## When Do We Eat?

If the hike we started last week is progressing normally, and a good time is being had by all, the old familiar cry "When do we eat?" will probably make itself heard anywhere from 11 a.m. on. In the case of one or two hikers, they will stop whenever they are so inclined, but where a group is concerned, it might be better neither to wait too long for the lunch stop nor allow the hikers to eat when the first call is heard. On a hot day it is best to rest in the shade at noon time when the sun is high, and if it is cold the sun will warm you while you eat and rest.

Whereas the hiker should not eat when he is tired nor wait too long to arrive at a certain distant place, it might be better to allow really hungry hikers a short stop for a small part of their meal before reaching the planned destination. Make the lunch stop early enough to give you ample time to play in the afternoon, to rest adequately before swimming and to make the return trip leisurely.

On a hike you'll need something substantial and, at the same time, something that can be prepared quickly.

The food you eat on a hiking trip can and should be just as good and as varied as that to which you are accustomed at home. Certainly, your meal should be sensibly balanced dietetically, and if it is cooked over an open fire, it should be well done, neither partly, nor burned.

A short while ago a friend of mine, Charley Smith of Games and Recreational Methods fame, served his favourite hike food to a number of Scouts. He calls it Scout Chowder. It

got me thinking (that's how good it was.) And out of my thinking emerged the following SIXTY hike dishes—Just count 'em. They are all in one master recipe that can be varied forever after by simply changing the ingredients.

Well, here goes for Quick-Stew, all figured for eight hungry hikers, and all preparable in a number 10 tin can and a small frying pan:

- (a) One of these:
  - 1 lb. ground beef (hamburger)
  - 1 lb. Frankfurters (cut in half inch chunks)
  - 1 lb. canned salmon (broken up)
  - 1 lb. sliced bacon (cut in small pieces)
- (b) Both of these:
  - 3 onions (cut up fine)
  - 5 potatoes (peeled and diced)
- (c) Two of these (No. 2 cans):
  - Corn
  - Succotash
  - Red kidney beans
  - Tomatoes
  - Peas and Carrots
  - String beans
- (d) All of these:
  - 1 lump of butter
  - Salt
  - Pepper

Put the diced potatoes over the fire in salted water. Melt the butter on the pan, and brown the onions on it. Add meat and cook. In the case of bacon no butter is needed. Instead, put bacon on the pan, and when enough grease has been melted out, brown the onions and the bacon together.

When the potatoes are done, drain the pan, and onions and your choice of vegetables in the pot with the potatoes. Before adding such vegetables as tomatoes, peas and string beans, drain the juice off into a cup, and later add enough of it to give the stew the desired consistency. If you don't do it this way, your stew may be too thin and you will get scowls from your fellow hikers. Hang the pot over a low flame until everything is

heated thoroughly, stirring often. Season with pepper and salt.

A word to Patrol Leaders or Grub-masters of community troops. Religion obviously concerns itself with food selection since meat is excluded by Catholics on certain days, and there are other special requirements for Jews.

It's too bad, but really we can't eat all the time while on the hike. There are minutes to be filled with other activities than chewing.

A small but one of the most enthusiastic gatherings I've been to in a long time was in the Hoyle Community hall last Friday evening when the 6th Timmins Troop held a joint meeting with the newly formed Hoyle Troop and parents. The 6th Troop which is responsible for the organization of this new group were on a camp visit to the village. Scouter Fisher of the 6th, assisted by Scouter Moore, invited two Patrol Leaders and their Seconds as Boy Scouts of the Hoyle Group. Mr. J. D. MacLean, president of Timmins Boy Scout Association, welcomed the new group and expressed the wish of our association for its continued success. The 6th have about sixteen members in camp working toward the requirements of the Log Award. Quotation and warning overheard: "If we can't put tents up better than those Timmins guys—hugh."

Scouts taking part in the Magna Carta Week service next Sunday (June 19th) will gather at the Legion hall on Cedar street south at 2:30 and will take part in the program prepared by the Canadian Legion of Timmins. As many as possible are asked to attend, that we might show our appreciation for the freedom of our democratic rule. The date for the Community Good Turn has been delayed until after the next Scouters' gathering on June 23rd when the Good Turn will be discussed. Patrol Leader James Clatworthy was presented with his Arrowhead Badge by Mr. MacLean at Hoyle last Friday.

waited to fill the bases. The mighty Darragh was next to be reckoned with and the "Cataract Kid" promptly smashed out a long triple into centre field to clean the bases. The win meant four points to the victors, two in T.B.L. competition and two in the Ennis Cup, as this was the first of the double point games which have been adopted by this group.

The blue and white socks lashed three Hargreave pitchers for 14 hits. The loss was charged to Biff Roach, W.H.M. portside, who went in after Harold Kelley had allowed five runs in two innings. 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
