

## "Solitary Confinement" of Fabbro Criticized

Defence Counsel Dean Kester, K.C., Claims Accused Has Been Denied Privilege of Seeing Wife or Spiritual Adviser. Terms Request for \$50,000 Bail "Preposterous."

Charging that his client, Otto Fabbro, had been unjustly placed in "solitary confinement" since his arrest on a charge of being in possession of stolen gold precipitates from Dome Mines, valued at \$41,000, and denied the privilege of seeing either his wife or spiritual adviser, Dean Kester, K.C., strongly denounced the attitudes of Inspector E. C. Gurnett, of the C.I.D., and Inspector F. B. Creasy, of the Provincial Police, who are in charge of the investigation, when Fabbro appeared in police court here on Tuesday before Magistrate M. G. Gould. The accused was remanded for a week, without the charge being read or being asked for election or plea, bail being set at \$50,000. Mr. Kester also contended that the amount of bail being asked is "preposterous."

Magistrate Gould—"I don't see what I can do about it."

Mr. Kester—"You might make some suggestions to the authorities. This man hasn't been proven guilty of any offence yet."

Magistrate Gould—"Yes, every man is innocent until he is proven guilty."

Mr. Kester—"This man has a wife and three children and they need support. I would like to see the money, amounting to \$118, which was taken from my client at the time of his arrest, turned over to his family unless it is to be used as an exhibit or part of the crown's evidence."

Magistrate Gould—"I don't think I need to make any reply to Mr. Kester's remarks, said Assistant Crown Attorney Charles Yates. "If he wishes to make an application along the lines he suggests, he should make it in the proper place."

Mr. Kester—"I am only appealing on the grounds of decency."

Magistrate Gould—"I don't see what I can do."

Mr. Kester—"Apparently the authorities can act in any way they see fit. Furthermore asking for \$50,000 bail is out of the question."

Mr. Yates—"The question is whether the bail should be raised. There is \$41,000 involved in this case."

Mr. Kester—"I had \$5000 in mind; \$50,000 is preposterous. I might draw your attention to the fact that in the Home Bank case where millions of dollars was involved, the bail was only \$100,000 and no one got their money back. In this case the gold which is alleged to have been stolen is said to have been recovered."

Mr. Yates—"I would strenuously oppose any suggestion of a reduction in the amount of bail. There is also the

possibility that other charges will be laid against this man."

Magistrate Gould—"This is a case where the bail must be high. If the Crown Attorney asks for \$50,000, I have no other alternative, even though it is a large sum."

At this point the discussion came to an end and Fabbro was led downstairs to his cell to await next week's hearing.

With an intensive investigation still being carried out, it is doubtful how soon the charge will be heard.

## Men Under Arrest at Rouyn Still Unable to Raise Bail

Rouyn, July 14.—Bail, which had at first been set at \$2000 each for Robert Cameron and Angus McDonald, pamphleteers, has been reduced to \$500 each, but has not yet been furnished. The two who were arrested last week on the complaint of a woman living on the Macamic Road, for anti-religious propaganda, appeared before Judge Boly on Friday last, but the case was adjourned until July 19. If bail is furnished the case will be heard only on July 26.

William Roshko, Peter Klemm and Steve Belceki, who were recently given a jail term of one year each by Judge Boly, on a charge of fishing with dynamite, in Routher Lake, have appealed the judgment and the case will be heard at the Amos assizes in September. The charge was laid by Game Warden Duley Gervais, who claimed that between 150 and 200 fish were killed by a single explosion, although his companion in the boat, who was one of the witnesses, said that he did not see any dead fish, being busy with the motor of the boat.

able amount of grading and widening, which could not be undertaken this year owing to the short season. The effect of proper grading on properties along the main street, in addition to provision for sewers and water mains, is something that will also have to be considered, the deputy minister pointed out.

There will also be a short gap in the pavement at the new bridge east of Schumacher, the new fill and approaches to the bridge not being sufficiently settled to hold concrete this year. The same thing applies to the new road being constructed between Porcupine Lake and South Porcupine, cutting and grading of which is now under way.

According to Mr. Smith, the cost of the road from here to Pamour will be approximately \$70,000 per mile, including grading, drainage, and bridge construction. Owing to the uncertain effect of the raising of water levels by the new Hydro dam on the Frederic-house river, bridges will not be built over the Porcupine and Frederic-house rivers this year, Mr. Smith said, in discussing future development of the road from Pamour toward Porcupine Junction. This portion of the highway is being re-located, mainly along the old Shillington Road, which will result in a reduction in distance between here and Matheson of about sixteen miles.

Mr. Smith also pointed out that the Mascio Construction Company have been given a contract for grading, graveling and straightening the back road in places between Timmins and South Porcupine. Until the new highway is ready to be opened, the department will continue to keep the road sprinkled with dust layer.

Ralph Thatcher, 26-year-old Timmins youth, who made a forced landing in a home-made plane on a road just west of the Mattagami River on the evening of June 3, was fined \$5 and costs in police court here on Tuesday before Magistrate Gould on a charge of operating an aircraft without a pilot's license. The charge was laid by the Mounted Police.

The plane, which was built entirely by Thatcher and his brother, was only slightly damaged in the crash and the youthful pilot escaped with a few scratches. According to the evidence Thatcher had taken to the air after two hours of dual flying instruction by a licensed pilot and had successfully manoeuvred the plane for half an hour before the motor suddenly "conked."

It is understood that he will continue training in flying and hopes to have a license in a short time.
