

# School in West "Adopted" by S. Porcupine H. S.

## South Porcupine School Helping Western School

Pupils in South Porcupine High School "Adopted" Trewdale, Sask., School and Have Been Assisting That School, Police Court at South Porcupine. Other South Porcupine and Dome News

South Porcupine, May 25.—(Special to The Advance)—Each of our High Schools "adopted" a needy Western school this winter. In reading of the "adoption" of a Saskatchewan school by a Cobalt school, we asked for information concerning our own "good deed" and were told that Trewdale school, Saskatchewan—kindergarten and elementary—had been benefited by a 300-lb. bale sent by the pupils of our High School nearly three weeks ago (a smaller one had previously been sent). In this bale were clothing and shoes, collected and repaired by the pupils, sporting equipment, art paper, chalk, pencils and ink, stencil apparatus for the teacher, and practically everything that was actually needed for school requirements. Schumacher High School did the same thing. We consider this a good deed worthy done and have been told by the teachers that the pupils have got a tremendous "kick" out of helping their less favored brethren.

Last Saturday night saw the last of the whist drives and social evenings put on by the Workers Co-operative Society, under the auspices of Mr. Harper. These evenings have been splendidly attended and much enjoyed by those who went to them and have fulfilled the purpose for which they were intended. This final party took place in the community hall at the Dome and while only a fair crowd attended to play whist, the hall was crowded later for the dancing.

The first prize winner for ladies at whist was Mrs. E. Chapman; Miss Rose Burgess gained second; and Mrs. Beard third. For men, Mr. E. Chapman was the first prize winner, Mrs. B. Webb taking second and Mrs. Curtis third.

**Police Court**  
Tuesday's police court docket was again a very large one. As case after case of "drunks" came up before his worship and all pleaded guilty, the magistrate facetiously remarked: "This is quite a drunken township." All paid a fine.

One lady's case comes up next week. For having no name and no clearance lights on a truck one paid \$1 and costs and four others paid \$1 for having no clearance lights.

For refusing to pay a poll tax an employee in a Schumacher hotel will now pay his poll tax to the township plus \$1 fine and costs.

A case of riding a bicycle on the sidewalk resulted in a youth paying \$1 and costs.

Three lads were charged with being on the "part of the travelled portion of the road used by vehicles"—"thumbing" their way—or trying to get a ride to Timmins. Two of the boys were standing on the edge of the road so they were allowed to go but the third lad, who evidently was getting a ride for all three took the rap himself and was fined \$5 and costs. The boy did not know he was committing an offence against the law. It appears that one may stand on the road edge and do what he likes with his thumb, but to come on to the travelled portion and jerk his thumb is a crime in the eyes of the law.

One man was charged with using obscene language in a public place. "I was taking my wife home sir," said the accused, "and I had to use strong language to make her come."—\$5 and costs.

For failing to stop at a "stop" sign another paid a fine of \$1 and costs.

For having beer other than in his private dwelling, \$25 and costs was inflicted, and beer seized.

Chinamen figured largely in a case concerning liquor in a Golden avenue cafe. Police found an opened bottle of liquor hidden behind a refrigerator in the kitchen of the cafe. The proprietor when asked why he had the bottle, said "the boys had a drink," but later said he had found the bottle left uncorked in an upstairs room and brought it down.

Counsel Gardiner pleaded for the accused but the magistrate fined the Chinaman \$100 and costs, but would not make the upstairs public. This charge was changed to read, "Having liquor contrary to the L.C.A."

Case against a Schumacher man for assaulting a Chinese was dismissed by the magistrate when all the facts were given. The Chinaman was cleaning the street and a car parked longer than necessary delayed his work in that quarter. He asked the driver to move the car and was met with refusal. When he took hold of the lapel of his coat to say "You come and ask police," the car driver knocked him down and he struck his head. When he got up he used his broom in self-defence. "You had no right to grab him," was the answer.

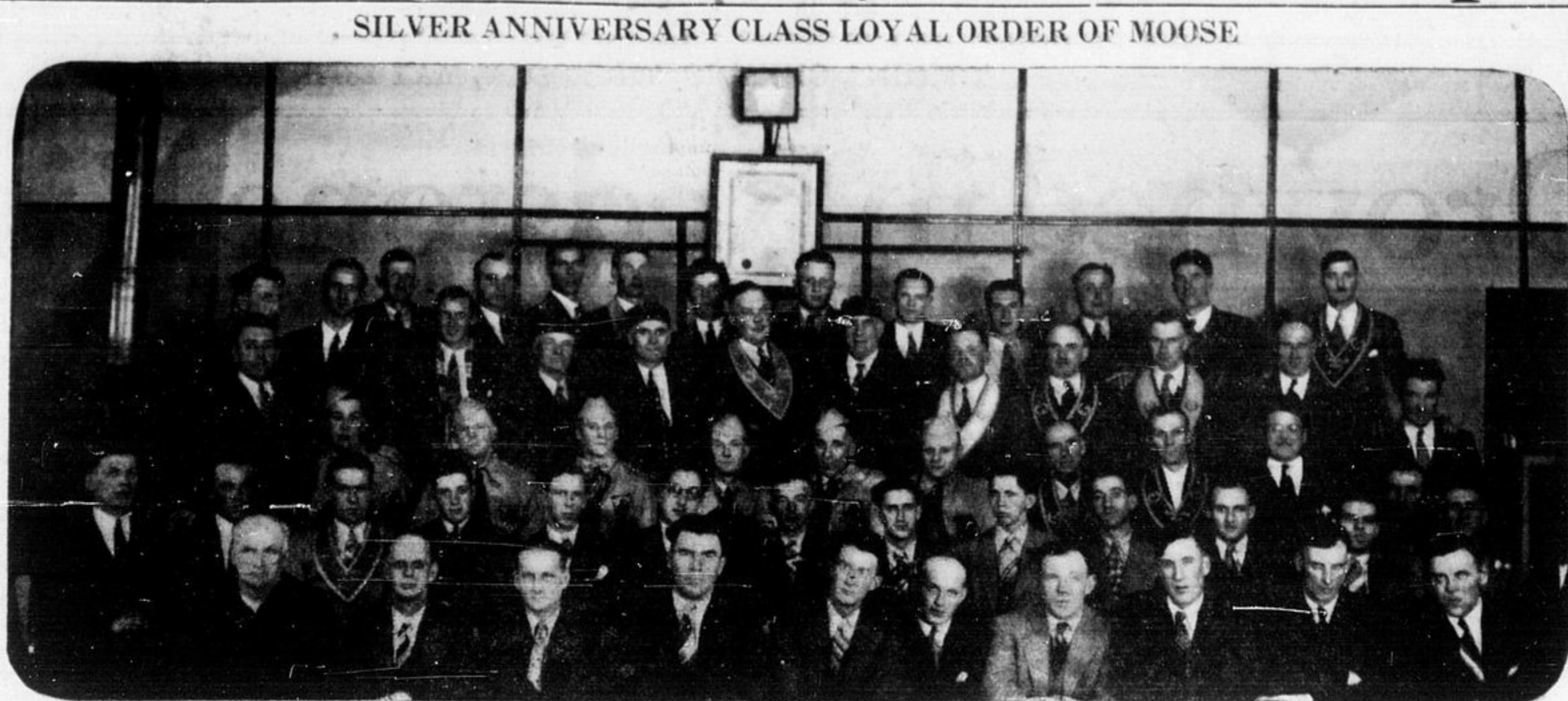
Heavy Fall of Snow on Tuesday. Other South Porcupine News

### Mr. Tanner Speaker at South Porcupine

Addresses Kiwanis Club on Vocational Guidance

South Porcupine, May 25.—(Special to The Advance)—A most impressive, and thoroughly interesting and entertaining illustration of the degree of success which may be attained in Vocational Guidance work was given to the South Porcupine Kiwanis Club on Thursday evening last, when Mr. W. W. Tanner, principal of the Timmins High and Vocational School, revealed to the club something of the manner and principle in and upon which this work is carried on in that institution.

Most boys and girls of high school age, whether they are aware of it or not, begin to develop and to show a special liking and adeptness for certain lines of business or vocation; and as Mr. Tanner explained, Vocational Guidance, as carried on in a high school, is an endeavour to ascertain that particular adeptness and to add to or substitute for the usual high school curriculum a greater degree of specialized training in those studies best suited to the individual student, and which will serve him best in his life in the community. Since one succeeds best and is happiest when employed in a work he likes, the student is offered various kinds of sample studies in his first year. Then, after consultation with the student's parents, specialization continues in the following years in works found to be most suited to the individual. The purpose of introducing vocational guidance is to change the prized product of the high school from merely an academic bookworm to a happily-working, intelligent and useful member of the community—to prevent, in all events, the existence of "square pegs in round holes."

### Two Saved but Third Drowned at Kirkland

Lucien Jodoin Loses His Life When Boat Upsets

Kirkland Lake, May 24.—Lucien Jodoin, 27, met tragic death this afternoon in the waters of Lake Simcoe, when the boat in which he and two Catholic priests, Father Champagne and Father Dehaes, were crossing the lake to Lemire Island, capsized.

Rev. Father Champagne, parish priest of a Catholic church in Larder Lake, and Rev. Father Dehaes of Kirkland Lake succeeded in saving their lives by clinging to the overturned boat.

Jodoin, a miner employed by the Toronto Gold Mine, was a brother of Rev. Father Jodoin, parish priest of a French Catholic church in Kirkland Lake.

Provincial Police officers McDougall, Tregenza and Shepard, with a search party, are dragging the lake with grappling irons to recover the body.

### Daring Attempt to Kidnap British Lord

Guilty Man Caught by Police Through Use of Phone by Friend

London, May 24.—(AP)—Two men were arrested to-night in a daring attempt to kidnap Viscount Nuffield, wealthy British motor manufacturer, who has given millions of pounds to charity.

The men were seized after they had entered Lord Nuffield's office at the Cowley Motor Works near Oxford, and ordered him to enter their automobile. The plant already had closed for the night.

A friend of Lord Nuffield's in a nearby office heard the men's voices and called the police. The two men were arrested quickly.

**Jokes About It**

A short time later Lord Nuffield told members of his Morris Motor Company band, who were practising near the office: "Well, boys, what do you think of it? Two men have just tried to kidnap me."

Britain, where kidnapping is almost without precedent, was amazed at the daring attempt. The two men were taken to the Oxford Police Station, where they were held incommunicado. Officials refused to disclose their identities. They will be brought before a magistrate for hearing to-morrow.

The men arrived in front of the factory in a large limousine, and boldly walked into the plant. A personal friend of the manufacturer, Kennerley Rumford, overheard them order Lord Nuffield to leave the building and enter their car. He telephoned for police from another part of the building. Before the men could get away a dozen policemen arrived in four cars, surrounded the building and arrested the pair.

**Known as Ford of Britain**  
Silver-haired and nervous, Lord Nuffield has given away nearly \$100,000,000 in the past fifteen years. Known as the "Henry Ford of Britain" because of his mass production of low-priced Morris autos, he frequently works alone at night in his private office.

Last week he agreed to co-operate with the government's scheme for air rearmament. It was thought he was working on plans for a new factory to build planes when the intruders entered.
