Agrees Taxation Now Badly Overdone

Mr. Wm. Stewart Commends the Excellent Letter of Dr. Sheard in a Recent Issue of The Advance

Timmins, Ont., Aug. 2nd, 1938
Editor, The Advance, Timmins, Ontario.

Dear Sir:—The writer seeks your indulgence towards granting space in this week's issue of The Advance for the following letter.

On reading such a unauocratic and commendable letter, as that of Dr. Charles Sheard's in the issue of The Advance dated July 28th; in which the doctor criticises, in part, the manner of conducting present day municipal administration; one receives the urge to say to Dr. Sheard:—Thanks for the contribution! And to The Advance—Thanks for the privilege to read the published reproduction of the doctor's letter.

Dr. Sheard makes reference to the final payment made, on a careful person's property mortgage, and being "replaced by an increasing municipal tax burden, placed there with smug complacency BY THOSE WHO NEVER OWNED, AND NEVER INTEND TO OWN, A FOOT OF CANADIAN LAND." The ethical meaning embodied within his letter certainly impresses the writer. The Doctor would be a sublime comrade-in-arms, to one, at the post-mortem examination of the present set-ups of municipal assessing and its ally—taxation of property—when (and if) the time arrives to relegate the existing inhuman viciousness permeating the system.

Any general concepts inherent with good municipal administration, particularly relating to assessing and taxation, can be made to appear almost farcical. Thus can it be when responsible individuals display lack of proper interest, either through insufficient certain knowledge or for want of owning property, while taking any part in administering municipal affairs.

When this does arise the assessable—and taxation—impositions border almost like as being issued through a state of dictatorial-like powers (almost limitless) placed in the lap of the municipal assessor and automatically, as a consequence, into the taxation department.

Maladministration of municipal affairs can create errors, many of them cumulative. Of course we are told it is human to err; but, on the other hand if erring becomes a habit it also becomes a nuisance and sometimes with very inhuman results. For instance—when taxation is administered to the point of what Dr. Sheard calls confiscation. Commensurate with all this comes difficulties in manifold ways; many injustices, hardships and incompatibility between humans.

One might continue further on the subject of assessing and taxation, but, the writer although possessed with no barbaric tendencies, prefers leaving "those who never owned, and never intend to own, a foot of Canadian land," but who "replaced the lifted mortgage of the careful man with increasing municipal tax burden," to lick wounds, inflicted with the lance-like edged truths of Dr. Sheard, until their conscience prescribes the cure. Then the emancipation of sane assessing and taxation may be resurrected.
