

SOUTH PORCUPINE FINISHES ITS CURLING

Condition of Back Roads Makes Cycling Unsafe

Boy Coming Home From Buffalo-Ankerite School Injured On Friday. South Porcupine Firemen Taking First Aid Courses. Other South Porcupine and Dome News

South Porcupine, April 6th. (Special to The Advance)—An accident, which might have had much more serious consequences, occurred on Tuesday afternoon on the back road when John Dziadura, aged 14, who attended the Buffalo-Ankerite School, was knocked off his bicycle by a car as he was leaving school after 4 for his home on McDonald Hill. The lad was taken to hospital, where he was treated for concussion, and was taken home on Wednesday, still suffering from shock.

With roads in the condition that they are at present, it is hazardous for bicyclists though they be adults; for youngsters the risk is doubled. It would be well for all children to take note of this accident and if they must ride bicycles on the public road, take extra care to avoid disaster.

Some of our young firemen are taking advantage of the First Aid classes and lectures which Dr. Kinsman is giving at the Dome, and are by special invitation taking a series of lessons which may be of great use to them in their work as firemen. South Porcupine, April 6th. (Special to The Advance). Six-Room Addition to South Porcupine School

Tenders Called for Addition to S. Porcupine's Fine Public School. Large Auditorium, Playroom for Children, and Other Features to be Plans for School Accommodation.

South Porcupine, April 6. (Special to The Advance)—Plans for addition to our South Porcupine public school, drawn up by Mr. D. R. Franklin of Timmins, have been approved by the School Board and tenders for construction are being called for. Work may commence at the end of May in order that the addition may be completed for the beginning of school in September.

The plans call for a six-room addition at the west end of the school with extension to the south, and allow for an auditorium with stage over fifty feet long, and a teachers' room.

The auditorium will be of immense advantage to the school, as the new curriculum, which calls for many forms of self-expression, will now have freer scope. The public school has not had this advantage previously. The overflow classes now at the High School will be once more housed under the same roof as the rest, and the rooms at the High School be left free for the students there. There is also room allowed on the plans for a play room for the children. The entrance to the new addition will be at the rear of Cunningham's.
