South Porcupine, Ont., May 14.—(Special to The Advance)—We have just heard, with regret, that Mrs. John Andrews, of Main street, who has been ill for a number of weeks, has just passed on, death coming soon after 5 p.m. (Saturday). Mrs. Andrews was known and respected by most of the community, having lived in South Porcupine both before and since her marriage some 22 years ago. Her brother, Mr. Jack Ostrom, is one of the early pioneers of South Porcupine and is living here yet. Mrs. Andrews came here from Fort Coulonge, where her family still resides, and while Etta Ostrom, kept house for her two brothers before her marriage to John Andrews. Two children, as well as her sorrowing husband, survive her—Fred aged 20, and Jean, 16. The funeral was held this afternoon at 2 p.m.

Delegates from Timmins Attended Noteworthy Event.

Members of the I.O.O.F. Rebekah Lodges from all over Northern Ontario and as far south as Barrie met in North Bay on Saturday, May 14th, for a grand rally of Rebekahs and Oddfellows. Porcupine Lake Mine is Operating Satisfactorily

New 25-ton mill of Porcupine Lake Gold Mining Co., Porcupine district, is operating satisfactorily, according to H. H. Sutherland, vice-president, with mill heads currently running around \$11 per ton. It is thought tonnage will be increased to 40 tons daily by next month. Development work is currently being concentrated on the second level, as company is anxious to get north of the fault now being approached. There is 245 feet of ore running better than \$20 across 50 inches north of the fault on the first level.

Campbell's Bay, Que., May 14.—(Special)—The funeral of Margaret Ann Crawford, widow of William Brown, of Thornby, Que., was held from the home of her late son, Harry Brown, in Campbell's Bay, to the Holiness Movement Church, with interment at Earandean Protestant cemetery, Otter Lake. Mrs. Brown, who died after a brief illness, had lived in Thornby all her life until 10 years ago, when she came here to reside with her son. He predeceased her by a year and a half. Chief mourners were John Crawford of Campbell's Bay, a brother; four daughters, Mrs. James Peever, Campbell's Bay; Mrs. Alexander Brown, North Bay; Mrs. John Johnson, Beachburg; and Mrs. Samuel Johnson, Cobden; three sons, James of South Porcupine; Thomas, Thornby; and George, of Campbell's Bay. Two sons, Harry and Daniel, predeceased her. Rev. J. E. Wilson, of Cardinal, Ont., officiated at the service, assisted by the Rev. R. L. Mainse, the present minister of the church. Mr. and Mrs. Asa Smith sang a duet entitled "No Night There."

Wabi Co. to Build Iron Foundry at Noranda

Wabi Iron Works, Ontario, Have Formed Quebec Company.

The Wabi Iron Works, Limited, New Liskeard, Ontario, announce that they will erect an iron foundry at Noranda during the coming summer. The company has obtained a Quebec charter and the new operations will be conducted under the name of Wabi Iron Works, Quebec, Limited. Operation and management will be under the control of Mr. J. McKay-Clements, president and managing director of the present company who will assume similar duties with the new company. This company has been established at New Liskeard since 1910 and is engaged in the manufacture of mining equipment and supplies. Their products are well known in the mining industry throughout Canada and the company has enjoyed export business to both South Africa and Australia. They are affiliated with J. Stone & Company, Limited, Deford, England, a firm well known in the engineering industry throughout the world. The new Quebec company will have the full benefit of Stone's foundry experience and their laboratories and technical staff will be available at any time to aid with metallurgical problems. The new Liskeard Company erected a considerable extension to their plant in 1934 and are at present engaged in extending their plate shops and making other improvements. Mr. McKay-Clements advises that the new foundry can be considered as an expansion of the present facilities and will in no way affect operations at the Ontario plant. Fire at Cobalt Mine May Have Been Work of Arsonist

Cobalt, May 16.—(Special to The Advance)—A small fire, which Arthur Brocklebank, of Cobalt Properties, Ltd., said had the appearance of having been set deliberately, was reported late last Thursday night at a rock house owned by that company on the old Mining Corporation holdings, but the blaze was extinguished before any serious damage was done. David Thorne, living on Galena street, saw flames and called the brigade, which soon put out the flames after breaking in a door in order to obtain admittance to the building. The fire started in the wall outside, firemen said, and might have spread through the frame, tin-sheathed structure to the nearby shaft house, according to Mr. Brocklebank. Damage was less than \$25 he declared, but he added that he was satisfied the fire was not an accident. No one was at work at the place at the time, about 10 p.m.
