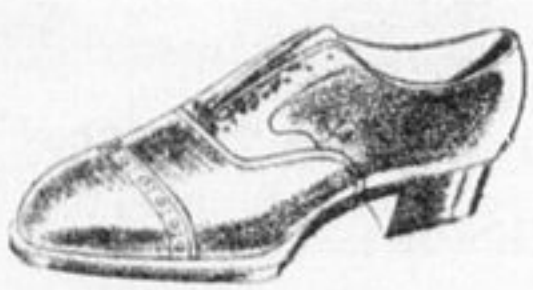

## Police Club Juveniles Win Group Honors From Tuxis

Winners Take Title in Two Straight Games, Defeating Their Opponents 7-1 Tuesday Night. Manager Olson May Challenge Iroquois Falls for Hepburn Cup.

Inspector Art Olson's T.P.A.A.A. Juvenile team won their group championship here on Tuesday night when they knocked off the smart Tuxis team in the second game of the finals by the score of 7-1. The game was a repetition of the first from the standpoint of hard checking and highsticks and it looked as if both squads would mix things up on a big scale on several occasions. The police team won the first game 12-6 after being down 6-5 at the end of the second period and seemed to start right back where they had left off when the second game started Tuesday night.

The police club were leading 3-0 at the end of the first period and each team scored a single goal in the middle stanza to make the count 4-1. Despite the watery condition of the ice the two squads went at it with everything they had but the Cops were too good for their opponents, running in three goals in the last period to make the final count 7-1.

Manager Olson stated to-day that he intends to challenge Iroquois Falls, holders of the Hepburn cup, emblematic of the Juvenile honours for Northern Ontario. The game of necessity would have to be played on artificial ice in Kirkland Lake but this may yet be arranged.

### The Boys Who Do Not Like Spinach Will Like This

Amherst, Mass.—Modern parents need not worry if their children don't like spinach, says Dr. Carl R. Fellers of Massachusetts State College.

Spinach no longer occupies a position as a great body-builder, according to this food technologist.

Dr. Fellers admits that spinach has a high content of iron and calcium (or lime), but these valuable minerals are in a form which can't be well assimilated.

Much of the vitamin C in spinach is lost in cooking, so that spinach has far less vitamin C than lettuce or raw cabbage, Dr. Fellers says.

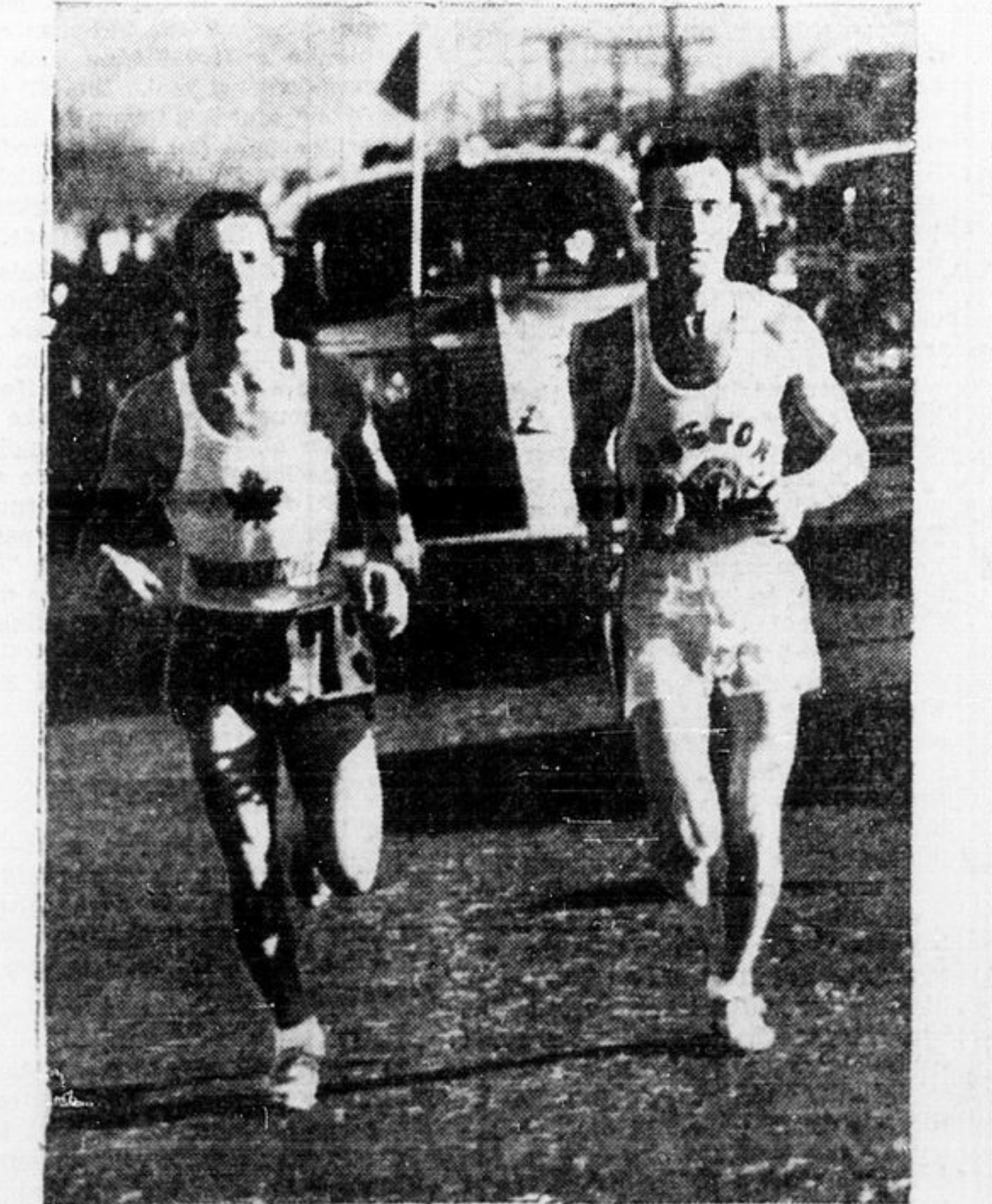
### Queer Animal at Arnprior Comes Under the Dog Tax

## Lake Shore Hockey Star is Signed with Detroit Wings

Joe Fisher Makes Jump to Big Time Hockey After Brilliant Exhibition of Playing Toward Close of Season in Kirkland Lake. Plays Left Wing.

Joe Fisher won't be winging his way down the left boards for the Lake Shore hockey team when the 1938-39 season rolls around. Last week the big boy who made such a hit in the last few games of the season, signed a contract with the Detroit Red Wings.

Carson Cooper, who saw Joe play the night he broke the bone in his foot, was high in his praise of the westerner and must have passed the word along to Jack Adams, and the Detroit management.

**Terms Not Known**  
Terms of the contract were not known. Joe informed the rest of the "gang" at the Lake Shore by telephone and said he was immediately heading west to the one and only. He intends to be married at the end of next month.

Joe had spent the season before last with Coleman Canadians of the Alberta Big Six loop. He attended the hockey school of the Boston Bruins for two seasons and last year went to Boston to try out for them. When he was turned down he came to Kirkland Lake.

While he let it be known all season he would like to have his chance in the monied ranks, Joe said he would not sign unless there was something in it. He did not want to have to spend too long in the minor leagues.

When practices first started last season, there was doubt on the part of many observers that he would make the team. Fisher was slow in getting started but when he did come on he was sensational.

During the early part of the season he led in number of assists by a great margin but seldom blossomed out in a goal. One of the notable exceptions was the night Cooper, the Red Wing scout was here when he made some brilliant plays around the net during the time he was on the ice. A crash into the boards and a broken heel bone put a stop to that outburst.

When the injury cleared up Joe was paired with Bobby Walton and Campbell. These three walked through the opposition in the last few games when Lake Shore had an uphill fight to make a play-off berth. Joe and Bobby starred at South End as Porcupine were forced out and continued their work during the series with Hargreaves, Campbell, back from the first line, improved as well and the three worked smoothly together.

Kirkland fans who liked the big winger's fighting style are sorry to see him go but all wish him success in the professional end of the game.—Northern News.
