

Conservatives to Hold Meeting Here Saturday

North Temiskaming Tories Will Select Delegates to Represent Riding at Convention in Ottawa in July to Name New Leader. Liberals Hold Executive Meeting on Wednesday

An open meeting of the Dominion Conservative Association of North Temiskaming has been called by President G. H. Gauthier and will be held on Saturday afternoon in the grill room of the Empire hotel at three o'clock, for the purpose of selecting delegates to represent the riding at the national convention in Ottawa on July 5, 6 and 7. At the Ottawa gathering a new Conservative leader will be elected, to succeed Hon. R. B. Bennett, who announced his retirement from public life some time ago.

Four delegates will be selected to represent the riding at the Ottawa convention and in addition three delegates-at-large will be named by the Provincial association. In this latter capacity, Dr. J. B. McClinton, of Timmins and Bert Watters, ex-M.P.P., of Cochrane, have now been chosen.

On Wednesday afternoon members of the Liberal association will hold a general executive meeting in Matheson, starting at two o'clock.

Weather To Be Fine and Warm

Some Possibility of Thunderstorms S. C. Wheeler, Hollinger Observer, Says.

With the continuous showers of the past week ending on Saturday, the week-end saw record crowds out enjoying the bright sunshine. S. C. Wheeler at Hollinger observatory, predicted this morning that the weather for the next few days will be mostly fine and warm with the odd possibility of a thunderstorm.

Showers on Thursday, Friday and Saturday accounted for one-tenth of an inch of rain. Maximum and minimum temperatures since last Wednesday are—Thursday, 66 above and 43 above; Friday, 75 above and 48 above; Saturday, 70 above and 57 above; Sunday, 71 above and 43 above; lowest last night, 54 above; eight o'clock this morning, 56 above.

Zionist Leader Tells of Progress in the Work

Mr. Leib Jaffe, Director of the Keren Hayesod, Jerusalem, on visit to the North, Addresses Meetings Here Showing Progress in Building National Home for Jewish People and the Need for Further Endeavour.

Mr. Leib Jaffe, world noted as an active leader in the Zionist movement, and connected for many years with the settlement of Palestine with Jewish people, was in Timmins over the week-end on his present tour of Canada to tell his people here what is being done towards the construction of the Jewish National Home. He spoke at a number of meetings here to the Jewish people and on Sunday afternoon made a general address to the public over the radio. He was also guest at a banquet in his honour during his stay in town.

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Interviewed by The Advance to-day, Mr. Jaffe said that the work being carried on in Palestine involves the realization of the eternally historic aspiration of the Jewish people to have a homeland. Only by understanding this faith can the marvellous achievement of the Jewish people in Palestine in a brief time be appreciated.

"We found a waste, derelict country, with a few small, filthy and poverty-stricken towns. Arab villages with mud houses, without doors or windows, where the people live with their live stock," said Mr. Jaffe. "It was desert, eroded land, swamps with breeding grounds for malaria and other diseases. Arab children died like flies, eye disease being a universal plague. In the span of a few years, Jewish endeavor, energy and capital have changed the whole face of the country. There are now flourishing colonies where once there was desert and desolation. Fruitful fields and fertile forests have replaced the waste."

Mr. Jaffe told how new and improved methods in agriculture and live stock had wrought marvelous change. The breed of hens lay double the number of eggs given by the Arab hen. The new cattle are seven times as productive as the old. The fields produce three and four times the crops of former days. Orange growing, grapefruit production, cattle and mixed farming are the specialties very successfully carried on. The Jews have harnessed the Jordan and Garmuk rivers, and the country is flooded with electric lights, while factories also flourish. The schools and hospitals also help the Arabs as well as the Jews. Mr. Jaffe said that the Arabs reaping so much benefit from Jewish enterprise and ideals would be friendly to the Jews were it not for the propaganda and mischief-making of outside nations. Magna Carta Week to be Fittingly Observed Here

Timmins Branch of the Legion Arranges Programme for Week. Special Lessons at School. Addresses at Service Clubs. Monster Drumhead Service Next Sunday at the Ball Park.

This week the Timmins branch of the Canadian Legion, following the lead of the Legion throughout the Dominion, is sponsoring the observance of Magna Carta Week in Timmins. Magna Carta Week is set aside to observe the 723 years in which the British people have enjoyed the liberty and justice assured to them in the Great Charter (Magna Carta) given them by King John in 1215. This charter, recognized through the centuries as the beginning and foundation of British liberty, declared that no man may be imprisoned, exiled or otherwise punished without fair trial by his peers, that punishment must be proportionate to the offence, and that justice may not be denied, delayed or sold to any man. To impress the importance of the Great Charter and to build the spirit that will insist on its maintenance in these days when liberty is assailed from so many quarters, the Legion has arranged a special programme for the week.

All public and separate school children will have special lessons throughout the week on the meaning of the signing of Magna Carta. F. A. Burt will have a special speaker at the Kiwanis Club to-day. Dr. McClinton will address the Lions Club on Magna Carta on Thursday. Pamphlets on the subject are being freely distributed throughout the district by the Legion.

Special articles on Magna Carta have been published in The Advance in recent weeks and further reference to the matter is made in this issue. Next Sunday, June 19, there will be a monster drumhead service held in the ball park at 3 p.m. The service is to be attended by the Legion, the Boy Scouts, the Girl Guides, and all other patriotic and loyal organizations, the New Canadians to be specially represented. Loud speakers are to be arranged so that all attending may be able to hear clearly the stirring addresses to be delivered by local ministers. The

\$5,000 Reward Offered

Attorney-General's Department Make Offer in Dome Mines Robbery Last Week

The attorney-general's department of the province of Ontario, announced on Saturday the posting of a \$5,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the parties responsible for the \$41,000 high-grade robbery at the refinery of Dome Mines in South Porcupine, early last Wednesday morning. Since that time Tisdale and provincial police, who are working in conjunction with Inspector E. C. Gurnett, of the criminal investigation department of the provincial police, have conducted an intensive investigation into the robbery but as yet have failed to unearth any evidence of a definite character. In the meantime the search for the missing gold is being pursued relentlessly.

Damage was not extensive.
