 The staff and students, and the parents, are to be congratulated on the success of the concert, and on the pleasing array of costumes, and entertainment value and variety of the programme.

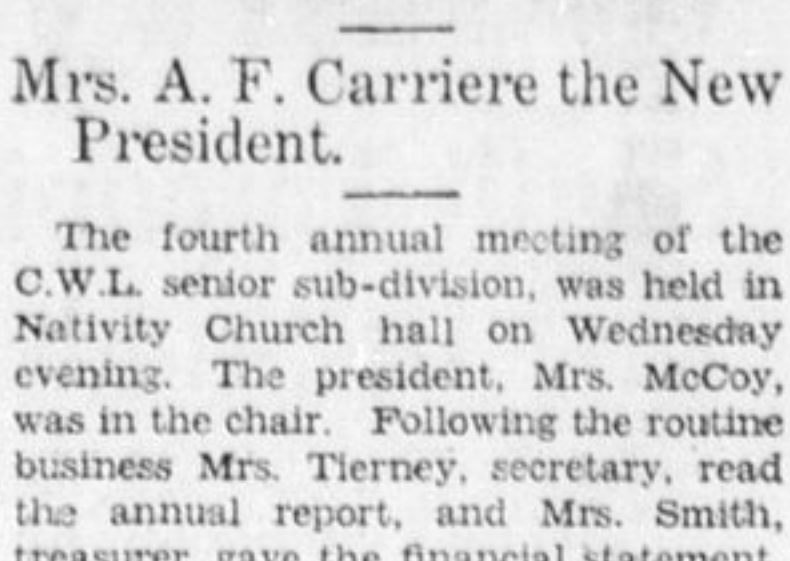
## Showder Given in Honour of Miss Evelyn Whitney

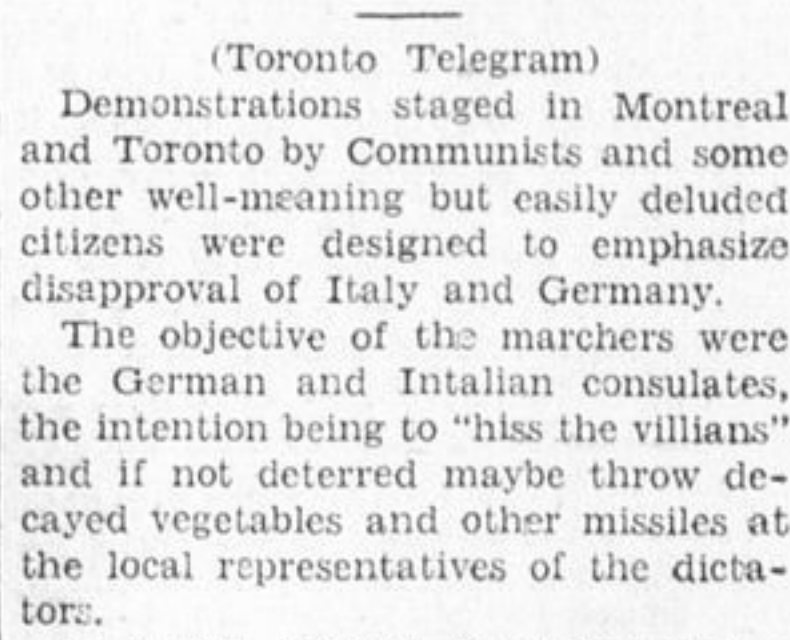

## C.W.L. GIRL GUIDES



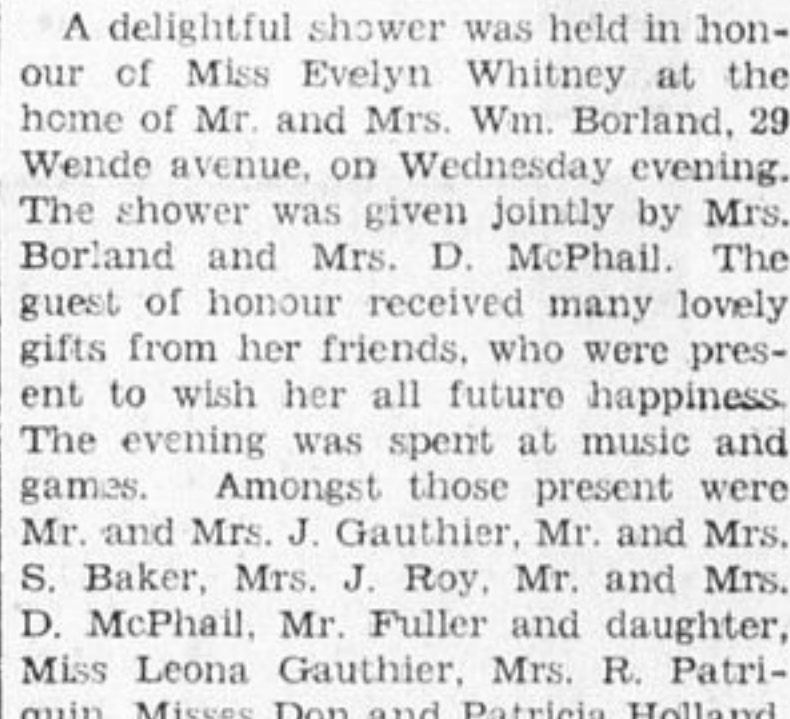
