

# Tisdale Council Adopts Its First Parking By-law

## Provisions of South Porcupine Parking Law

The new parking bylaw (No. 462) drawn up by council has been signed by the Minister of Highways and is now law in the township of Tisdale. Tisdale has had no regular parking bylaw before this, excepting that the usual rules regarding hydrants and lanes, etc., have been adhered to. The present by-law has special rules for the main streets. The whole law is too long to quote here except in part. No vehicle may park within 20 feet of an intersection in front of a theatre, within ten feet of a fire hydrant or in front of a lane or driveway, fire hall or station. Parallel parking and angle parking is to be specified for certain distances on certain streets, and signs designating these rules are to be made at once. We quote the rule for Bruce avenue—the present through highway: "Parallel parking only shall be allowed on both the north and south sides of Bruce avenue in the settlement of South Porcupine in the township of Tisdale, and such parking between Crawford and the east side of Moore between the hours of 9 and 6 shall be restricted to periods not exceeding one hour at any one time." Penalties for breaches of this law—\$10 for the first offence, and \$25 for each subsequent.

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After the ceremony the relatives and immediate friends repaired to the home of the groom on Crawford St. where the wedding breakfast was held.

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
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
