### Body of James Mitten Recovered from River

Kapuskasing, June 1.—The body of James Mitten, 25, drowned at the junction of the Kapuskasing River and Oscar Creek was recovered Sunday night.

Only meagre details of the tragedy have reached here from the camp where the youth was employed 40 miles away.

**Canoe Overturned**  
Mitten, an employee of the Spruce Falls Power and Paper Company, was with a fellow worker, Basil Currie, at the time of the accident. According to reports reaching here, their canoe overturned when it was swept into the cross currents where Kapuskasing River and Oscar Creek meet.

Mitten was a strong swimmer, but it is believed that the cold water may have given him cramps and that he was dragged down by the weight of his heavy clothing and shoes. His companion reached the shore. Chief Coroner E. R. Tucker will proceed with investigation at once.

## Tisdale Cemetery Board Ask Co-operation of All

Duty and Privilege of Honouring the Last Resting Place of the Dead. Board Recently Appointed in Township Seek Co-operation and Support to Make Cemetery Worthy of the District.

It is a regrettable fact that cemeteries in this part of the North have not received the attention and care that they should. For years past the Advance, the Horticultural Society and other bodies have urged more thought and effort to make the cemeteries more beautiful and orderly. It is true that the Tisdale cemetery has always seemed to have been better cared-for than the Timmins one, yet the township people have felt that still further improvement was necessary. Accordingly the township authorities recently took the necessary steps to form a cemetery board so that the burying place would be more in keeping with the respect and affection of the people for those who sleep in what has aptly been described as "God's care." In passing it is only fair to state that the Timmins cemetery is much improved to what it has been in some past years. Also that there is intention to form a cemetery board here with the plan of securing still further improvement.

The Tisdale Cemetery Board is taking its duties seriously. In the following letter sent The Advance this week for publication as an open letter to the public, the Tisdale Cemetery Board makes an earnest and reasoned appeal for the full support of all the public, so that the Tisdale cemetery may be a place of beauty and order, to do honour to the living as well as to show respect and affection for the dead.

**Tisdale Cemetery Board**  
The devotional care of the last resting place of the departed has been from time immemorial the pride of the human race. We are but following in the steps of many ancient nations when we show a dignified and humane respect for the dead. In a mining camp, where the population is composed so largely of single young men of many nationalities, and without family connections near at hand, there is a peculiar need for some person or persons to be entrusted with the careful and reverent disposal of the remains of the departed.

The Tisdale Township Council has appointed a board to assume the responsibility of caring for and beautifying the township cemetery and so make this their task. We, the members of this board, conscious of the sacredness of this charge committed to us, are asking for the co-operation of the citizens in this work to which we are called. Of necessity there must be some rules and regulations drawn up, all tending to make the City of the Dead a place of peaceful and harmon-

ious beauty, where there will be no longer any suggestion of sorrow by the evidence of human neglect and forgetfulness.

We solicit the sympathetic interest of the public in this labour of love and their loyalty and support in the work we have undertaken, and we assure them that we wish to take them into our fullest confidence in all such work.
