Complaint Against Car Owners

Traffic Congestion at Fires Strongly Criticised by Fire Chief Alex Borland.

Fire Chief Alex Borland is up in arms regarding the conduct of motorists when fire trucks are answering alarms and today is making a special request that car owners allow firemen space in which to manoeuvre equipment at fires.

Sunday night during an alarm at the residence of Father Fontana, Cedar St., two trucks went out but were divided by hundreds of cars that flocked to the scene. The practice of cars driving between two trucks on the way to a fire seriously impedes the work of the firemen, Chief Borland points out.

The Chief also asks that after arriving at a fire that cars keep back and allow the trucks to move equipment and hose. Last night the congestion at the corner of Cedar street and Kimberley avenue was so dense that firemen found difficulty in getting a line of hose on the fire. The traffic act specifically states that cars should pull into the curb to allow fire trucks to pass. It is also against the law to follow a fire truck at less than 500 feet.

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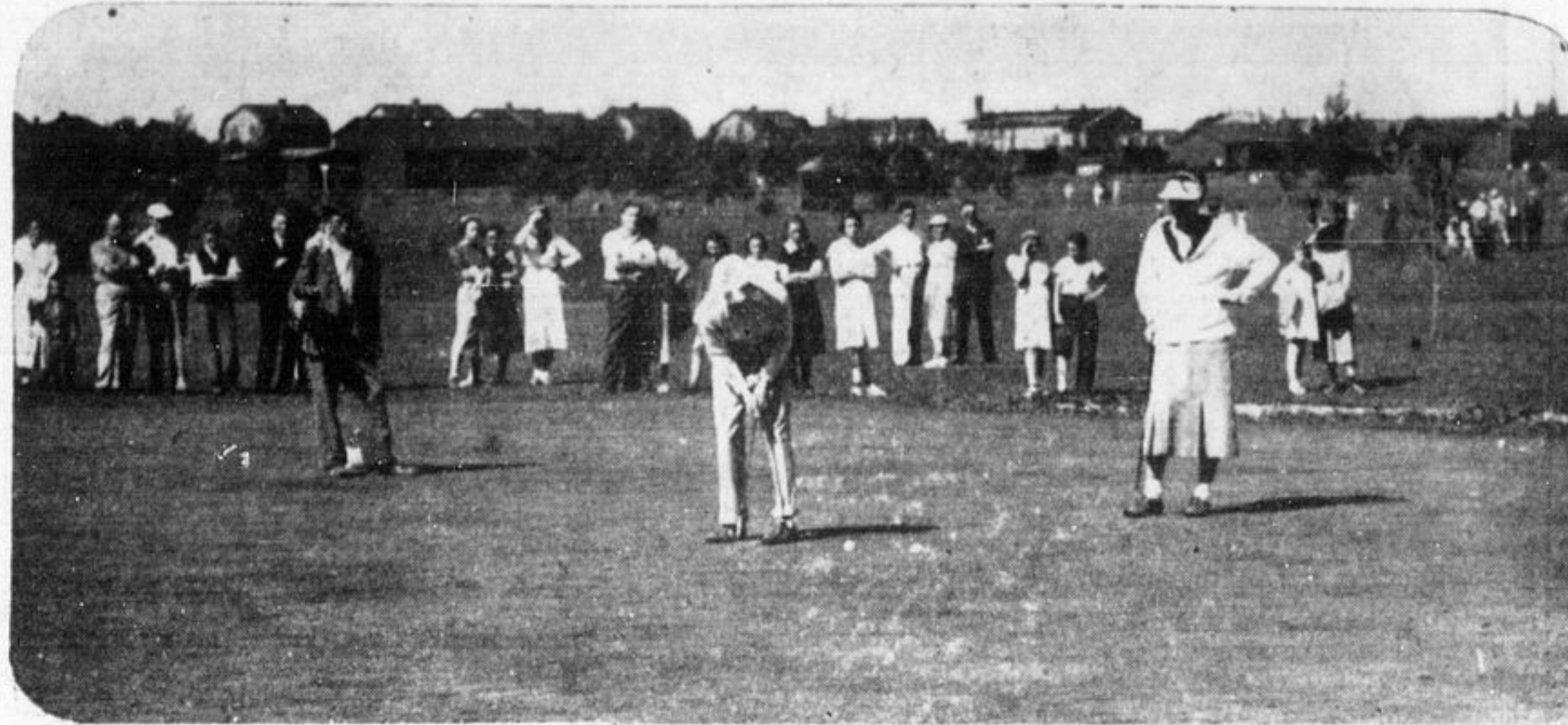
Miner Is Crushed At Pamour

Stewart McClelland of Timmins, Badly Hurt in Accident Early on Sunday.

Crushed between two ore cars on the 1,000-foot level of Pamour Mines early Sunday morning, Stewart McClelland, 22 Way Avenue, Timmins is confined to St. Mary's hospital here in a serious condition.

Actual details of the accident are indefinite and the exact extent of the man's injuries are not known. Dr. W. S. Paul, mine doctor, said this afternoon that McClelland has sustained a badly crushed chest and abdomen and had been hemorrhaging internally. He was given a blood transfusion on Saturday and another this afternoon. Dr. Paul told The Advance to-day that the man's condition is such that he will be unable to determine the extent of his injuries for several days.

HAILEYBURY GIRL WINS N.O.L.G.A. CHAMPIONSHIP

Timmins Band Wins Cup By Default Yesterday

Kirkland Lake Band Fails to Appear to Uphold its Possession of Consumers' Co-operative Band Trophy. Timmins Citizens' Band Plays Test Piece and Wins 90 Marks Out of a Hundred.

The Timmins Citizens' Band, under the leadership of Bandmaster F. J. Wolno, yesterday won the big silver trophy of the Consumers Co-operative Society without any opposition at the annual picnic of the Society. Kirkland Lake band, the only other entry and the holders of the handsome cup for the past year, were unable to come up for the event. Timmins Citizens' Band however, played the test piece and were judged in the same way as if there had been other bands competing.

Mr. Michael Moore, leader of the Lions Boys' Band at Sudbury, was here as adjudicator.

The Timmins Citizens' Band played a march, "On the Road," before playing the test piece, "Characteristique," by Mr. F. Theil, of Waterloo, Ont. After the presentation of the number by the Timmins Citizens' Band Mr. Moore

spoke in a very interesting way, first of the test piece and later of the playing of the Timmins Citizens' Band.

Mr. Moore said that he had had considerable experience in judging as well as in leading bands in different contests and so his comments might be of some special value. He had played under some of the finest bandmasters in England, such as the leader of the famous St. Hilda's Band, and others.

He had led bands in twelve contests, in which the bands had won nine firsts.

In regard to the contest piece presented, he criticized it as a musical composition, pointing out that there were too many repetitions. As to the playing of the selection by the Timmins Citizens' Band he made a few comments, hoping that what he had to say would benefit the members of the band. After his preliminary remarks, Mr. Moore announced that he had awarded the Timmins band ninety marks out of a hundred.

Arrested for Using Knife in Struggle

According to police Melnick entered the house through a window and put up a fight when confronted by Parlonovich. In the midst of the battle, Melnick is alleged to have stabbed Parlonovich in the shoulder with a small knife, inflicting a minor wound.

Melnick will appear in police court on Tuesday on breaking and entering and wounding charges.

Arrest Woman and Son in Kewagama Gold Ore Case

Mrs. Maria Roy and Son, Albert, of Timmins Taken to Val d'Or in Connection with the Cases Over the Recent Theft of Highgrade Gold Ore from Quebec Mine.

Sturgeon Falls, Aug. 13.—Mrs. Maria Roy, present proprietor of the Lady Laurier Hotel, Timmins, and her cripple son, Albert, were arrested late Thursday night in a shack on the Field Highway out from Sturgeon Falls. Arrested at the same time were Joseph Renaud, of Val d'Or, and Napoleon Galipeau, Jr., of Sturgeon Falls. The

police were very reticent in the matter, and the four people taken in charge were first taken to the Nipissing Jail at North Bay and then whisked away to Val d'Or jail. It is understood that the arrests are in connection with the recent theft of gold ore, valued from \$21,000 to \$50,000, from the Kewagama Gold Mines in the Val d'Or district. Quebec officers working on the case were on hand to take the prisoners to Val d'Or for hearing in the case. One report is that Galipeau was breaking up gold ore with a hammer when the police entered the shack. The arrest of the four near Sturgeon Falls makes a total of nineteen arrests in the Kewagama gold ore theft case. Those arrested in addition to this latest four include:—Paul Whelan, Joseph Scharf, Tom Haughin, Charles Kellat, Charlie Johnson, Charlie Peterson, Larry LaBrecque, Alfred Eryelstren, Louis Polson, Stewart McDonald, Walter Poirier, James O'Brien, Nick Falum and Henri Charlebois.

Mrs. Roy operated a bakery at Sturgeon Falls some years ago, then going to Kapuskasing, and later coming to Timmins where she has operated rooming houses and hotels.

The theft of gold ore from the Kewagama Mine took place on July 31st when 17 boxes of high-grade were taken from a storehouse. The police have recovered part of the stolen ore. Other arrests are expected in the case, it is said.

According to reports at the week-end from Kewagama, Quebec, the amount of ore stolen from the mine has been greatly exaggerated, the amount now being placed as low as \$500, while other are cached in the bush has been recovered to the tune of some \$20,000.

Entries for this event are to be made to Dr. Weston, Schumacher. Valuable prizes are offered in this as well as in the other events of the evening. As a grand finale for the occasion there is to be a dance after the water events. The Lions Boys' Band will be in attendance.

The Schumacher swimming pool has been in constant and happy use by the children of the community for several weeks past and there is every evidence that it has been appreciated. The Schumacher Lions Club led in securing this benefit for Schumacher and one form of appreciation for this will be to turn out for the event scheduled for Wednesday evening.

Fire Damages Shed at Priest's House

Caused Damage of \$200 on Sunday Night

Fire, thought to have been caused by children playing with matches, damaged a shed at the rear of the residence of Father Fontana, Cedar street south, to the extent of about \$200 Sunday night at 8:35.

The building, of frame construction, had apparently been ignited from the outside and was burning fiercely when the firemen arrived. Two hundred and fifty feet of hose were laid and the blaze was soon extinguished. The interior of Father Fontana's dwelling was undamaged except for smoke.

Children playing with matches are blamed for a fire last Friday morning that caused about \$80 damage at the residence of O. Lefebvre, 8 Bannerman avenue. Firemen were called to the scene and quickly had the flames under control.
