Summer vacation is here again! Seems to me as if it didn't matter much what grade you are in school, you're on holidays. That means camping to me. To camp! To camp! The wilds are calling! Where's that old veteran tent, that home-made sleeping bag, that battered old cooking kit?

Right now my thoughts run back to days when our patrol looked forward to the time when we could walk past the old school house with our noses in the air and quite at ease 'cause the truant officer couldn't say anything to us. It was holiday and camping time. Those were the days when our gang lived the life of an honest-to-goodness patrol—we can't now for we must spend our time earning our living. But we only wish that we had the chance you fellows have.

That Patrol of ours was truly a One-for-All and All-for-One proposition, with something going on all the time, especially when summer time came around.

Summer vacation never found us napping. Our plans were made ages before the school doors closed. And it wasn't a matter of a couple of guys going off on the Troop's camping expedition; it was a 100 per cent. attendance at whatever camp project was up. We'd have felt awful if a single soul had been missing when the rest of us were enjoying ourselves.

But then, the fellows simply had to be there. Each had a responsibility and a job to perform and that, I think, was one of the secrets of our hanging together through thick and thin. The success of all our undertakings depended upon team work, upon the efforts of each one. We all knew this, so we were all present whenever the call went out with a do-or-die spirit in our hearts.

It wasn't a spirit that had developed overnight. On the contrary, it was one we had fought for and attained after much work, many defeats and a few victories thrown in for good measure.

Take our camp equipment, for example. Yes, our tents were admired by many other patrols, but they could have had similar ones if they had bothered. We hadn't just picked them up somewhere. Every dollar that went into those tents had been earned by honest effort. The material had been bought after many samples had been studied. Much discussion had gone into the development of the designs and much labour into the making, as we measured and cut and sewed and grom-

meted and waterproofed. There they were to prove to other patrols what could be done.

And that wasn't all—not by a long shot. There were cooking outfits: two half-patrol nesting sets of pots and pans with kitchen knives and forks and spoons and containers. I remember our first cooking utensils were a coxstake box (cardboard) lid and a paper bag, on which we fried eggs and which we boiled water. And it's easy to see that it sounds! Then there was a first aid outfit. There were signalling flags, axes and spades. Everything belonged to the PATROL. Each piece was something to be treasured and kept in good shape for each represented a combined effort of everyone in the Patrol.

That's all very well for me to talk. But we've got to say you! Good! Let's see it. And the best chance to show what your patrol is made of is at the Camporee the last week-end of this month. I assure! a monster camp for a few days of all the Patrols in all the Boy Scout Troops in Timmins. Your patrol as a Patrol Leader is to make complete arrangements for transportation, getting your menu whipped into shape and filled, your camp management your tents, your own first aid kits, your own pots and pans and a large happy smile for everybody. We see that you will have plenty to do lots of fun, swimming, and roasting empanadas. Can you make it? You bet you can, if you get prepared now. Don't worry about the competitions, they're just ordinary Scout work—spend your time on HOW you will arrange your camp, WHO will be in charge of each job, WHEN and HOW you will get there, and WHAT you will eat. That's the idea! Stick out your chest, and say "Come on Camporee, we're ready for ya!"—and mean it.

Not so many weeks ago the Chief, Lord Baden-Powell, returned from East Africa where he had been spending the winter for his health. The trip for a man of 81 was a "snap," as we might say. Sea sickness got the better of him, but when he heard that photographers were waiting to take pictures of him coming down the gang plank, he was determined not to show his weakness, and like the true scout our founder he walked down the swaying gang plank as if nothing were wrong. However he collapsed it rather than got into his car. We can only hope that the Chief may recover from his ill-health long enough to spend more years of Scouting with us.

Scouts who wish to do a real good turn for the Institute for the Blind are asked to report at the Legion hall on Saturday morning July 9th, at 9 o'clock. They will receive their instructions there. The work that Scouts have done for the Institute in previous years has been greatly appreciated and I hope that we may be able to do the same this year. Full uniform, please! See you at the Camporee.
