off (a day and a half) to attend an executive meeting of the Dominion Fire Chiefs' Association in Toronto. Mr. C. Anderson stated he had received a quotation on a release valve from Marshall-Ecclestone for No. 2 pumping station and purchase was approved by council.

## Cochrane Protests Radio License Fee

Citizens to Keep Log of Reception to Show Lack of Service.

Cochrane, March 15.—Protesting the increase in radio license fee, Cochrane Board of Trade, at the regular meeting Monday evening, passed a resolution in which they express disapproval with the board, until such time as the district can depend on reception of Canadian programmes.

In an effort to show the government and Broadcasting Corporation that their grievance is in line and in view of many complaints, a complete survey is to be instituted, by which a number of citizens will keep a log of radio reception in the district and the results will be submitted to the government. The new station CBL is found useless on account of poor daylight reception and interference from American stations in the evening. Northern stations are too weak to serve the Cochrane area.
