

Hollinger and McIntyre Both Lose Ennis Cup Games

Macs Defeat Hollinger 4-2 In Thirteen Inning Battle

Lefty Zampell Hits Long Double in Thirteenth to Score Prout and McDonald With Winning Runs. Hollinger Pitcher Throws Away Two Chances to Win Game in Earlier Stages

A "million dollar" double to the centre field fence by Lefty Zampell with two men ahead of him in the thirteenth inning, gave Ike Solomon's McIntyre team a spectacular 4-2 victory over Hollinger in a Temiskaming league game at Timmins ball park Monday night. It was the second game the Macs have won this season in regular league play.

It was a pitcher's battle all the way between Reg. Dorey for Hollinger and the veteran George McShane for McIntyre. While Dorey dropped the decision he showed his more experienced rival on the mound allowing nine hits to eleven by McShane.

The Hollinger pitcher personally threw away two chances to win the game by bad base running. He led off in the sixth inning with a double and trying to stretch it into a triple was nabbed going into third with a perfect throw by "Tup" Gilbert. Again in the tenth inning he threw away a perfect chance to win the game. With two out Thompson hit a long double to centre field and advanced to third on the Hollinger twirler's single. Lawton, led the lead off man in the batting order.

came to bat and for some unexplained reason Dorey tried to steal second. Joe McDonald, McIntyre catcher, rifled the ball to Hann who covered second base and Dorey was an easy out, retiring the side. Incidentally the next time up Lawton came through with a clean single that would have won the game in the previous inning.

Hollinger drew first blood as the lengthy contest got under way. Lawton first man up for Timmins team, pulled up as second when Prout threw the ball over Zampell's head and scored when with two out Jack Darragh lined a clean single over the infield.

McIntyre tied the score in the second. Joe McDonald, who was back catching for the first time since injuring a finger some time ago, started things off by drawing a pass. He went to second on Zampell's sacrifice and to third on Dorey's bad throw to second. Sunderland struck out but Gilbert singled to send McDonald in from third tying the game up at 1-1.

"Tup" Wood celebrated his return to baseball wars with three hits in six times to bat and led the McIntyre team's attack. With one out in the third he singled and advanced to third on Felder's choices by Prout and Hann. Hann, after being called safe at first attempted to steal second and was trapped. The wily Woods sped in from third to score, Hann staying clear of his pursuers until after the run had crossed the plate.

Singles by Jack Darragh and George Istratti, with a two-base error by Gilbert in centre field in recovering Darragh's drive, gave Hollinger another run in the seventh that tied the game up at two runs apiece.

The two squads battled along and at the end of the regulation nine innings the score was still deadlocked. McIntyre nearly won the game in the twelfth but despite the fact that they combined two hits and two fielder's choices, the Hollinger defence was equal to the occasion.

It was not until the thirteenth that the climax took place, with one man away. Prout was safe at first on Ford's error. Hann was thrown out, pitcher to first, Prout going to second. Joe McDonald drew a walk and Zampell ambled up to the plate. The fans came to their feet as the squatty left-hander bent into one of Dorey's slants and plastered the ball into the bleachers in deep centre field. Prout and McDonald crossed the plate with the winning runs, Zampell being held at second.

In the last of the thirteenth Hollinger were unable to get going. Lawton fled out, Cherevaty struck out for the fourth time during the game and Scarlett singled. Jack Darragh, the last man up, fled out to centre to end the game.

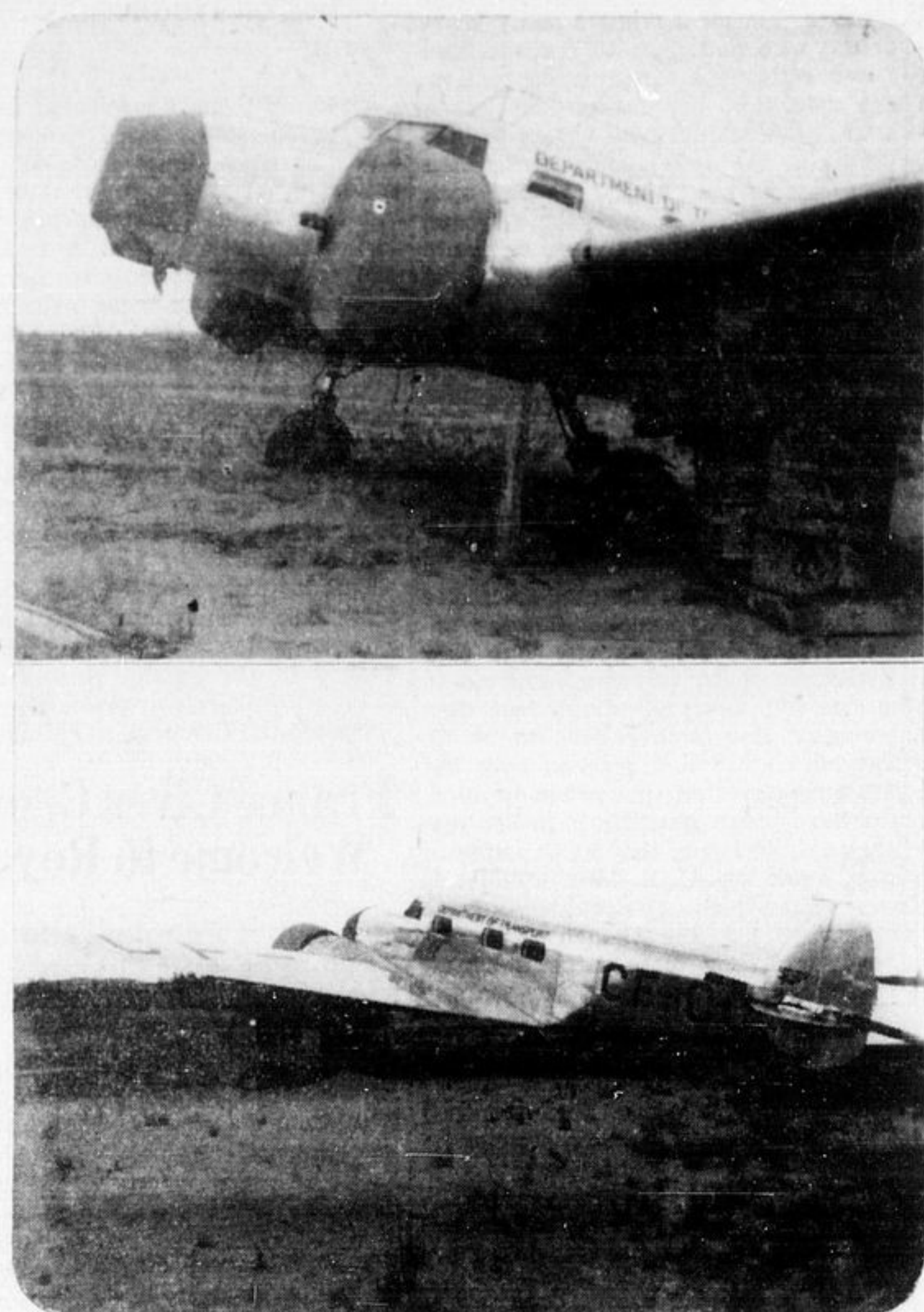

Kirkland Lake, Ont., July 20.—(Special to The Advance)—Failure of basemen to hold on to the ball played a great part in Hollinger's 10-6 loss to Lakeshore here today in an Ennis Cup baseball feature. The Timmins team made five errors and gave Istratti on the mound poor support.

The local team took down a big three runs in the first inning and continued to add to its total in the second, sixth, seventh and eighth. Gord Luck pitched the full game for Lakeshore, striking out six men and allowing nine hits. Istratti was replaced by Avery on the opposing mound in the seventh, while making many errors, Hollinger pulled off two smart double plays which cut scoring chances down. Scarlett drove in three, of his team's runs with a triple in the fourth innings. The remaining three were scored in the eighth on two hits and three errors.

Catcher Johnny Oltean, of Hollinger, was injured when his own foul tip hit him on the foot. He was replaced by Mackay. Darragh, Scrutton, Buck and Luck all had doubles to their credit.

Sixth Inning Toburn Rally Too Big an Obstacle Here

Winners Score Three Runs on Four Successive Hits After Two Men Retired. Callery Strikes Out Ten but One Bad Inning and Wild Pitch Paves Way for Defeat.

Scoring three runs on four successive hits after two were out in the sixth inning, Toburn defeated McIntyre in an Ennis Cup game in Schumacher last night by a score of 5-3. At the time of the Toburn rally the two teams were tied 2-2, McIntyre scoring their last run of the game in the ninth when Bill Prout tripled and crossed the plate on Hann's fly to centre field.

Fred Callery went the entire route for McIntyre and with the exception of the sixth when the Kirkland Lake team bunched four safe drives, including a double, for three runs, kept the Toburn hits well divided. In the fifth however he presented Toburn with another run on a wild pitch.

Zalba, pitching for Toburn, while he only allowed five hits, was lucky to escape with a win. In only three of the nine innings did McIntyre fail to get men on base and the box score shows that twelve of the Macs died on the pathways during the contest. They just couldn't hit in the pinches and in addition, a smart double play with one out and the bases loaded in the third inning, got Zalba out of a bad hole.

Despite the loss, Callery dished up a smart game, striking out ten and walking one. Zalba whiffed five and walked the same number.

"Nerts" Parent, much heralded fence busting star, fielding genius and sparkling extraordinary of the Toburn team, looked more like "the beaten man." In four trips to the plate he whiffed the Porcupine ozone on three occasions and grounded out weakly to first on the other. Defensively he was credited with two errors on the three chances he handled in the field. It was an unkind climax to the effusive build-up he has received in the Kirkland Lake press. Despite his showing he looks like a ball player and it must be admitted that they all have their off-days.

Toburn opened the scoring in the second inning. Savoie, classy first sacker for the Kirkland team, crossed up the infield with a perfect bunt and went to second on a passed ball. Advancing to third on an infield out, Theo Elliott brought him home with a single to left for the first run of the game.

With one out in the third, McIntyre filled the bases, Prout singled, Hann reached first on Morin's error and Joe McDonald walked to clog the sacks. Zalba hit Zampell with a pitched ball to force Prout in and Hann crossed the plate when Parent booted Gilbert's roller to short. Everyone was safe and the bases were still loaded, with the score tied 2-2.

Ernie Sunderland hit a line smash to Zalba who speared the ball from among the flying splinters of a broken bat and tossed to third to double McDonald off the bag. It was a lucky finish for Toburn to what appeared to be a McIntyre onslaught.

In the fifth Morin dumped down a bunt to start proceedings for Toburn. The runner had the ball beaten to first but Callery made the play and threw high over Zampell's head. Elliott fanned and Morin went to third on Zalba's infield out. A moment later the Toburn man scored when Callery threw a wild pitch to Parent who subsequently struck out to retire the side.

Toburn's decisive rally in the sixth was unexpected. The first two men to face Callery were retired but the next four hammered the ball to safe territory, Rice getting a double. Before Elliott was thrown out at first, Toburn had scored three runs to take the lead 5-2.

While McIntyre had scoring chances in the sixth and seventh, it was not until the ninth that they made a belated rally. Bill Prout, who made a nice job of the hot corner, hit a long triple into deep centre that Hillman just failed to get his glove on and scored on Hann's fly to the same spot. McDonald was out at first but the fans took heart again when Zampell pulled up at second on a bad throw to first by Parent. Gilbert, the next man up, hit to Rudell at third and the Toburn man made no mistakes as he threw to Savoie for the last out of the game.
