**Former Lieut-Governor Abused by Rough Crowd**

At the parliament buildings on Tuesday an angry crowd threatened and taunted Hon. Dr. Bruce, recent Lieutenant-Governor of Ont., after he had assailed the proposed bill to allow chiropractors, osteopaths and others to use the title "Doctor." Dr. Bruce appeared before the Committee of the Legislature as a medical man and urged that the bill be not considered. He claimed that it would be dangerous to the public by giving a standing to those not entitled to it. He also quoted cases where wrong diagnosis by the drug healers had resulted in deaths or unnecessary suffering. It seemed to be generally agreed that his appeal to the committee had much effect in helping defeat the measure. When he was about to leave the parliament buildings he was jostled in the corridor by an angry crowd, and threats were thrown at him. He faced the crowd calmly, however, and suffered nothing worse than jostling and insults. The arrival of three provincial policemen may have helped avert danger of further violence to Dr. Bruce. It is generally agreed that the crowd was not inspired by the chiropractors or osteopaths, who evidently did not sympathize with the rowdiness displayed. There is room for suspicion, however, that there was some organization about the crowd and the authorities should not let the matter drop without learning the source of this outside interference.

Reports are that many are already following the advice and that vaccinations kept doctors active during the week-end.

Health authorities and others interested in public health have long talked of the need for renewed vaccination. There has been prevalent, they claimed a double feeling of false security, more dangerous than an awareness of the menace of smallpox.

**SWEETS FOR ONTARIO**

Ottawa Journal:—A private member's bill in the Ontario Legislature asks that sweepstakes for hospitals and charitable institutions should be made legal in this country. Premier Hepburn is reported to have said he will vote for the bill and Mr. Macaulay, the Conservative House leader, that he has no objection to it. If the report is correct, therefore, the bill may carry.

But even approval from such high quarters does not make the bill a desirable one, and it is fortunate that the authority sought can be conferred only by the Dominion Parliament, which has made the sale of sweepstake tickets an offence under the Criminal Code.

If we cannot run our hospitals and our charities without the assistance of state lotteries things have come to a pretty pass. No harm is done, it is true, when a person who can afford to lose the money buys a sweepstake ticket, but for all that we should not like to see the lottery business made a department of provincial government, with people officially urged to participate in what would be really a "racket"—with tickets backed by the dignified Province of Ontario flooding the United States, competing with lotteries run by the petty republics of South America.
