Reply to Letter in Monday's Advance

While Discounting Bible, Letter Proves How Badly Needed its Teachings are.

Schumacher, March 29th, 1938. Editor, Porcupine Advance, Timmins, Ont.

Dear Sir:—Regarding Mr. Wm. Stewart's reply to a recent letter of mine published in The Porcupine Advance. Mr. Stewart implies that I ennobled Bernard Shaw and H. G. Wells because of their dispensing of their illustrious intelligence in defence or interest of Russia's constitutional practices and its dictatorial administrators.

Such, however, is not the case. Both these illustrious intellectuals had established themselves long before they came to the defence of Russia, and posterity will judge as to their greatness.

Soviet Russia, I would venture to assert, is no more important to the realists than Tanganyika, Nacaragua, or Timbuctoo.

However, after visiting Russia in recent years, Wells and Shaw actually had the temerity to see visible indications of concrete progress. As this was quite contrary to the prevailing beliefs engendered by enemies of the proletariat, their views were considered as heresy.

Still, nevertheless, neither Wells nor Shaw ever gave any indication of any desire to move to Moscow and frankly neither have I.

Nevertheless I still insist that it is farcical and idiotic to deny the transformation of a backward and illiterate nation to its present status as one of the great powers of the earth. There is no responsible intellectual on earth with the temerity to deny that Russia to-day is a far greater nation than it was previous to the revolution.

We should not allow propaganda and prejudice to blind us to the benefits of a system even if we do not approve of it.

As for Mr. Wm. Stewart insinuating that Wells and Shaw are in the pay of Moscow, that contention does not credit to his undoubted sincerity and intelligence. Frankly I wouldn't mind getting a cheque from Moscow for writing what I honestly believe to be the truth.

However, I have a suspicion that Moscow has very little surplus wealth to export to so-called agitators.

Mr. Stewart enquires: "Why I do not recommend the Bible to readers?"—presumably instead of Wells' Outline of History.

The cold cruel facts are that the Bible, in many respects an admirable book, plays a very small part in world affairs. To-day the law of the jungle prevails in national and international affairs. Any Canadian citizen guilty of the heinous crime of being broke can be incarcerated as a vagrant. To-day that is the unforgivable sin.

On the international horizon we see duplicity, deceit double-cross and death. The nations if they would could terminate criminal aggressiveness if they would sacrifice that filthy lucre profit Japan stages a criminal aggression upon China—in violation of all international laws. Like vultures the great powers of the earth magnanimously supply the miscreants with all the accessories necessary to subjugate its victim—for a price.

Canada exports lead, nickel, copper and aluminum—not caring one iota the destination of the cargo, so long as money is forthcoming. The other powers do likewise, and automatically become accessories of the rapine of China.

Mention of embargoes and sanctions are received with horror and delirium tremens. What! Sacrifice profit to the sanctity of human life? How ridiculous!

All this goes to show the small part religion plays in life to-day. Action and not insipid platitudes is the only true criterion of religion.

Let us put our own house in order—and leave the diabolical communists to work out their own salvation.
