

The Rollei Principle

The body of the Rollei camero is made in one piece -light, durable and strong. Above the actual taking camera is arranged a finder camera. The light rays fall through the finder lens on to the mirror and are thrown upon to the focussing screen, clearly outlining the future picture, right way up as it will later appear on the film. This finder picture is protected by the focussing hood and shows at the same time the sharpness and outline of the film image. The proverbial "ever-readiness" of the Rollei camera is obtained by this combination.


