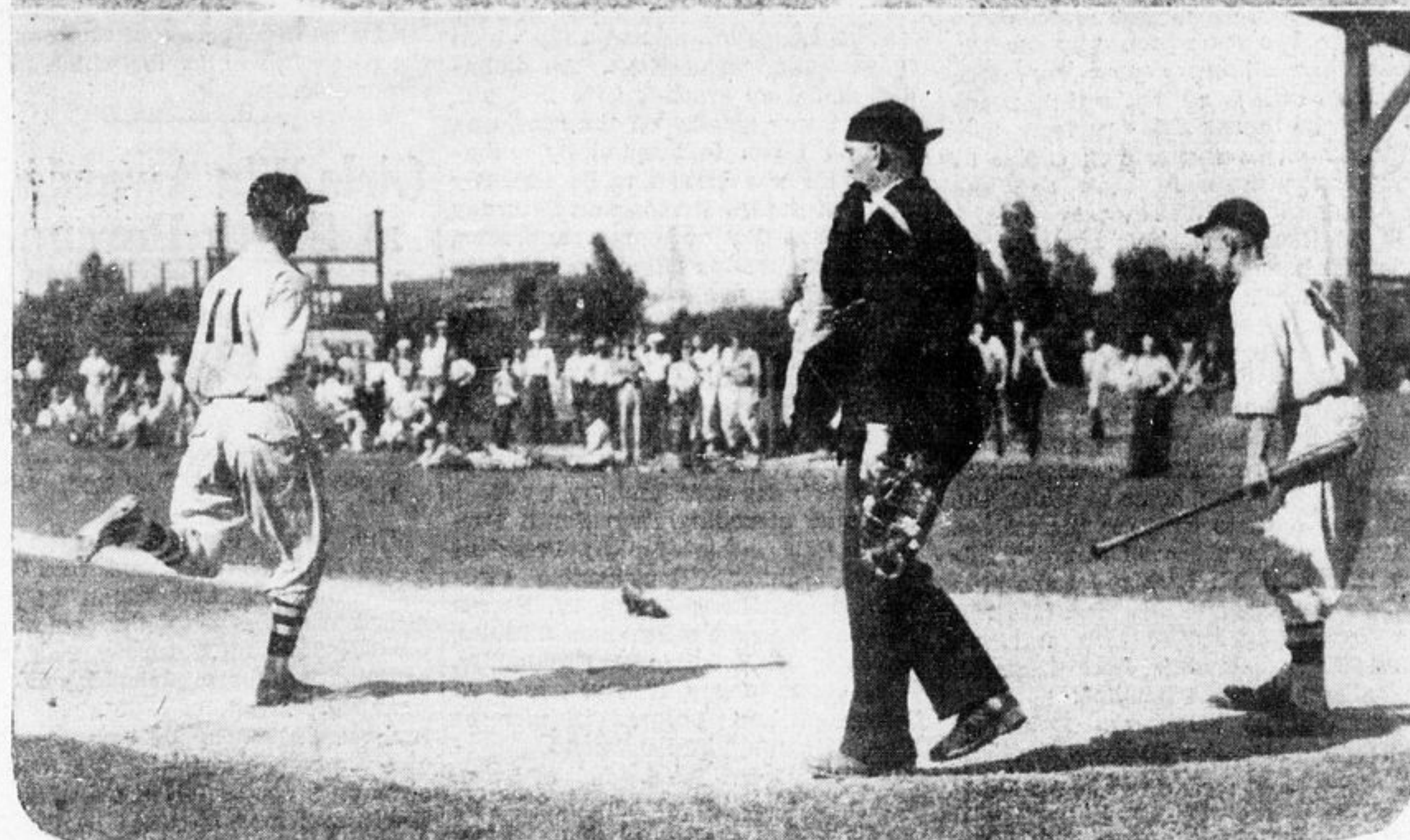
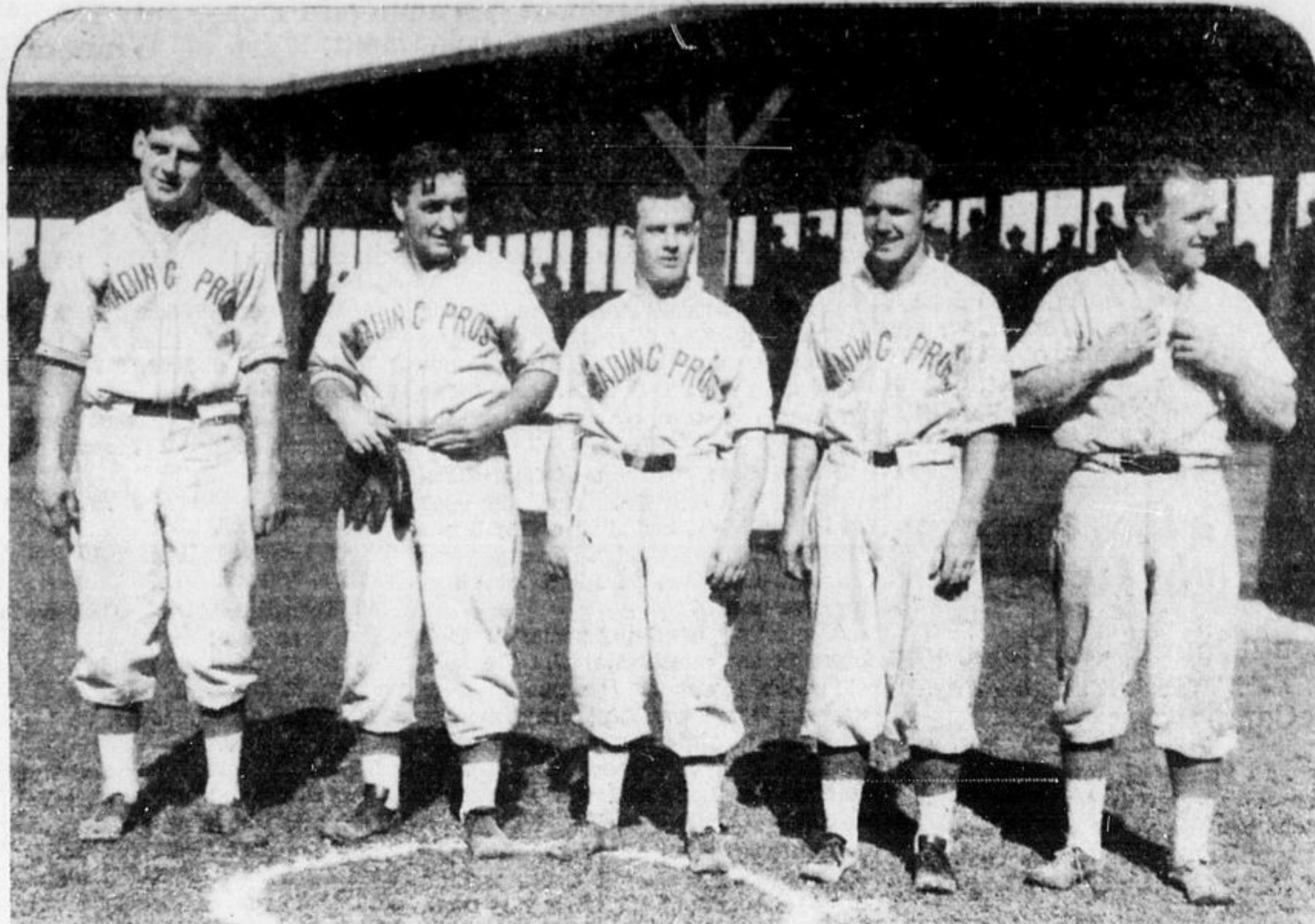


McIntyre Defeat Ottawa For Senior Baseball Title

Win Postponed Play-off From 1937 by Three Games to One

Rival Teams Divide Double-Header on Dominion Day but McIntyre Copped Both Games on Saturday to Take Series. Home Run by Joe McDonald Wins Third Contest. Big Crowd Out to See Hockey Stars on Ottawa Line-up.

N.H.L. STARS PLENTIFUL ON OTTAWA BASEBALL TEAM



The Ottawa baseball team that met McIntyre here on Friday and Saturday in the E. O.B.A. championship resembled a cross section of the National Hockey League. No less than four of the big time hockey clubs were represented in the Capital City lineup and in addition the American Association Hockey League made its contribution also. The men from the monied ranks of the ice pastime are shown in the top picture and from left to right are—Allan Shields, Montreal Maroons; Heck Kilrea, Detroit Red Wings; "Polly" Drouin, Montreal Canadiens; Bill Cowley, Boston Bruins and "Yip" Radley, of Tulsa Oilers. The quintette all play baseball with Brading Pros. in the Ottawa Valley League during the off season. In the lower picture Joe McDonald is seen crossing the plate after hitting a home run in the eighth inning to win the third game of the series by a score of 3-2 for McIntyre. After smashing the ball over the right field fence McDonald had lots of time to circuit the bases and Umpire Carl Boucher didn't need to make any decision at the plate. The McIntyres mascot is seen at the right recovering the bat with the Babe Ruth qualities.

Defeating an eight-star Ottawa team three games to one in two double-headers played at McIntyre stadium on Friday and Saturday, the Solomon's McIntyre team won the Eastern Ontario senior baseball championship for 1937. The Macwere awarded the title last year and a Ottawa Journal Trophy by default but it was finally arranged to have the play-off here this year, the winning team to take the championship regardless of Ottawa's default of last season.

On Dominion Day McIntyre won the first game 6 and dropped the second by the close of 3-2. By the same margin, the Macs crew squeezed out a win in the opening game on Saturday and won the last game of the series by the first game score of 6-4.

The Ottawa team was a combination of the Great Valley Lumber Club and the Brading Pros who operate in the Ottawa Valley League. Five well-known professional hockey stars, who are members of the Brading club, were included in the Ottawa line-up. Bill Cowley, of Boston Bruins, was selected for the N.H.L. all-star team of last year in the centre ice position, played third base, Polly Drouin, of Montreal Canadiens, was at second, Heck Kilrea, of Detroit Red Wings, in the outfield, Allan Shields, of Montreal Maroons, in right field and at first base and "Yip" Radley, of Tulsa Oilers, sharing the catching assignment with "Dad" Rheame.

On Dominion Day a crowd estimated at 3000 saw the two teams divide the honours. Hundreds of hockey fans came out to see how the N.H.L. stars perform on the diamond and the park was almost filled to capacity. About half this number saw Saturday's games, McIntyre taking both ends of the bill to win the championship.

Manager Solomon bolstered his team with four men now playing with Lake Shore in Kirkland Lake. Don Price, who was with the McIntyre team last summer and played hockey with the nine team all winter, was in centre field. Buck, also a former McIntyre player, led down left field. Bill Brennan caught the two games on Friday and Hunthausen, a product of Notre Dame University, pitched two games, winning one and losing the other.

According to composite figures from the box scores, there was little to choose between the two teams. McIntyre scored a total of seventeen runs to thirteen by the visitors but only shaded the Ottawa team by 30-28 in hits. Errors were one of the features of the two-day series, each team being charged with sixteen. Despite the fact that the number of misplays recorded would indicate sloppy baseball, the four games produced a sparkling display, many of the errors having no bearing on the scores.

Macs Take First Game
With George McShane showing a real display of form and yielding eight scattered hits, McIntyre won the first game on Friday by a 6-4 count. Landymore started for Ottawa but was replaced in the first inning by the veteran "Lefty" Barbaro after two walks, a hit batsman and two errors had accounted for two runs. Two hits, a fielder's choice and a two-base error gave Ottawa a 2-2 tie in the second inning and in the next frame they added another on two singles and an error. The visitors were in the driver's seat with their 3-2 margin until the sixth when the Macs descended on Barbaro with a smashing six-hit attack of four runs, features of which were a triple by Don Price and doubles by Buck and McShane. Ottawa made a belated rally in the ninth for one run but McIntyre were able to stave off the threat without much trouble.

Ottawa Take Second
In the second game Hunthausen and Driscoll engaged in a smart pitching duel, each allowing six hits. A bad fourth inning proved the downfall of the McIntyre club, three errors and a hit batsman giving the Capital City two runs to tie the game up at 2-2. Both teams came within an eyelash of counting in the sixth but Ottawa were held scoreless after getting men on second and third with none out and McIntyre with the same set-up with one out. Ottawa won the game in the eighth. With one out Bill Cowley singled and "Polly" Drouin, whom he opposes at centre ice in the hockey wars, came through with a double sending Cowley to third. "Yip" Radley, not to let the hockey department of the team down, hit a line single to score Cowley but Drouin was tagged at the plate when he attempted to score.

Homer Wins Game
"Whispering Joe" McDonald was the hero of the opener on Saturday and won the game with a terrific clout over the right field fence for a home run in the eighth inning, to break a tie and give McIntyre the decision 3-2. "Lefty" Zampell, pitching for McIntyre, hooked up with Lynott on the Ottawa mound and allowed eight hits to the latter's six. Neither pitcher walked a man in the entire game but Zampell had the edge in strikeouts 7-3. There was no score until the sixth inning when McIntyre went into the lead 1-0. Ottawa came right back strong and on a single by Kilrea, a triple by Cowley, a sacrifice and an infield out, pushed two runs in to go ahead 2-1. McIntyre tied the score in the seventh and with two out in the eighth McDonald settled the hash of the government town with his circuit blow. Joe got a big hand from the crowd as he crossed the plate with what proved the winning run.

McIntyre Win Series
The last and deciding game of the series, won by McIntyre 6-4, was the most closely played during the two-day session, each team having seven errors. Ottawa didn't have an earned run, while four of the McIntyre countere were of the same variety. Fred Callery was chosen to hurl the game for McIntyre but only lasted until the third inning when Hunthausen was sent to the rescue with the bases loaded, one run in and one out. It was a tough spot to go into but Hunthausen cut the visitors off with one run, Cowley scoring on a fly to centre and Hoag popping out to Hann at short. McIntyre had scored once in the first and three in the third and still held a two-run advantage after the Ottawa spurge in their half of the third. A screaming triple by Buck and singles by Cooke and Hann provided McIntyre with another pair of runs in the fourth but two errors and a single gave Ottawa another in their half to make the score 6-3. They increased their total to four in the eighth on two errors combined with two bases on balls and a stolen base. The visitors threw a scare into the Solomon clan in the last of the ninth when they planted runners on second and third base with two out. The next batter, Galarneau, rolled a grounder to Hann at short to end the series and give McIntyre the championship.
