

Timmins Students Win 19 Firsts at Liskeard Meet

Local Track and Field Team In Fine Form on Saturday

Thirteen New Records Are Established with Local Stars Getting Big Share of the Honours. Local School Win Point Total by Wide Margin in Stiff Competition.

Winning first place in nineteen out of thirty-two events, the track and field team from Timmins High and Vocational School that competed in the Ontario Athletic Commission meet at New Liskeard on Saturday, acquitted itself with distinction. The unexpected was accomplished when the team even bettered its previous year's record of eighteen firsts. In the course of the meet thirteen records were broken, with Timmins boys getting a big share of the honours. Appearing below are the complete results of the competitions and in addition other data, which is supplied by John E. Grabb, director of athletics, is also given.

Medals

Medals were awarded by the Ontario Athletic Commission to the first and second place winners in each event, silver to the winners and bronze to the second place winners. In addition, each member of the winning relay teams was awarded a silver medal. As a result of the 70 medals given, the Timmins boys brought 47, 28 being silver and 19 bronze.

Commission Camp

The O.A.C. established a camp at Lake Couchiching across from Orillia some years ago. This camp was established and is maintained by the Commission from revenues derived from the gates of professional sports operating in Ontario from which the Commission gets a percentage. A few years ago it was decided to turn this money to providing training for the promising school athletes of the province. District meets are held at 12 points throughout the province, and the winners of each event, relays excepted, are given a two-weeks' period of training at the camp, at the Commission's expense. As a result of this plan, two years ago Timmins qualified one boy for camp; last year 15 of the 28 from Northern Ontario were Timmins boys, and this year Timmins will send 16 of the 29 going from the North. This year Halleybury sends 5, Cobalt 4, and New Liskeard 4.

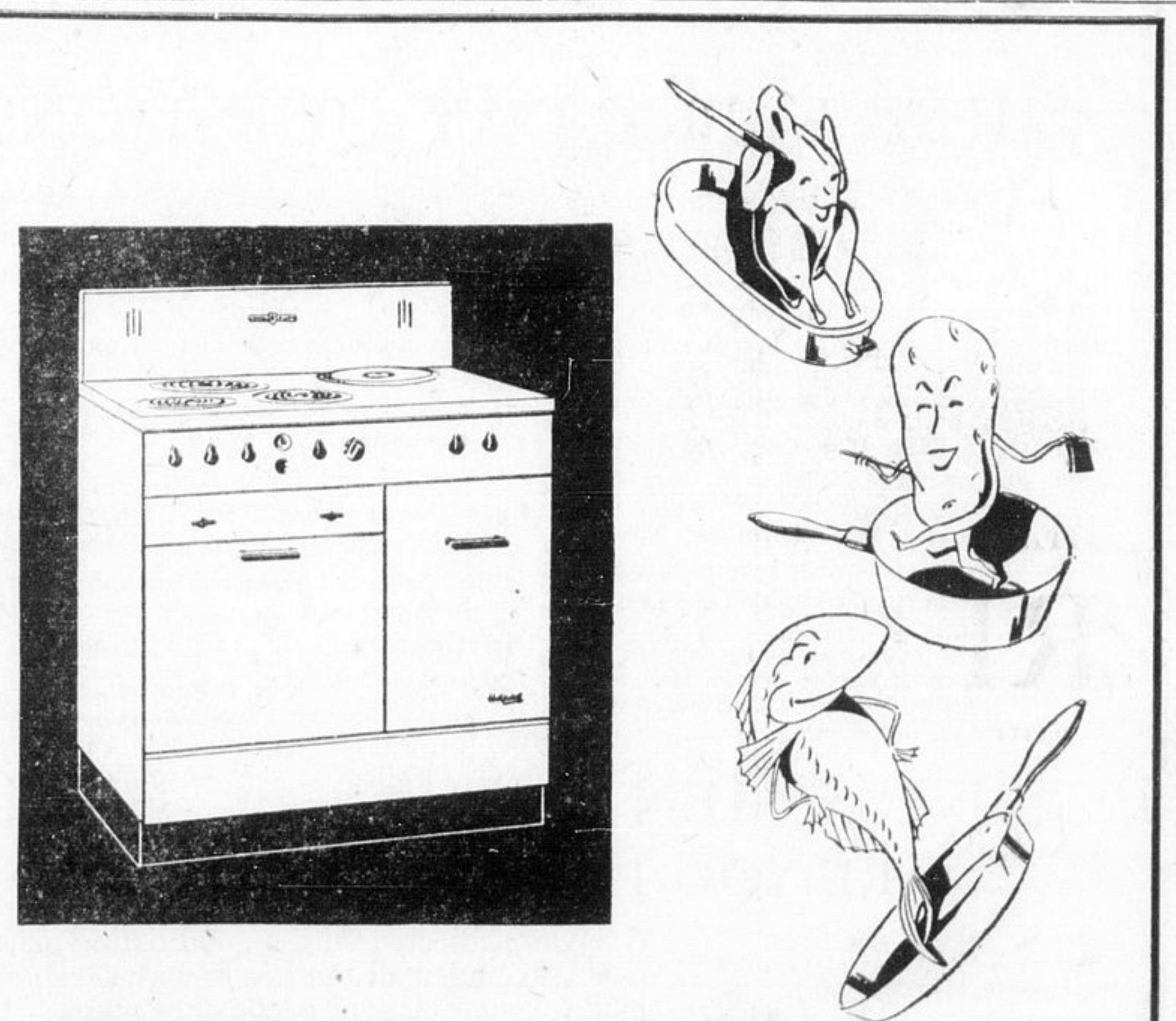
Hollinger Defeat Porcupine In Decisive Victory 15 to 4

Timmins Team Hammer Three Opposing Pitchers for Nineteen Hits in Senior Temiskaming League Game in South Porcupine. Darragh Gets Five Hits, Including Two Triples.

Hammering the horsehide to the four corners of the lot for a total of nineteen hits, Hollinger defeated the Porcupine Miners in a regular senior Temiskaming Baseball League game in South Porcupine on Friday night by the "basketball" score of 15-4. The Porcupines used three pitchers, Dominas starting, with Cox and Mead being interjected in relief roles. They all looked alike to the Hollinger slug-smiths, who seemed to be able to hit anything within the reach of a bat. Joe McNulty, who went the full route for the winners, had trouble finding the plate all evening, walked a total of seven men and allowed nine hits. Dominas struck out one, Cox two,

Mead three and McNulty five. The game was a long drawn-out affair, lasting exactly two hours and a half. Heavy skies threatened rain all the way and even without any additional moisture from above, the outfield was inches deep in mud in places.
