Now we see a Consumers Bureau established by the State of Michigan to protect the interests of that class of its citizens which includes all of them, in addition to the various departments of state which exist for the assistance of part of them, like the department of insurance, or of agriculture.

And in New York, a proposal has recently been made that the State Government set up a "DEPARTMENT of the CONSUMER"

Of course, all this is happening because the Consumer discovered himself first, before the Governments did, by forming his own Consumers' Cooperative Societies, to protect his own interests as Consumer, and now that he has proved that he exists, Governments are finding him out too.

Earlton Farmers Fear Repudiation

Worry Over Promises Regarding Land for Road.

New Liskeard, June 9.—Reported refusal of the Department of Highways to pay for expropriated land, some of it at \$35 an acre, or make settlement of severance damages to some 25 farmers along a nine-mile stretch of new trunk highway south of Earlton, has aroused the district.

Several individual attempts to collect from the government on agreements signed last July have met with failure, and it is believed likely that some sort of joint action may be undertaken shortly.

Farmers say that when they signed away parts of their land for the highway's right of way, the department official who collected their signatures, agreed that a flat rate of \$35 per acre for pasture land would be paid, and a fair settlement made for any damage done by construction crews.

At that time each farmer was notified that some of his land on the route of the new highway came under the classification of pasture.

Fear has arisen that the government has written off this debt, and grounds for doubt of the department making good its obligation came recently with

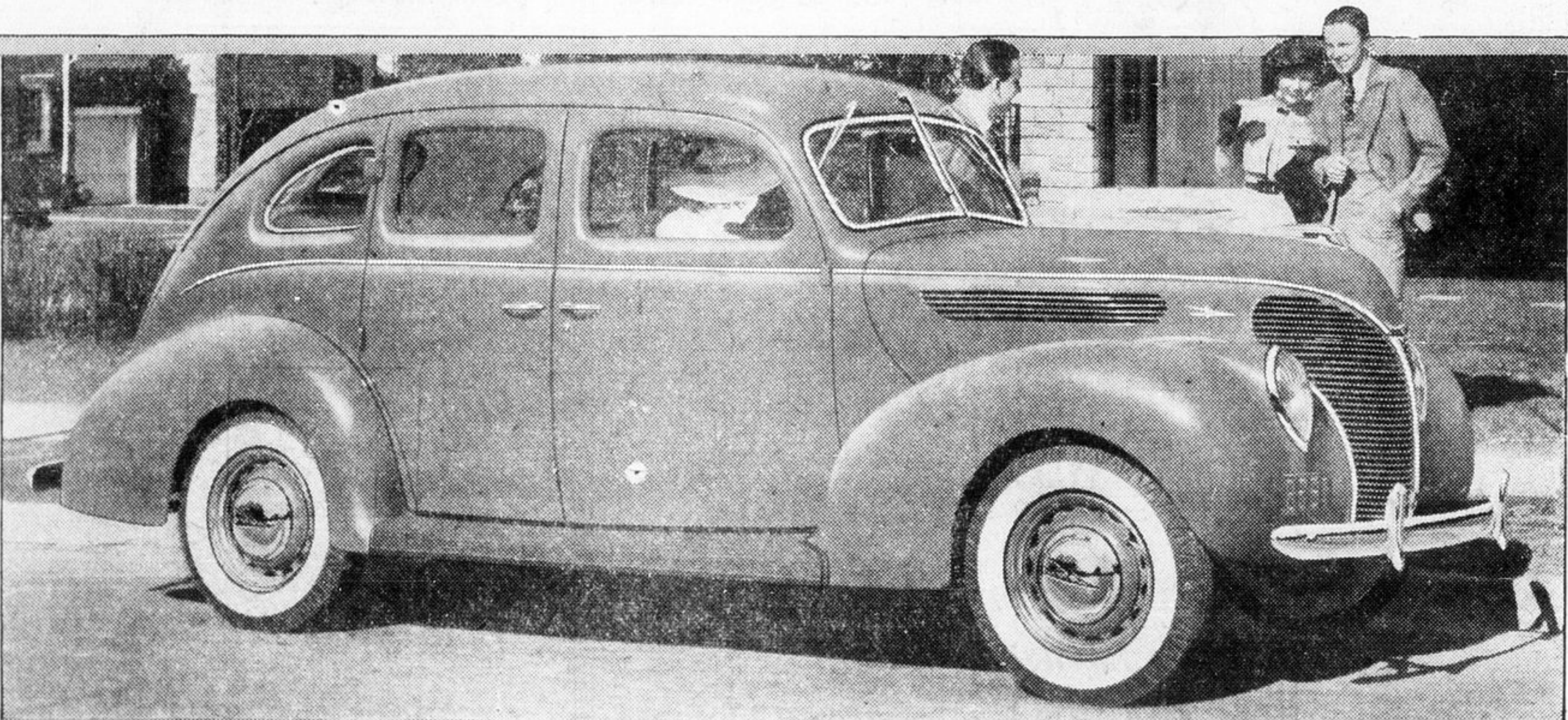
