

For fire calls this is still the number but for other business 307 is the number of the fire chief's office. Chief Borland and his men are always anxious to make every second count in answering fire calls and the public can help in this plan by using No. 5 for all fire calls by phone. It is easy to remember that No. 5 is the phone fire call.
