Police of the North Pick up Wanted Men

Fraud Charges in Toronto Lead to Arrest of Frank Vasel, Louis Stanich, J. Rauch.

Halleybury, July 14.—(Special to The Advance)—Less than four hours after Toronto city police had asked provincial officers in this district yesterday to locate and arrest three Kirkland Lake men on charges of fraud, according to the message sent, the trio had been picked up and were being held in Kirkland Lake and Halleybury for the city officer who was to leave Toronto last night to take the men south. One of the men, Frank Vasey, was released from the district jail here Wednesday morning and re-arrested later in the day here, while the others, Joseph Rauch and Louis Stanich, were taken into custody at Kirkland Lake and brought here on the evening train yesterday to await the arrival of the city officer.

Stanich and Vasey, police said, each had served three months in the district jail as a sequel to charges laid in Kirkland Lake under the Frauds and Securities Act, and allegedly arising out of a stock-selling proposition. Stanich's term expired last Wednesday and he had returned north, and Vasey was discharged at nine o'clock yesterday morning. Three hours later, Sergeant V. T. Reed, at district headquarters of the provincial force, received a message from Toronto asking that search be made for the trio and after officers had made enquiries here and in Cobalt and Kirkland Lake, Vasey was located in town and picked up. The other men both were found in Kirkland Lake.

No details of the charges against the trio were given in the messages received here from the Toronto police, and the second telegram, acknowledging the communication announcing the arrests, intimated that an officer was leaving the city on last night's train with the warrants under which the three men were being held. The trio are to be taken south to-night to face the charges laid against them, it was expected here to-day. First word from Toronto came through about noon and by four o'clock the arrests had been made, Toronto notified and receipt of the information from Sergeant Reed acknowledged.

Pioneers Recall Porcupine Fire

Mayor Bartleman and Dr. J. A. McInnis Relate Story of Blaze to Kiwanians.

The anniversary of the Porcupine fire that swept over the district on July 11, 1911, was observed at the weekly luncheon of the Timmins Kiwanis Club on Monday. Two of the pioneers of the camp who went through the fire, Mayor J. P. Bartleman and Dr. J. A. McInnis, recounted in a vivid word picture the scenes and heroism of the now famous conflagration of 27 years ago. Mr. Bartleman and Dr. McInnis were guests of the club for the occasion. Others who related their experiences during the blaze included "Scotty" Wilson and E. G. Dickson.

Premier Given Present by Indians at Moosonee

Moosonee, July 11 (Special)—During his visit of inspection here today, Premier Hepburn was made the recipient of an Eskimo's kayak and sled by residents of the district who flocked to the end of the steel to see the Premier and his party. The Government Leader flew to Moosonee from South Porcupine with J. P. Beckell, President of McIntyre Mines.

"I came up to see things for myself and to look over possibilities of this end of steel," said Mr. Hepburn. "I wanted to talk to the people who live here. I have had a very interesting visit and expect to return here in about five week's time."

Moosonee is the end of steel for the T. & N. O. Railway, the Ontario Government-owned line. The Premier flew back to South Porcupine late today.

Given 23 Months for Theft of Baggage from T. & N.O.

Rouyn, July 12.—Maurice Constantineau, 26-year-old truck driver of Rouyn, arrested on June 14 by Constables Cote, Couroux and Picard, on a charge of breaking and entering, appeared before Judge Armand Boly on July 4 and has been sent down for a 23 months term at Ville Marie jail, where he was transferred, on Tuesday. The theft was committed at the baggage room of the T. & N. O. station here and the articles stolen—a pack sack, a box of suits and other clothing—were valued at about \$200.

A term of six months, also in Ville Marie jail, was meted out to Emile Garneau, of Gatineau Point, Que., residing at the back of 444 Noranda Street, Rouyn, on a charge of white slavery. The arrest was made on June 25 and sentence passed on July 4.

Condition of Chief Justice Latchford Reported Serious

Toronto, July 12.—Chief Justice P. R. Latchford, of the Ontario Court of Appeal, was reported to-day in serious condition at his home here after a gastric hemorrhage four days ago. The Chief Justice, who is 84, had been resting for two weeks when the hemorrhage occurred. Despite his age, he has shown steady improvement since then. While his condition is not critical, it is still serious.

Two-Year-Old Kirkland Boy Located by Searchers

Roger Boudoin, two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. E. Boudoin of the Federal Property, Kirkland Lake, is safe at home to-day, suffering little more than scratches on the face and legs after a mile and a half of wandering through the bush yesterday afternoon. The alarm for the child, big for his age, was raised by his mother about 1.30 when she went to bring him in. Mrs. Boudoin thought he had wandered towards the Federal Townsite but finding no trace there, notified police headquarters and a search was started. Sergeant T. Marion and Constable J. Currie went to the scene. A posse of several of the neighbours was formed and all the residents were asked to be on the lookout for the child. About 3.30, B. McInley, a neighbour of the Boudoin's, came across young Roger, on a path leading north, about a mile and a half from his home. The child's legs and face were scratched by the bushes through which he had climbed during his walk, but he was injured in no other way.

Seek Negotiations With McIntyre Mine

Local Union Requests Management to Discuss Collective Bargaining Issue.

The executive board of the McIntyre Mine and Mill Workers Union, Local 274, of the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers, announced in a statement to the newspapers last night that they have instructed their international representative, Howard G. Welch, to approach the management of the McIntyre Mine, for the purpose of opening of negotiations. "Sentiment of the union membership indicates," said the statement, "that the right of collective bargaining and holidays with pay will be two of the most important issues." The international union of which the local union is a member is a C.I.O. affiliate. Mr. Welch, the statement read, phoned Mr. Ennis, manager of the McIntyre Mine at Schumacher, requesting that a preliminary discussion take place between union representatives and the mine management. Mr. Ennis stated that he was leaving town for a few days and would be unable to enter a discussion at this time. Under instructions from the union executive, Mr. Welch sent a wire to J. P. Bickell, president of the company in Toronto, drawing attention to the request made to Mr. Ennis for negotiations. An immediate answer to the wire was asked.
