Death Takes Toll Dome South Porcupine People

Funeral of Mrs. Robert Connolly. Reference to the Funeral of John Bell. Tennis Club has Doubled its Membership. Other South Porcupine and Dome News.

South Porcupine, May 14th—(Special to The Advance)—The death of Mrs. Robert Connolly, of Dome Extension, which took place in the Porcupine General hospital, after only twenty-four hours' illness, was recorded in this column last Monday. The sad little family, six in number, now motherless, have received the sympathy of our whole community. The four oldest girls with their father and two aunts, Mrs. T. Farrell and Mrs. J. Johnston, accompanied the remains to Shawville where the funeral took place on Monday, May 15th, from the home of Mrs. Connolly's mother, Mrs. James Morrison, to Shawville United Church. The service was conducted by the pastor of the Pentecostal Mission, Mr. Downing, assisted by Rev. A. F. Fokes, of the Shawville United Church, Rev. Sales, of Aurin United Church, and Mr. Wilson, of the Pentecostal Mission, of Bristol Ridge. Hymns were sung—"Rock of Ages," "The Sands of Time Are Sinking," Mrs. Wilson sang "Constantly Abiding," and Mrs. Downing "No disappointment in Heaven," as solo.

The Late John Bell

On Monday morning, April 25th, there passed away at South Porcupine General hospital a highly respected citizen in the person of John Bell after a brief illness.

He was the son of the late John Bell and Catherine McKinnon and was born on the 10th Concession, Kincardine township, 63 years ago. When but a mere lad the lure of adventure called, and most of his life was spent mining and prospecting.

In 1923 he located in and around the Porcupine goldfields.
On Tuesday at 11:30 p.m. funeral services were held in the Masonic Temple, South Porcupine, the deceased being a member of the Caribou Lodge, and Kirkland Lodge as well as South Porcupine.

After the service the remains were accompanied to the station by the members of the Lodge and friends, and then were taken to the home of J. A. McKinnon, Kincardine township, from which place the funeral services were held on Thursday at 2:30 p.m. The Rev. Angus MacIver conducted the service, assisted by the Rev. C. J. Simpson. Interment was made in the family plot, Tiverton cemetery.

Pall bearers were: L. McKinnon, Jack Bell, Angus McKinnon, Russell MacKellar, John Montgomery and James Kippen.

Family relatives of deceased are two sisters—Mrs. Mary Shewfelt, Arnow, Mrs. Murdoch McGregor, Calgary, and one brother Archie, of Port Arthur.
