Three Abitibi Workmen
Total 75 Years' Service
Notable Record of Messrs K. Leckner, J. Curry and J. Mellon, of Iroquois Falls. Employed with Abitibi Before There was any Town of Iroquois Falls. Other News of Iroquois Falls and Ansonville.
Iroquois Falls, Ont., June 7th, 1938.—(Special To The Advance)—Three local residents, Mr. K. Leckner, Mr. J. Curry, and Mr. J. Mellon, have the fine record of being employed during the past twenty-five years at this mill by the Abitibi Power and Paper Company. And these three are still going strong!
Mr. Curry, who works in the sub-station, poked his head out of the window the other day, and yelled to Mr. Mellon, who is a teamster, "Where were you twenty-five years ago to-day?" Mr. Mellon retorted after a moment's consideration, "I guess I was coming down from Matheson in a row boat, with you."
And that is exactly what had taken place these long years back. With no train coming to Porquiss Junction yet, they were obliged to stop at Matheson, and row their own boat to the site where the Iroquois Falls mill was to be built. Arriving here after a long row, which proved hard on the back and hands of these two, they were met by Mr. Leckner, who at that time was time keeper for the company. They were immediately put on the payroll, and set to work.
Iroquois Falls at that time was just virgin bush, with not so much as the starting of the dam yet. However, shortly after, work commenced on the dam site, and larger gangs came in to do this work. Amongst the first work

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Confidence Important In Learning to Swim
Response of Parents and Other Co-operation Shown Leaves the Question Now as Simply a Matter of Preparing the Pool. Pool to be Improved. Close Supervision. Classes.
The following is the third in the series of articles on swimming written by Mr. A. R. Fisher:
Teaching Swimming
(A. R. Fisher)
Swimming is easy. The chief necessity is confidence and with confidence an overcoming of fear of water. First, take beginner into water which is up to about the armpits in depth. Never use force or anger to get beginner into the position. If necessary allow to play in shallow water until fear has worn off. Gradually get pupil to come to required depth. Now a little trouble may arise, that of getting learner to duck his face under water. Probably the first ducking will be so short as to be negligible; however, remember confidence must be gained.
By now some degree of confidence has been gained. Probably the beginner will be pleased to show how long he can hold his head under the water. If so, your worries are over. You probably have a good pupil. Face your pupil toward shore so he may realize that the water is shallow in that direction. The supreme test is before you now, so go slowly. If this obstacle is surmounted the rest is easy.
After impressing upon the beginner that there is no danger in the water toward shore, have him raise both hands above the head, palms forward. Now bend the body forward at the waist until the upper part is parallel to the water's surface. Have pupil take deep breath, and then fall forward on his face, at the same time raising his feet from the bottom. If this is done the worst is over. The pupil has learned that the body can float. He has been a little dubious until now. Now that the hardest lesson has been learned the beginner just swells with pride and is anxious to carry on with the remaining lessons. However, a little more confidence in floating is very beneficial.
Now that floating has been accomplished, it is necessary to go on. Have beginner as he tries to float again give a slight push with his feet. This will make the body move forward to the shallow end. During these exercises the body is held rigid, hands stretched above his head, and face is held under water. The beginner has now learned to do what is commonly known as Dead Man's Float. This should be practised a great deal until the beginner can float for some distance.
(In next article I shall continue from this point until the beginner has learned to swim a few yards.)
