



Lectures on Forest Fire Menace in North

Timmins Included in Itinerary Under Auspices of C. F.A. and Ontario Forest Service.

Toronto, July 7.-Equipped with alking pictures designed especially to present every popular angle of the forest fire situation, Mr. R. A. Carman of the staff of the Ontario Forest Service is now in Northern Ontario on a lecture tour of several months. The campaign is under the joint auspices of the Ontario Government and the Canadian Forestry Association, the latter having educational campaigns in action in all provinces except Prince Edward Island. Coupled with vigorous appeals for forest fire prevention by the lecturer, the motion picture programme will describe and emphasize the causes and effects of forest fires, laying stress upon the great purpose of the forest resources in providing employment for wage earners and providing local mar-

kets for settlers.


In all parts of Canada such educational meetings are attended daily by thousands, some of the open-air assemblies reaching a total of six thousand persons. To give the programme in remote communities, electric generators are carried so that "talkies" of theatre quality are given even in places that have never witnessed a motion picture display hitherto.

The Minister of Lands and Forests, Hon. Peter Heenan, has taken a direct personal interest in the preventive campaign now under way, and the cooperation of municipalities and operating timber companies is willingly afforded. Visits will be made to Kapuskasing, Smooth Rock Falls, Hearst, Cochrane, Timmins, Iroquois Falls, North Bay, Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie, as well as to scores of mining and logging camps.
