## Campaign to be Brought To Close by Ballot Box

Sealed Receptacle for Votes to be Placed in Office of Local Bank During Last Week of Contest. Group of Judges Will be Selected by Candidates to Count Returns.

System Used Assures Fairness to All Candidates

To insure fairness to all candidates, the contest will be brought to a close under the sealed ballot-box system. A ballot-box, sealed and locked will be placed in one of the local banks during the entire last week of the campaign, where the contestants must deposit their final collections. These deposits must be made during banking hours. The judges (selected by the candidates) will open the box, take

complete charge, tabulate the returns and declare the winners.

During the last week, no collections will be received by the campaign department; all must be made in the box in the bank. This will insure absolute secrecy, the campaign department nor no one else having any idea of the standing of the candidates during the final week.

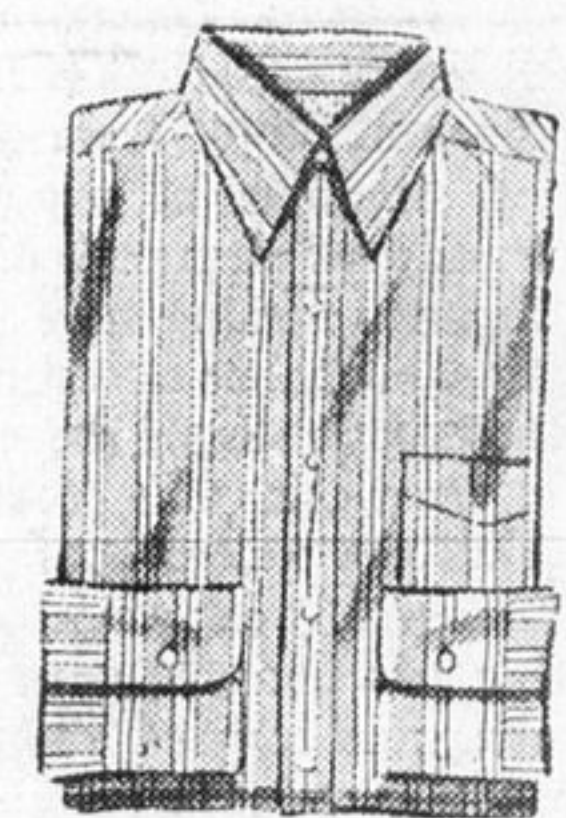
