

# DOREY PITCHES HOLLINGER TO 2-1 WIN OVER MCINTYRE

## Losers Drop Third Straight Since T. B. L. Season Opened

Game is Featured by Sensational Fielding Despite Eight Errors Recorded. Misplay by McIntyre Third Baseman, Smart Squeeze Play and Two Hits Wins Game for Hollinger in Sixth Inning.

Combining two hits and an error with a sparkling squeeze play to score two runs in the sixth inning, Hollinger defeated last year's champion McIntyre team in a senior Temiskaming Baseball League game at Timmins ball park last night by the count of 2-1. It was the third straight loss for Ike Solomon's pets in as many starts.

Despite the fact that there were a total of eight errors divided between the two teams, the fans were treated to an exhibition of sensational fielding.

The game was a battle between two lefthanders, Zampell for McIntyre, and Dorey for Hollinger. Dorey pitched superb ball, striking out five and allowing the same number of hits. Zampell whiffed seven but was nicked for eight safeties.

The largest crowd in many seasons saw the two teams go to the mat in the first game played here this year. The weather was ideal and the interest never lagged. It was anybody's ball game all the way, with Hollinger coming from behind in the sixth to overcome a one-run lead that the Macs established in the preceding inning.

It was an error by Prout, McIntyre third baseman, that started Hollinger on the road to their two-run rally in the sixth that won the ball game. Romualdi punched out a hot drive to third that Prout handled perfectly only to make a wild throw over the first baseman's head that sent the runner to second base. Darragh, the next man up, was out on a foul fly but Romualdi made third on the throw in.

It was at this point that the Hollinger board of strategy went into action. Oltean was batting and with the McIntyre infield playing back on the grass, a squeeze play was called. With the next pitch Romualdi sped from third like a deer. Oltean met the ball and the sphere hit the front of the plate and bounced high in the air in front of Zampell. By the time the ball got back into play the run was in and Oltean was safe at first. On the next ball he made a perfect steal to second and scored on Lawton's screaming double into centre field. Baker dropped Knight's fly into left but Dorey struck out and Scarlett skied out

to centre before any more damage was done.

McIntyre got their lone run in the fifth. With one man out, Sunderland singled and went to second when Cook drew a pass. Prout filed out but Normie Hann brought the fans to their feet with a line single into centre to score Sunderland. Cook being held at third. With men on first and third Cybulski poked a foul that the Hollinger backstop smothered to end the attack.

After taking the lead in the sixth, Hollinger really clamped down and in the last three innings, McIntyre were able to get only three men on base, two of them died at first. Prout doubled in the seventh with two out, but the next batter was gobbled up on a high fly to Scarlett in centre.

Oltean led the bat swinging department for the winners, getting three singles in four trips to the plate. Lawton coming next with a double and single in the same number of times at bat. Jack Darragh, who clouted five for six in last week's game against Porcupine, was limited to one safety in last night's game, but hit the ball every time up.

Prout's double was the only extra-base blow for McIntyre, their other hits being divided among as many players.

The game was studded with fielding features. In the first inning Oltean made a perfect peg to second to nip Cybulski off the bag and in the fifth he got another big hand when he ran far back of the plate to gather in a foul fly from the same player. In addition, his part in Hollinger's first run on a squeeze play was well engineered, and the crowd was not slow to respond.

Jake Quinn, at second base for McIntyre, had four assists and two put-outs, one of which was of the big time variety when he scooped up Dorey's daisy cutter in the third inning.

Despite the fact that his lone error was costly, Prout did a nice job at the hot corner for the Macs and the way he speared Dean Ford's hot liner in the fourth inning, was a fielding masterpiece.

In the same inning Lawton, Hollinger first sacker, glued on to a drive by

Normie Hann with one hand that would have been easily good for two bases.

Dean Ford, at second base for Hollinger, can cover a mile of ground and contributed two scintillating running catches on drives by Gilbert and Quinn in the fourth and sixth innings, respectively. The one in the fourth was a life-saver for Hollinger. Two were out and the Macs had men camped on both second and third at the time.

Gilbert, in centre field for McIntyre, had a perfect day in the outfield and

handled five hard chances without a miss. In the last half of the fifth he snaffled a long drive into deep centre that would have gone for at least a triple if he hadn't made a racing catch of the spheroid.

Scarlett, in centre for the Hollies, wasn't kept as busy as his contemporary but the two that came out to him from the bats of Hann and Prout were the kind that give outfielders the creps.

"Dad" McGuire, one of the keenest patrons of sport in the whole district, officially opened the season here by pitching the first ball and was given a rousing round of applause. The Lions Club Boys' Band under Bandmaster Fred Walno was in attendance and rendered a number of smart selections.

## Porcupine Win Second Game Straight From McIntyre 6-3

Winners Overcome 3-1 Lead with Rally in Seventh Inning and Add Two Runs in Eighth Frame to Clinch Verdict.

With Dominic Senese pitching four-hit balls, while his team mates collected a total of nine off the combined hurling of Fred Callery and George McShane, Porcupine Miners defeated Ike Solomon's champion McIntyre team for the second straight time this year on Monday night by a score of 6-3.

Going into the seventh inning, McIntyre were leading 3-1. They bunched two hits, two errors, a base on balls and a fielder's choice in the fourth inning to score their entire total of runs.

Callery, who had pitched nice ball for six innings got into difficulties in the seventh, and the Miners descended on his slants for three hits. A hit batsman and a passed ball that advanced two runners completed the picture to give Porcupine three runs and a 4-3 lead. McShane started the eighth and was belted for three hits and a base on balls that gave the Miners two more runs that practically clinched the verdict.

The performance of Senese in the Porcupine box was the standout of the day. Working as smoothly as clockwork, he maintained a steady pace throughout and with the exception of the fourth inning when the Miners' defence cracked momentarily, was complete master of the situation. He struck out seven, and in eight out of nine innings was given air-tight support. In four innings not a McIntyre player reached first base.

The first three innings went scoreless, each club getting one hit. With one out in the fourth inning, Labag drew a base on balls for Porcupine and went to second on a passed ball. Cook dropped a third strike on "Skipper" Baker and made a bad peg to first, both runners being safe. Ab Morsau followed with a clean single to score Labag. Bean pulling up a base on Long's infield error moved up a base on Long's leaving field but Murray struck out, leaving the pair stranded on the pathways.

Cybulski started the McIntyre rally in the fourth with a single, only to be forced out at second by Prout's infield roller. Baker then struck out but Quinn got a free ticket on a base on balls, sending Prout to second. Gilbert connected for a single to score Prout and Quinn stopped at third. On the throw in Gilbert went to second. With the score tied, Moreau booted Callery's drive momentarily and then made a bad throw to first. Long finally got his hand on the ball and made a bad throw to the plate in an attempt to catch Gilbert coming home, who had been signalled in from third. Had the throw been on Schultz would have had the runner at the plate but as it happened two runs were scored on the play started by Morsau's error on short. Cook, the next man up, popped out to Long at first to end the inning, leaving McIntyre in the lead 3-1.

Long, Porcupine first baseman, hit a line triple into deep right field to open the "lucky seventh" and trotted home on Murray's single. Schultz was hit by a pitched ball and both men advanced to second and third base, respectively on a passed ball. Catarello, who had gone hitless in three previous trips to the plate, smacked one of Callery's slants for a single over the infield, Murray and Schultz scoring to give the Miners a 4-3 lead. Dowling then hit a fast drive to short right field that Zampell gathered in and doubled Catarello off first base to retire the side.

George McShane was sent in to replace Callery as the eighth inning got under way but the Porkies seemed to take kindly his offerings also. Labag

started the fireworks with a double. Bean singled and Moreau drey a pass to fill the bases. Long singled through the pitcher's box to score Labag and Bean with Moreau stopping at third. Long and Moreau attempted a double steal on the next ball pitched but the latter was trapped between first and home and run down for the first out. Murray then struck out and Schultz popped a foul fly to the catcher for the third out leaving Long anchored at second base. Neither team able to score in the ninth and the contest ended without the threat of any damage either way.

The loss was a costly one for McIntyre. Joe McDonald star first string catcher, being forced out of the game with a broken finger on his right hand when he intercepted a foul tip off Schultz's bat, lead-off man for Porcupine in the third inning.
