

Tile for Sewers Being Purchased Locally Now

Another sample of the mistaken idea of the mayor that anything from outside is better than local product was given in the purchase of some tile from an outside firm. The price for some grades was slightly below local prices, but in others was as high or higher. The difference was more than made up by the fact that the Northern Brick and Tile Co., Timmins, employed some eighty men on this work. The purchase, however, was rushed through with the outside firm, but, when the tile reached here it was found to be much inferior to the local product for the purpose needed. Some of it was broken in transit, and council decided eventually to purchase the needed tile from the local industry whose product is approved by the provincial department. It is not known what will be done about the tile reaching here from outside. The driver of the truck having an accident that caused the breaking of some of the tile in transit is understood to have been discharged, though the accident was valuable in suggesting the unsuitability of the tile for the purpose needed.

Service on Behalf of Nazi Sufferers

Special Prayers and Intercession at the Synagogue on Sunday.

A special service of prayer and intercession "on behalf of the sufferers from the Nazi attack on religion and human freedom" will be held in the B'Nai Israeli Synagogue, Cedar street north, on Sunday, August 7th, at 8.30 p.m.

The call to this service was issued to the entire Jewish community by Rabbi Monson and Rabbi Linder. In a letter to Timmins and district Jewry in regard to the special service says: "The terrible events in Central Europe and their tragic impact upon our brethren continue unabated. Furthermore, the heart-breaking reports of violence and death in Eretz Israel (Palestine) have aroused our people all over the world to realization that now more than ever before within our memory do we depend on the help that the Almighty alone can grant us."

This Sunday has been proclaimed as a day of special service to the British Chief Rabbinate in London, England, and, at the request of the Archbishop of Canterbury, will be marked for prayer for persecuted Jewry in Anglican churches as well.

The day chosen for this service is an annual fast day on the Jewish calendar—the ninth day of the month of Abh—which concludes for the Jewish people a three-week period of national mourning. This day commemorates the breaking down of the walls of Jerusalem, which was followed by the siege of the Holy City and the destruction of the Temple. Functions of rejoicing, such as marriages, etc., are prohibited to Jewish people during this period.

On Sunday Rabbi Monson will deliver a message on the subject, "What Price Redemption". Rev. W. Linder will chant appropriate musical selections.

Railway Employee Dies from Injuries

Ansonville Employee of the T. & N. O. Fatally Injured

Iroquois Falls, Ont., Aug. 1st, 1938—(Special to The Advance)—Mr. S. Sodorakis, of Ansonville, age about 55, died here in the Anson General hospital after suffering from a fractured skull received from falling down seven steps, while preparing for work on Saturday morning.

Mr. Sodorakis who had finished his breakfast, had gone upstairs to make some last minute preparations for the day, and while coming downstairs prior to his leaving for work with the section crew of the T. & N. O. Railway, he slipped on the bottom stairs, to fall head first to the bottom, sustaining a

fractured skull. The accident occurred at Glenosky's boarding house, where he was staying.

Rushed to the hospital, he only lived the day through, dying at 9 o'clock that evening.

A married man, he came to Ontario alone several years ago from Russia and had lived a quiet life, only familiar to a few friends. During the past years he had worked steadily with the section crew, on the line from Iroquois Falls to Perquimans Junction.

An inquest will be held some time next week, into Mr. Sodorakis' death, after a post mortem result is returned. Mr. Sodorakis leaves to mourn, his wife and one child, both residing in Russia.
