So. Porcupine Hospital and Grounds Improved

Kiwanis Club Making Excellent Job of Finishing Grounds Around Hospital. Even More Ambitious Plans for Next Year. Swimming Pool Also Planned for Future

South Porcupine, July 6th.—(Special To The Advance)—Certificates to successful students to entrance to High School examination have been mailed to those who sat at South Porcupine High School, we are informed by Principal W. S. Blake, and certificates to those who were recommended by the public school principals for High School entrance at the Golden City, Dome and South Porcupine public schools will be received by them on September 1st at the South Porcupine High School. In this issue will be found a list of Lower School promotions in South Porcupine High School.

The Porcupine General hospital looks a most imposing structure, now that it stands with its final coat of stucco, finished clean and new, overlooking the town. The Kiwanis Club of South Porcupine is undertaking the task of beautifying the grounds, following a blueprint made by Mr. Kinkel (brother of Mr. P. Kinkel of the Buffalo-Ankerite) who was at one time landscape gardener architect for the City of Buffalo. Each Kiwanian has undertaken to do 12 hours of work on the grounds, or to supply a workman for that length of time. The Club hopes that the spruce and other evergreen shrubs planted by the members will take root and grow and although next year a more elaborate schedule will be carried out, this year the planting of trees and grass seed, levelling the ground and covering the hillside with a foundation of loam is as much as they have promised to do. Two hundred and fifty shrubs will be planted next spring, being definitely now on order. For this worthy enterprise, the second work of this branch of the Kiwanis, our town is grateful. Playground equipment is definitely on the way for the Kiwanis Children's playground. Four "teeters" are going up, one whirling and post, two sandboxes with canopy tops, and a sand chute, and softball equipment. All that now is lacking is a supervisor. Someone is badly needed who will supervise the games and assist in the general welfare of the children. We understand that a small salary can be paid to the proper person, who will be selected by either Mr. F. C. Evans or Mr. W. Honer, to either of whom application can be made.

Asking for further information concerning the dream-castles of the Kiwanis, we have been told that some day (next year we hope) the greatest dream of all South Porcupine mothers (and perhaps fathers) may take shape. A swimming pool on this side of the lake for our youngsters! It sounds too good to be true. 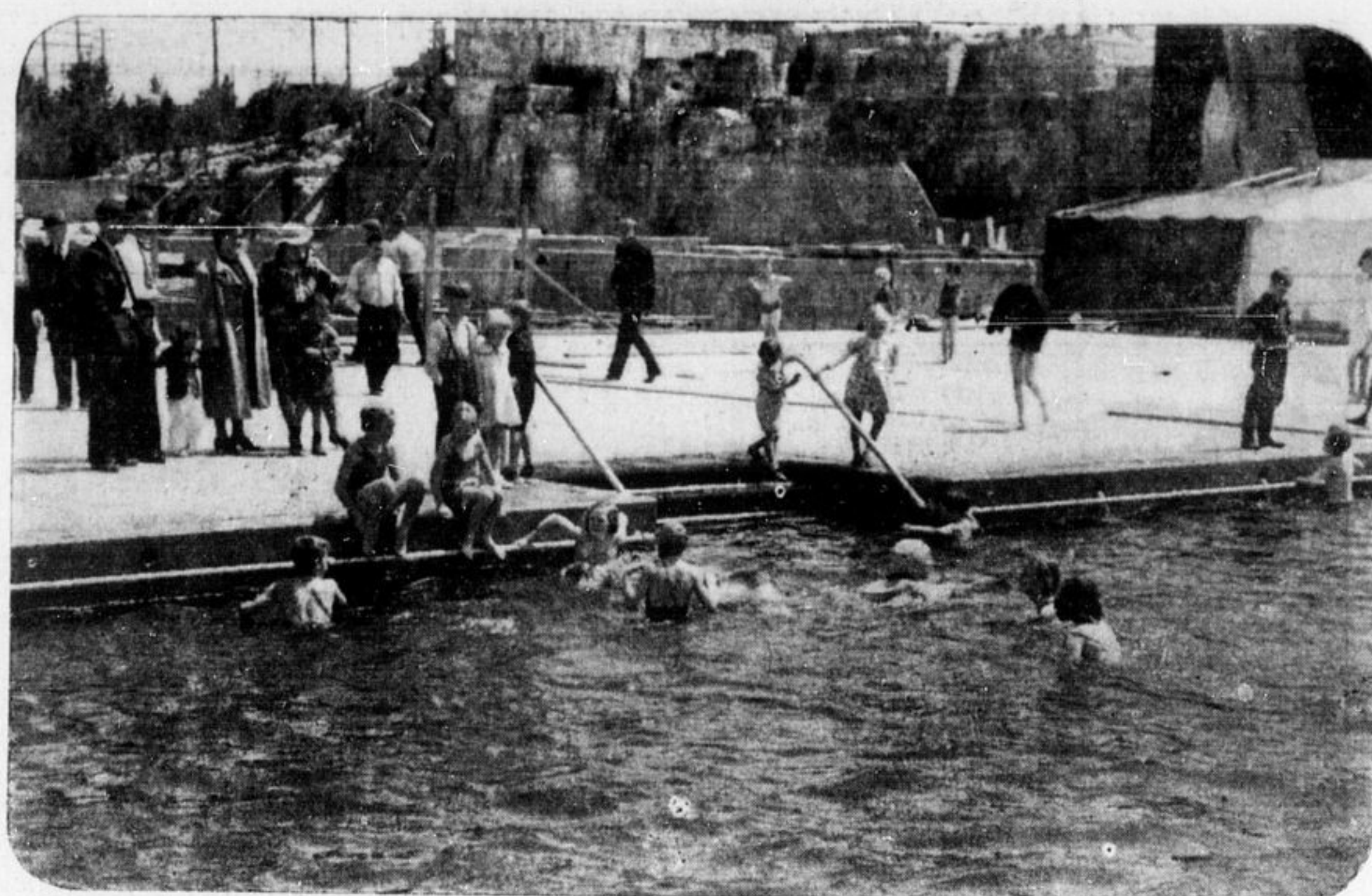

Mrs. H. Ferrigan and brother, Mr. M. J. Sullivan, have returned from Calumet Island, where they attended the funeral of their young sister, Kathleen Sullivan, aged 19 years. The community will sympathise with them in their loss, as Kathleen was Mrs. Ferrigan's only sister. Her death, although a shock was not totally unexpected, as she was being treated in the hospital of St. Laurent at Hull when she died.

Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Sullivan, survive, and four brothers, Patrick, Eric, Elwood and Michael, besides Mrs. H. Ferrigan (Jessie). The death occurred on June 23rd, and on June 25th the funeral took place from St. Anne's Church, Calumet Island, with Father Martel officiating, and her brothers, Eric, Elwood and Michael, with John Donley, Rudolph Ryan and Omer Asselin acting as pallbearers. Many beautiful floral tributes were sent testifying to the esteem in which the fam-

ily is held, and the sorrow felt by all in this young girl's untimely death.

Police Court Four drunks cheerfully pleaded guilty before Magistrate Atkinson in police court here on Tuesday. One, however, charged with being intoxicated in a public place, thought he was wrongfully accused. Constable Wood testified that he had a phone call to go to Railroad street and found the youth not only drunk but fighting, having been thrown out of a hotel. Finding him in an inebriated condition, he had taken him to jail. The young man wanted to ask the policeman a question: "Weren't there seven or eight of us fighting and all piled onto me?" he said. "You are not charged with fighting but with being drunk," said his worship. "Ten and costs or 30 days!"

Another disturber of the public peace was charged with so doing by fighting, and with being drunk. His wife asked to act as interpreter and not only did all the talking but evidently all the thinking for him. She said she was to blame—he was taking her home and she fell; he was not fighting. Constable deposed he had seen accused take his wife and shake her. She said the policeman was absolutely wrong, and implied her husband was an example of husbandly courtesy.

"Then there is no argument," said the magistrate. "For being drunk, 10 and costs or—"

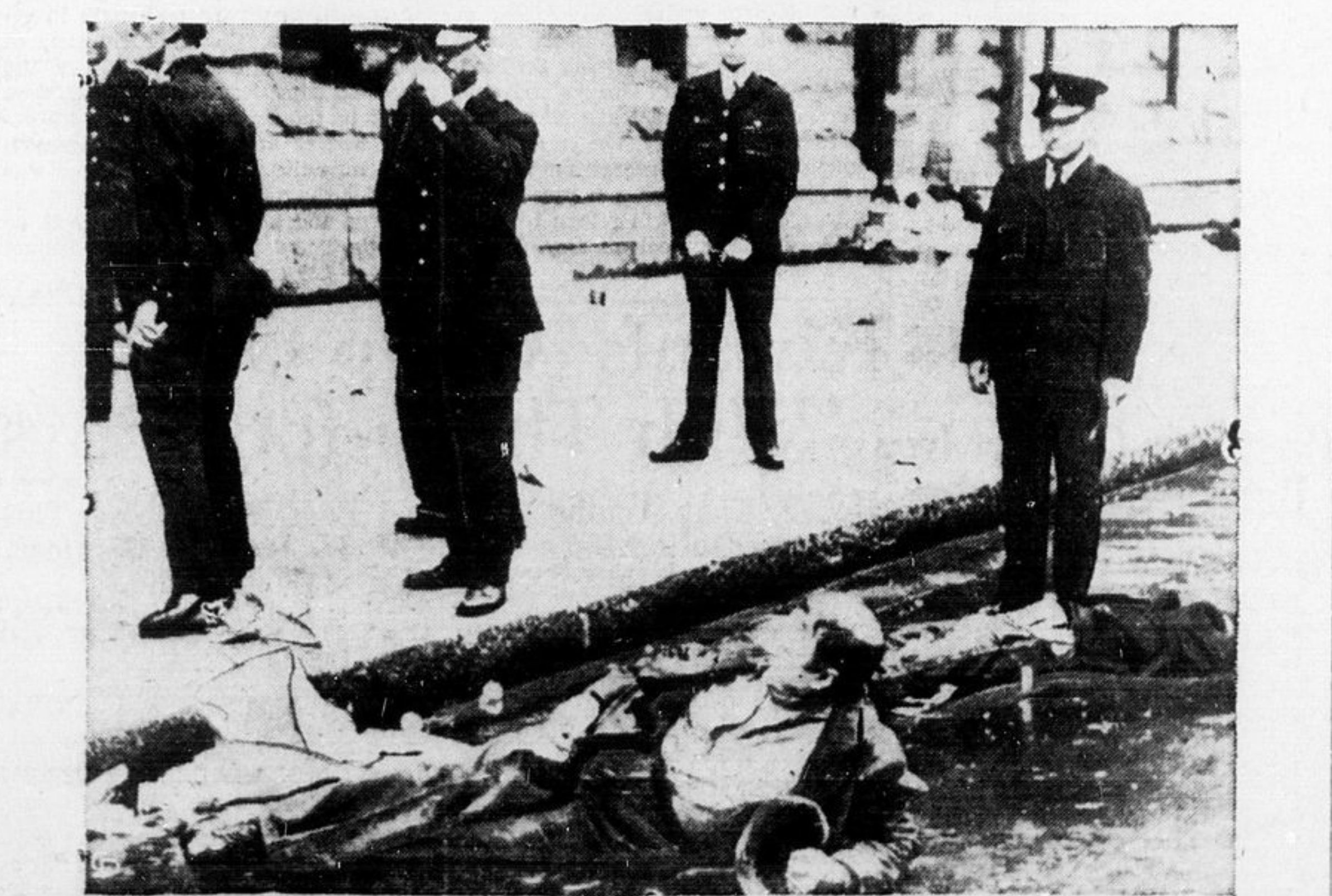
Six violators of By-Law 229 (stop signs) paid \$1 and costs.

The case occupying most of the time of the court concerned the local young man who was charged with reckless driving at Connaught on Sunday, June 26th, when a car collision causing wreckage of car and injuries to Mrs. Fera, of Kirkland Lake, and to two occupants of the South End car, occurred. Defendant pleaded not guilty and was defended by Lawyer Gardner.

The first witness—Paul Fera—testified that he was travelling from 35 to 40 miles per hour from Timmins to Kirkland Lake. He slowed down at the curve marked with a checkerboard as dangerous, near Connaught, and was on his right side within four feet of the ditch, when a car coming in the opposite direction, travelling toward the middle of the road, bore down on him.

"What did you do?" said counsel. "What could I do? I jammed on the brakes and went as close to the ditch as I could. A collision occurred, my car must have bounced and landed in the ditch. My wife was unconscious, and a car coming up took her in to

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dust is no longer a serious menace to safety and to health, but the "bumps" are reported as bad, though little was heard about that feature while the dust was so dangerous. Probably another year some grading or other road improvement may be done before the oil is applied. This year, however, the need for the earliest possible application of oil was so pressing in the interests of safety and health that the department did the right thing to remove the chief menace first. The department is also to be complimented on the speed with which the oiling was completed after the contract was awarded. Another thing that should be remembered is that while all traffic between Timmins and South Porcupine is now using the back road during the time necessary for paving the highway between the two towns, the progress being made in the paving is so good that all can feel it will not be long before the highway can take the bulk of the traffic.
