Swimming Pool at River Now Assured for Season

Third Article in the Series on Swimming by A. R. Fisher. Some Notes on the Beginner Learning the Art of Swimming. Confidence the First Essential. The Rest Follows Easily.

The response of parents concerning the opening of the Riverside swimming pool this year and conducting it on a strictly supervised plan has been so great that Mr. A. R. Fisher, who has been sponsoring the plan, says that it is now just a matter of preparing the pool. A small fee for the season will provide for the necessary expenses of improving the pool both for use and for safety and carrying it on through the season.

It has been decided to make the pool two feet shallower and so make it not only more convenient, but safer for children. The shallower pool, which will be about six feet at its deepest, will be much easier to empty and clean. The addition of another exhaust pipe, as well as the enlarging of the present one will also add to the facility with which the pool may be emptied and cleaned, and this will reduce to the minimum any chance of contagion or danger to health.

The programme as outlined at present by Mr. Fisher will provide for three swimming periods each week for some thousand or eleven hundred children. No period will be shorter than two and a half hours. All the children are to be divided into six classes—three boys' classes and three girls' classes. Three days a week will be devoted to boys and three to girls.

Every precaution will be taken to provide proper supervision and to prevent any chance of infection. Rules concerning the use of the pool will be printed shortly. Membership tickets

Former Resident Dies at Kirkland

Mr. Alex Munro, Popular Old-Timer Resident of the Porcupine Camp, Passes On.

The death occurred very suddenly at Kirkland Lake on Wednesday morning of Mrs. Alex Munro, popular old-timer resident of the Porcupine camp. Coming to Timmins about nineteen years ago, Mr. Munro was resident here for ten years, during which time he made many friends in the camp who will be very sorry to learn of his death, and will sympathize with his family in their bereavement. For the past nine years Mr. Munro resided in Kirkland Lake, where he also had a large number of friends.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. S. R. Hooper, Mrs. E. M. Lawson, both of Timmins, and Miss Louise Munro, of Kirkland Lake, and two sons, Mr. Alistair Munro of Timmins and Mr. Redmond Munro of Kirkland Lake.

During the time he was in Kirkland Lake Mr. Munro was employed at the Wright-Hargreaves Mine, where he was known as a willing and able worker. He was fifty-eight years of age.

The remains are being shipped from Kirkland Lake to Timmins on Friday evening, and the funeral services will be held on Saturday afternoon at 4 p.m., with interment in the Timmins cemetery.
