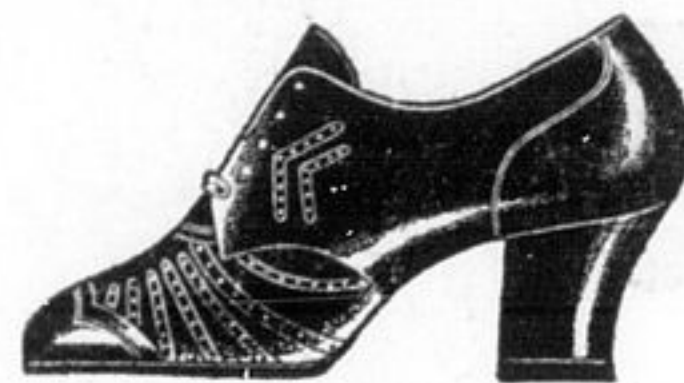

Suit Follows Fatal Highway Accident

Halleybury, April 27.—(Special to The Advance)—Sequel to a fatal highway accident near Englehart on September 10 last, an action for damages brought against the driver of the car which is alleged to have killed George

Fordyce, Chamberlain township clerk, by the widow of the victim is down for disposal among the dozen actions included in the docket of the non-jury Supreme Court sittings scheduled to open here next Monday afternoon before Mr. Justice Godfrey...

Plaintiff in the action is Mrs. Agnes Fordyce, with Agnes Stevens as co-plaintiff, and the defendant is Frederick Joseph Villeneuve, young man whose home is in South Porcupine. The late Mr. Fordyce was riding a bicycle on the main road when he was allegedly struck by Villeneuve's car and fatally injured.

Alex J. Fraser, Cobalt, is bringing action against the Capital Trusts Corporation in a legal battle over settlement of the estate of his late wife, Mrs. Marie Fraser, who died last year. Plaintiff is suing to have her will, based it is alleged on a separation agreement drawn up between the parties some time prior to her death, set aside.

Six of the cases are actions for divorce, five of them uncontested and the sixth one in which both Mrs. Viola Whelan and her husband, James T. Whelan, of Kirkland Lake, are seeking dissolution of the marriage tie.

Timmins Stamp Club Column

Centenary of the Railroad in Austria.

An attractive new postal series was issued some months ago by Austria to commemorate the 100th anniversary of railroads in that country. There are three values and the designs compare favourably with the interesting railroad commemoratives issued by Germany in 1935.



(1804-1878), a native of Bohemia and the founder of the Vienna school of pathological anatomy. Another Bohemian is Joseph Skoda (1805-1881), who became professor of clinics in Vienna and is shown on the 20g plus 20g dark green. Ferdinand Ritter von Hebra (1816-1880), a Moravian Jew and Austria's greatest dermatologist, is portrayed on the 24g plus 24g dull purple.

Ferdinand Ritter von Arlt (1812-1887), whose portrait appears on the 30g plus 30g brown red, is noted as the founder of a celebrated school of oculists. Joseph Hyrtl (1810-1894), 40g plus 40g dark olive, was Professor of Anatomy at Vienna and author of a standard textbook on that subject.

Theodor Billroth (1829-1894) of German birth is shown on the 60g plus 60g black. Theodor Meynert (1833-1892), who is commemorated by the 64g plus 64g

pipe hat almost rivals, in lofty grandeur, the smokestack of his engine. In the background appears the Gothic spire of St. Stephen's Cathedral in Vienna. Contrasting forcibly with this primitive machine is the crack modern locomotive "Reche 214" illustrated on the 25g purple.

Special Greeting Stamp Issued by Austria

The light-hearted Austrians have long been noted for their proficiency in the art of graceful living. Where but in Vienna, the home of Strauss waltzes and Wiener Schnitzel, could have originated the idea of designing a special postage stamp to be used on birthday and Christmas cards and



other letters conveying good wishes? Believed to be the first of its kind, this unusual new set made its appearance on December 12, 1937. It consists of two values, 12g dark green and 24g dark red. The artistic design carries out the traditional gift formula of "Say it with flowers." A vase of roses against a dark background appears in the centre, flanked on either side with the twelve signs of the zodiac.

Austria Honors Her Great Physicians

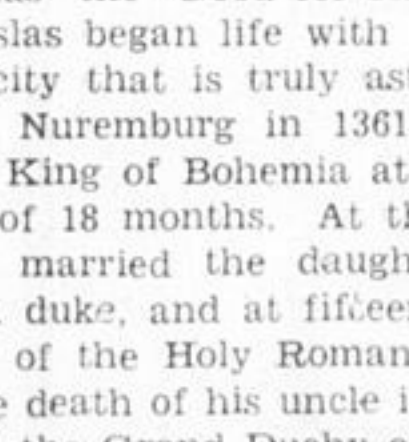
As Vienna has long been one of the leading medical centres in the world, it is very appropriate that the latest charity stamps from Austria should commemorate nine famous Austrian physicians who contributed notably to modern medical science.



The 5g plus 5g dark brown honors Gerhard Freiherr Van Swieten (1700-1772), a Dutchman by birth and court physician to the Empress Maria Theresa. Another doctor in the wig and ruffles of the 18th century is shown on the 8g plus 8g deep carmine red—Leopold Auenbrugger von Auenbrugger (1722 to 1809), famous for his pioneer work in thoracic diseases.

deep red violet, was a great psychiatrist and brain specialist. Let us hope that other countries will follow the example set by Austria in this beautiful series and dedicate more of their commemorative stamps to the men of the arts and sciences.

Luxemburg Honors Her Worst Ruler! It is very seldom that a country pays postal tribute to its less reputable rulers, but the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, has recently dragged an old family skeleton into the philatelic limelight through the medium of its annual set of semi-postal charity stamps.



Wenceslas began life with a display of precocity that is truly astonishing. Born at Nuremberg in 1361, he was crowned King of Bohemia at the tender age of 18 months. At the age of nine he married the daughter of a Bavarian duke, and at fifteen became Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire! Upon the death of his uncle in 1383 he inherited the Grand Duchy of Luxemburg, then one of the most prosperous and contented little countries in Europe.

During his youth Wenceslas made a visit to France and found the famous wines of that country so much to his liking that for the rest of his life he remained in a glorious alcoholic haze. He maintained a sumptuous royal court in Bohemia, where his riotous excesses and surly temper made him extremely unpopular. Twice he was dethroned by outraged nobles and twice he succeeded in regaining power.

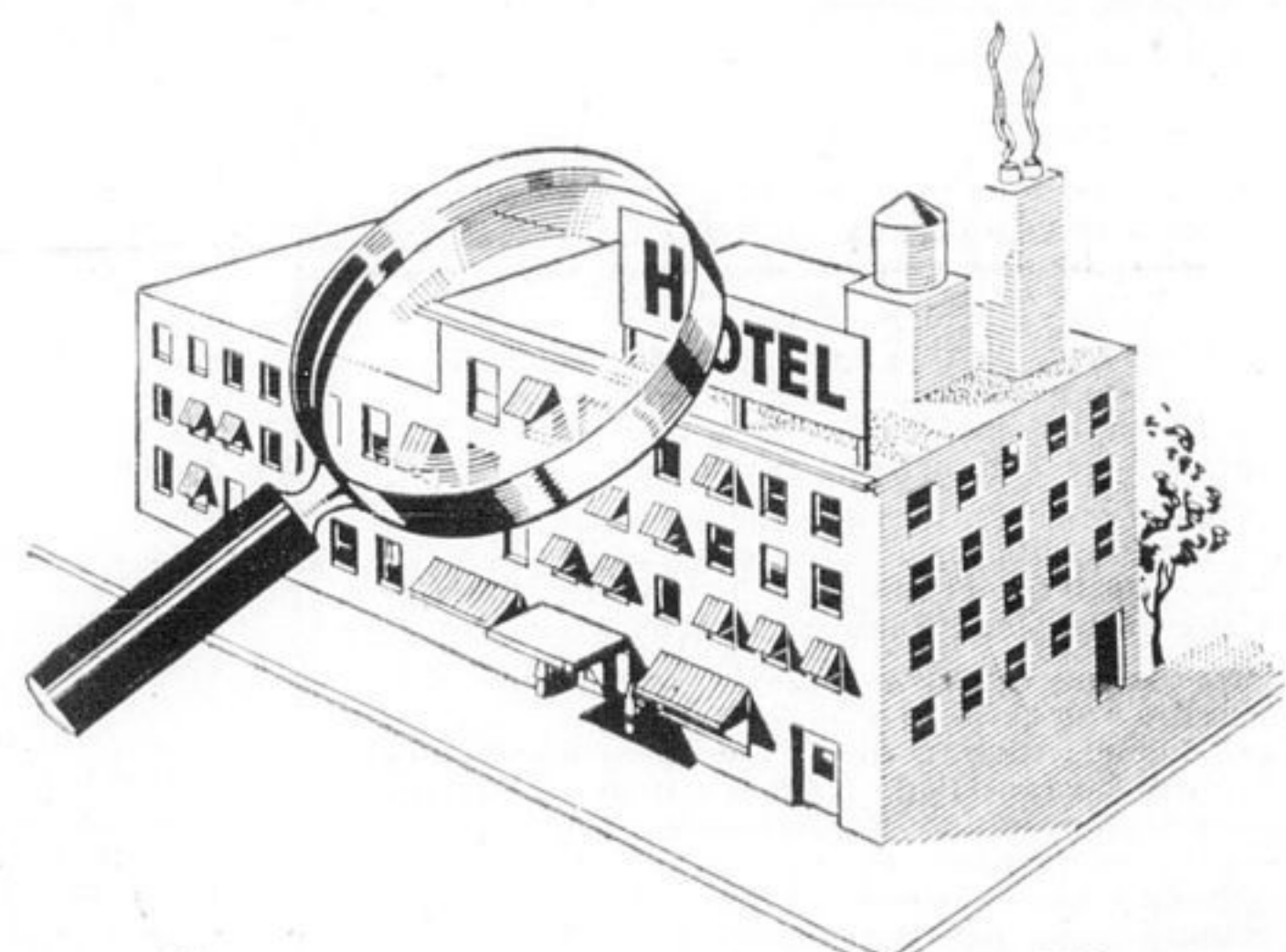
Happy Night to be Put on by the Band

Why Concentrate on Beer?

Opponents of Government Control concentrate their attacks on our industry. This alone, to any thinking man, is enough to throw doubts on their wisdom.

If the cause of true temperance is their object, rather than a tactical advantage, they surely should not devote so large a part of their time to attacking the mildest of alcoholic beverages, and one which is not habit-forming.

But because a democratic law makes our product available by the glass to working men, under Government Control, the opponents of the present system seek to drive drinking underground—where they do not see it. The truth is, that the individual is less likely to commit abuses in public, and the abuses are more easily correctable.

In fact, licensed hotels are very seldom the scene of excess. Because an intoxicated man is seen near a hotel—it does not follow that he acquired the means of intoxication in a hotel. But it does provide the unthinking people with a useful text... if they do not bother to prove their conclusions.

We find no definite evidence to support the theory that satisfying the taste for beer develops a craving for whisky. On the contrary, we believe that if beers... are more easily obtainable than distilled liquors and are sold in different conditions, there is reasonable ground to expect that the taste of those who wish to drink will be diverted to the lighter and less harmful beverages.
