

# Last Night's Hollinger-McIntyre Game Rained Out

## Macs Leading in Fourth 3-1 When Showers Stop Contest

Impossible to Proceed With Game When Downpour Leaves Infield Soggy With Mud and Water. Zampell for McIntyre Allows Two Hits and Istratti Four.

The opening game of the senior T.E.L. Baseball League at McIntyre Park was rained out in the fourth inning last night, a dense downpour that lasted nearly half an hour leaving the base lines glazed with water and boggy with mud. At the time McIntyre, after a shaky start in the first inning, were leading 3-1 with two out. It was hard feed for the Macs, who seemed to be getting into their stride for the first time this year.

The T.E.L. and the Weatherman just don't seem to eat out of the same dish and in the three games scheduled so far this year, not one has gone the full route of nine innings. A week ago last night in a game that was played in a downpour until five innings were finished, Dome defeated the Macs 9-1. The contest was unsatisfactory from every standpoint but the five innings was enough to constitute a game. On Monday night the game between Dome and Hollinger was cancelled on account of wet grounds and last night Jupiter Plusius again showed his wrath. Might not be a bad idea if the three

team managers held a conference with the gentleman at the rain controls and arranged a working agreement.

In last night's abbreviated game, Hollinger scored their single tally in the first inning. Scarlett, the lead-off man, singled through the infield and advanced on a sacrifice bunt by Berscht. Ford hit to third and Prout grabbed the ball only to drop it again when he went to tag Scarlett coming into the base. On the play Ford started for second and was trapped. Finally after a number of exchanges, Cybulski dropped a poor throw, Scarlett scoring from third and Ford going to second.

There was no further scoring until the third inning when McIntyre got going. "Lefty" Zampell started things off with a screaming line drive that Scarlett got his glove on in centre field only to drop the pill after he tripped off balance and fell. Joe McDonald reached first on Istratti's error and both runners advanced on Hann's sacrifice. Prout was given an intentional walk to fill the bases but Cybul-

ski followed with a clean single to score Zampell and McDonald. Sunderland then struck out and Quinn was thrown out, second to first.

With one out in the fourth and rain beginning to fall, "Dusty" Baker connected for a scorching triple into deep centre and scored on Zampell's infield out for McIntyre's third run. It was at this point that the deluge really came down and Umpire Frawley called the game.

Zampell went to the mound for McIntyre, allowing two hits, striking out three and walking one in four innings. George Istratti was given the pitching assignment for Hollinger and up to the time the game was called had allowed four hits and one walk. He struck out three. The line-ups:—
