Cyanide to the extent of 85 pounds is required for every 1000 tons of ore, and water is added to the ore in ratio of 1.5 to 1 to provide a liquid condition for pumping.

The judgment applies only to the application of Kerr-Addison and may be varied or rescinded at discretion, and says that under the control ordered dumping of tailings will not, in the opinion of the court, appreciably affect the water of the lake in the middle or western extremity.

For a complete analysis of conditions and problems arising from pollution of waters by mining companies, we commend Mr. Justice Godson's conclusions as an important addition to available information on that subject.

Dome Mines Production for April was \$601,120

Dome Mines, Porcupine district, reports production for April at \$601,120 from treatment of 50,100 tons of ore for an average recovery of \$12 per ton, comparing with \$603,164 from 51,100 tons and average recovery of \$11.80 in March.

Production for the first four months of the year stands at \$2,446,278 from 197,500 tons for average of \$12.41, compared with \$2,500,888 from 188,400 tons and average of \$13.27 in comparable period of 1937.

Gross production since commencement of milling in 1910 now stands at \$85,396,899.

Buffalo-Ankerite's April Output \$239,000

Gross Production Since Mill Started is Now \$7,500,000

Production for the month of April at the Buffalo-Ankerite Gold Mines is estimated by officials at \$239,000. There were 30,294 tons of ore treated at the mill, and the average recovery is given as \$7.68 per ton. For the previous month of March the production was \$240,845 from 30,312 tons with an average recovery of \$7.95 per ton.

It is interesting to note that including the month of April as given above, the total production to date at the Buffalo-Ankerite since the commencement of milling operations in 1936 has now reached the impressive figure of \$7,500,564. Production at the rate of over \$3,500,000 a year places the Buffalo-Ankerite in high standing among the gold producers of this

Judgment Given re Dumping in Lakes

Application of Kerr-Addison Mine Brings Important Judgment.

(From Globe and Mail) The judgment itself is voluminous, Justice Godson of the Mining Court, by which the application of Kerr-Addison Gold Mines for the right to deposit tailings in Larder Lake was granted upon certain conditions, will prove of considerable interest to other mining companies in a country that, in perhaps the majority of cases offers the most available dumping ground in nearby lakes.

him in the future. As a presentation of both sides of the question, the judgment is commended to all who may be compelled to face similar problems. It provides that, to prevent as far as possible the wash from waves on the lake caused by wind, and the consequent desliming of the tailings and resultant turbidity of the water, the company must provide two parallel booms to be laid upon the water surrounding the area into which the tailings are dumped. The booms must be anchored, but moved from time to time as the size of the tailings dump increases. The distance of the inside boom from the edge of the tailings bed, and the distance of the outside boom from the inside boom, shall be such as will be found from experience to provide the protection desired. And the judgment says that the applicant company shall, at reasonable periods, sample the water 50 feet from the edge of the tailings, and at a distance of approximately 200 feet therefrom and

file such reports with the Mining Court. Some interesting facts were presented to guide the Court. Larder Lake covers about 19 square miles and has average depth of 20 feet. Assuming a joint production by mines adjacent to the lake of 5000 tons daily, it would take 380 years to bring the tailings to the surface of the lake. The north-east arm of the lake, into which Kerr-Addison tailings will be dumped, has an area of 900 acres and depth of 20 feet, providing a dump for 60 years at a rate of 2000 tons daily. The company's own property extending into the lake would provide dumping space for 30 years. The watershed extends only two miles on each side of the lake, resulting in rapid run-off and heavy movement of impurities from land. An alternative source of piped pure water supply for the vicinity is offered in the Bear Lake watershed to the extent of 3,000,000 gallons daily, sufficient for from 2,500 to 30,000 people.
