Kirkland Lake Youth Shot in Fleeing Police

Guelph, June 21.—A Kirkland Lake youth, Teddy Gabriel, 18, is in a serious condition in the hospital here following an attempted escape from the Guelph Reformatory last Thursday.

In company with another teen-aged lad, Eugene Leblanc, he was ambushed by prison guards after freedom lasting nearly a day. A posse of provincial police had scoured the heavily wooded district near the prison for the two.

Gabriel was shot once through the left shoulder and lung. Doctors said he "had a chance to live."

When captured, the two were dressed in civilian clothing, believed to have been picked out of a Guelph backyard.

The escapees had made their way to the highway south of the reformatory. Near Puslinch, a small village near Guelph, they were spotted by Provincial Traffic Constable James S. Culp as they passed his house. He followed them, but lost them near a railway track.

Returning to his home, Culp informed prison authorities who surrounded the district. When guards saw them approaching along the railway they ordered the two to halt. Leblanc halted but Gabriel tried to make for the bush and was fired upon.

Gabriel was sentenced at Kirkland Lake by Magistrate Atkinson on May 5 for theft. He had been paroled only the December previous after serving for a like offence.

STRIKERS TO APPEAL NOW AGAINST THE SENTENCES

Toronto, June 22.—Notice of intention to appeal their convictions on unlawful assembly charges was filed Tuesday in Osgoode Hall by four men and three women from Lakeview, eight miles west of Toronto. The charges were laid by order of Premier Mitchell Hepburn after they participated in a march to Queen's Park April 22.

The seven convicted were relief recipients, on strike as a protest against lowered relief quotas. They surrounded the automobile of Relief Administrator R. S. Moore, of Toronto township two days before marching to Queen's Park.

Four men, Fred Bailey, Edward Lacey, William Finch and George Kellet were sentenced at Brampton last week to two months in jail, while three women, Mrs. Dorothy Cooper, Mrs. Elizabeth Meeker and Mrs. E. Bailey, were given one-year suspended sentences.

To Discuss Social and Other Questions
Gathering in August at Lake Couchiching.

Lake Couchiching, Ont., June 22.—Problems of Dominion-provincial relations, labor and unionization, the rehabilitation of agriculture and current international events will be discussed at the seventh annual session of the Canadian Institute on Economics and Politics to be held at Lake Couchiching, Ontario, August 6 to 19.

While the ominous drift of world politics will not be over-looked, special emphasis will be given at this year's institute to the problem of Canadian unity, according to an announcement from the committee headed by Sir Robert Falconer.

Prominent students of affairs, including Dr. Hans Simons, formerly director of the Deutsche Hochschule fur Politik in Berlin, and now a member of the graduate faculty of the New School of Social Research, New York, have been invited to lead forums and seminars at the institute which has steadily grown in size and importance since its inception seven years ago.

The institute is designed for the needs not only of experts, but of thoughtful men and women in all walks of life, and ample opportunity will be given for discussion by those who attend.

Tentatively, the calendar of the institute is as follows:
August 8-11, Dominion-provincial Relations;
August 12-15, Labor and Unionization;
August 17-19, Rehabilitation of Agriculture;
Second Week, Analysis of International Events.

Some of the leaders and speakers who will attend the institute are: President Robert Wallace, of Queen's University; R. J. Deachman, M.P., for North Huron; Prof. George W. Brown, University of Toronto; Escott Reid, secretary, Canadian Institute of International Affairs; Hon. Angus L. Macdonald, K.C., premier of Nova Scotia; Gratton O'Leary, editor, Ottawa Journal; Sir Francis L. C. Flood, high commissioner for United Kingdom; Tom Moore, of Ottawa; and many others.
